The Conference Committee of the Association of Collegiate Schools of Planning and the Host Committee in the Maxine Goodman Levin College of Urban Affairs at Cleveland State University cordially invites proposals for individual papers, complete paper sessions, roundtable discussions and poster presentations at the annual conference of the Association. The invitation is extended to faculty and students of ACSP member programs and to scholars and scholarly practitioners outside the ACSP family who are concerned with planning cities and regions.

Please do not propose presenting more than one formal paper or joining in more than one roundtable discussion.

All of the track chairs are particularly interested in papers that assess and synthesize the state of knowledge in their fields; that revisit “classic” works, and that review major new studies. If your paper will deal with the conference theme – sustainability – please follow the general directions for the submission of a proposal. You should also, however, send a copy of your proposal to Seymour Mandelbaum, at mandel@pobox.upenn.edu.

Poster sessions are a particularly effective way of presenting ideas that call for reflection on graphic materials, a brief but dense text, or a sequence of equations. Posters will be easily accessible and time will be allotted for discussants to review and comment on them.

Friday afternoons at ACSP conferences are devoted to tours and site visits in the host region. Cleveland provides remarkable opportunities to explore the dynamics and the difficulties of urban revitalization. We particularly welcome proposals for paper sessions and roundtables that complement the Friday afternoon program.

The conference committee will select and solicit discussants for all paper and poster sessions. We do, however, welcome suggestions proffered by authors and session organizers. The committee characteristically respects the grouping of papers in pre-organized sessions but reserves the right to realign papers when it has all the proposals before it.

We are interested in organizing a few sessions in which papers are posted on the WWW by early October and are widely read in advance of the conference. In that way, the session in Cleveland can be devoted to a vigorous critical discussion. We welcome volunteers for these “pre-read” sessions. (Indicate your interest when you submit your abstract.)

SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Abstracts must be submitted to one and only one track. The tracks are listed at the end of this invitation. If you are not sure where to send your abstract, we encourage you to seek the advice of potential chairs.

Your abstract should contain the following information in 200 - 600 words:

- central theme or hypothesis: what question are you trying to address?
- approach and methodology: how will you address that question?
- relevance of your work to planning education, practice, or scholarship
- key data sources
- 3-5 major references to allow the track chair to place your work in its field
- If you are a doctoral student, please indicate the relation between your proposal and your doctoral dissertation – completed or in the works (*e.g.* “no connection,” “drawn from an almost completed dissertation,” “drawn from an approved dissertation proposal.”) Include the name and e-mail address of your adviser or dissertation supervisor with your abstract.

If you think that any of these requirements are inappropriate for your work, please provide other relevant information but do not attach bibliographies, reports, or full papers.

If you have a scheduling constraint please indicate this prominently on your abstract. Scheduling constraints that ACSP recognizes include teaching duties and religious holidays. We will not accept requests for scheduling changes after July 1, except in cases of emergency.

- **HARD-COPY ABSTRACTS MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY A \$35 SUBMISSION FEE.**

Submitting By Mail

If submitting by mail, your abstract must include a cover sheet that provides the following information in chronological order:

1. **First Name, Surname**
2. **Affiliation**
3. **Type of Abstract (select one):**
 - Individual Formal Paper
 - Formal Paper as part of a pre-organized session
 - Formal Paper Session
 - Roundtable, Informal Session, Panel
 - Poster Session
4. **Paper Title**
5. **Name and affiliation for each author**
6. **Full contact information for each author (including email, fax, zip code, and work phone)**
7. **Session Information**
8. **Suggested Track**
9. **Session Organizer**
10. **Session Title**
11. **Suggested Discussant**

If submitting by mail, you must submit one cover sheet for each formal paper abstract, one cover sheet and one abstract for each informal session, panel or roundtable. If you submit a pre-organized formal paper session, you must submit one abstract and one cover form for the session, and one abstract and one cover form for each formal paper in that session.

ABSTRACTS NOT SUBMITTED ONLINE OR SUBMITTED BY MAIL WITHOUT THE APPROPRIATE COVER SHEET(S) WILL BE RETURNED WITHOUT BEING REVIEWED.
