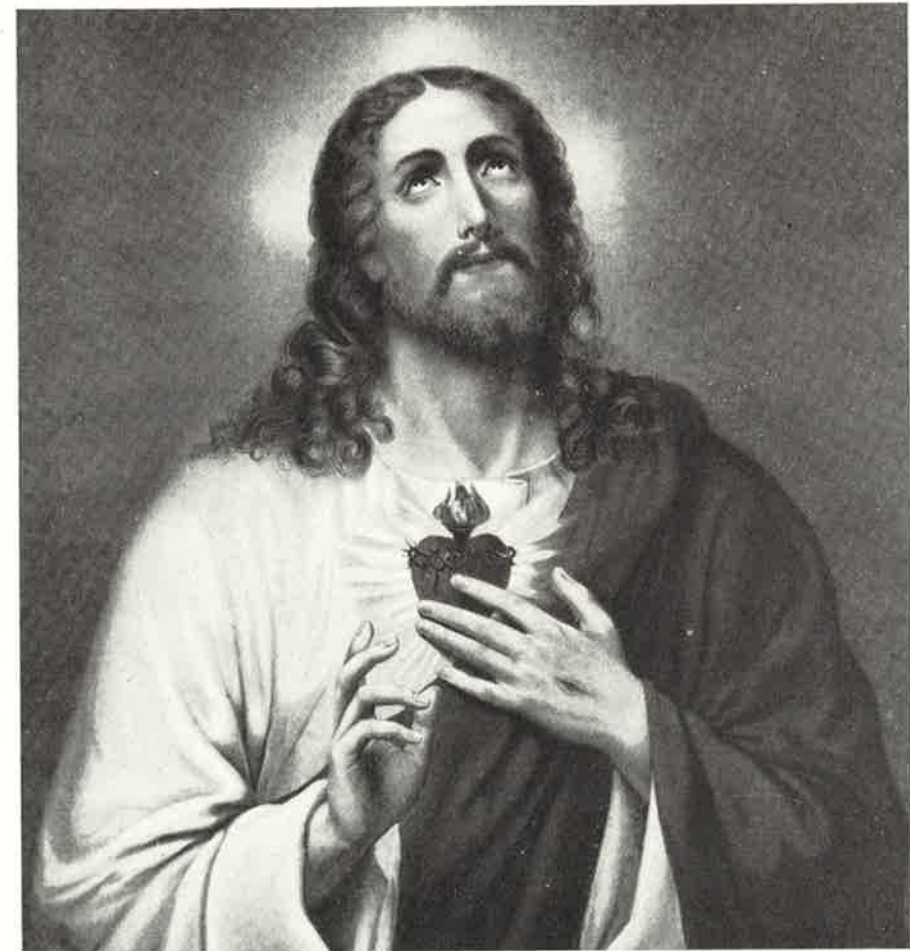

September 3, 1940 is a date long to be remembered in the annals of Sacred Heart. On that day we entered its halls full of enthusiasm and determined to make particularly big footprints on the sands of time.

We elected George Mayoue our first president with Harriet Kelly as vice-president and Jim Henning as secretary-treasurer. Johnny Mock was the first member of our class to sit on the student council.

Half of the class was organized as the St. Don Bosco Club.

Ours was the first class to sit in an "exclusive" assembly. The innovation was dropped only a year after we initiated it, however.

A newcomer, Mike McMeel, took over the reins as president in our sophomore year; since then, to our great sorrow, Mike has left us. It might be said here that every one misses Mike. His merriment brought cheer even into the darkest corners of the school. George Noonan was our sophomore vice-president and Betty Bougie, secretary-treasurer. George Mayoue was the class representative on the student council.

Juniors already! George Noonan is president and Tom Lucier and Jean Rosatti are holding down the offices of vice-president and secretary-treasurer, respectively.

This was a good year for the class of '44. We watched the boys drill with military precision in a new class designed to fit our grads for the Army.

Our class financed a prom with only three months notice and that was certainly no mean feat. The big event was at the Moorhead Country Club on May 12.

At this point we all ask, "Where has time gone?" Seniors already and our days at the Academy are numbered. George Noonan pulled a "Roosevelt" on us by being re-elected president. George Mayoue was named vice-president with Harriet Kelly as secretary-treasurer.

Our biggest activity was Homecoming, an occasion on which we did ourselves up proud. The entire day was a memorable occasion. Starting with Mass in the morning, followed by breakfast, and an afternoon of football. The grand climax was the big dance that night.

Our class climaxes all its other firsts by leading the reorganized Student Council; being the first Catholic High School in this area to offer a credit in the Encyclicals; and the first class to place any representatives on the Catholic School Press Association Honor Roll: Tom Lucier, George Noonan, Harriet Kelly, Genevieve Orchard, and Paul Dwyer all receiving the award.

Already the class is beginning to sever the bonds of unity with commencement approaching. Many girls have registered at various colleges. Among the boys we find volunteers in the Army and the Navy Air Forces as well as applicants for the Army A-12 and the Naval V-12 programs.

And so we end our years at the Academy. We leave, taking with us memories which shall not easily be lost. The school is yours, Class of '45.

FOOTBALL

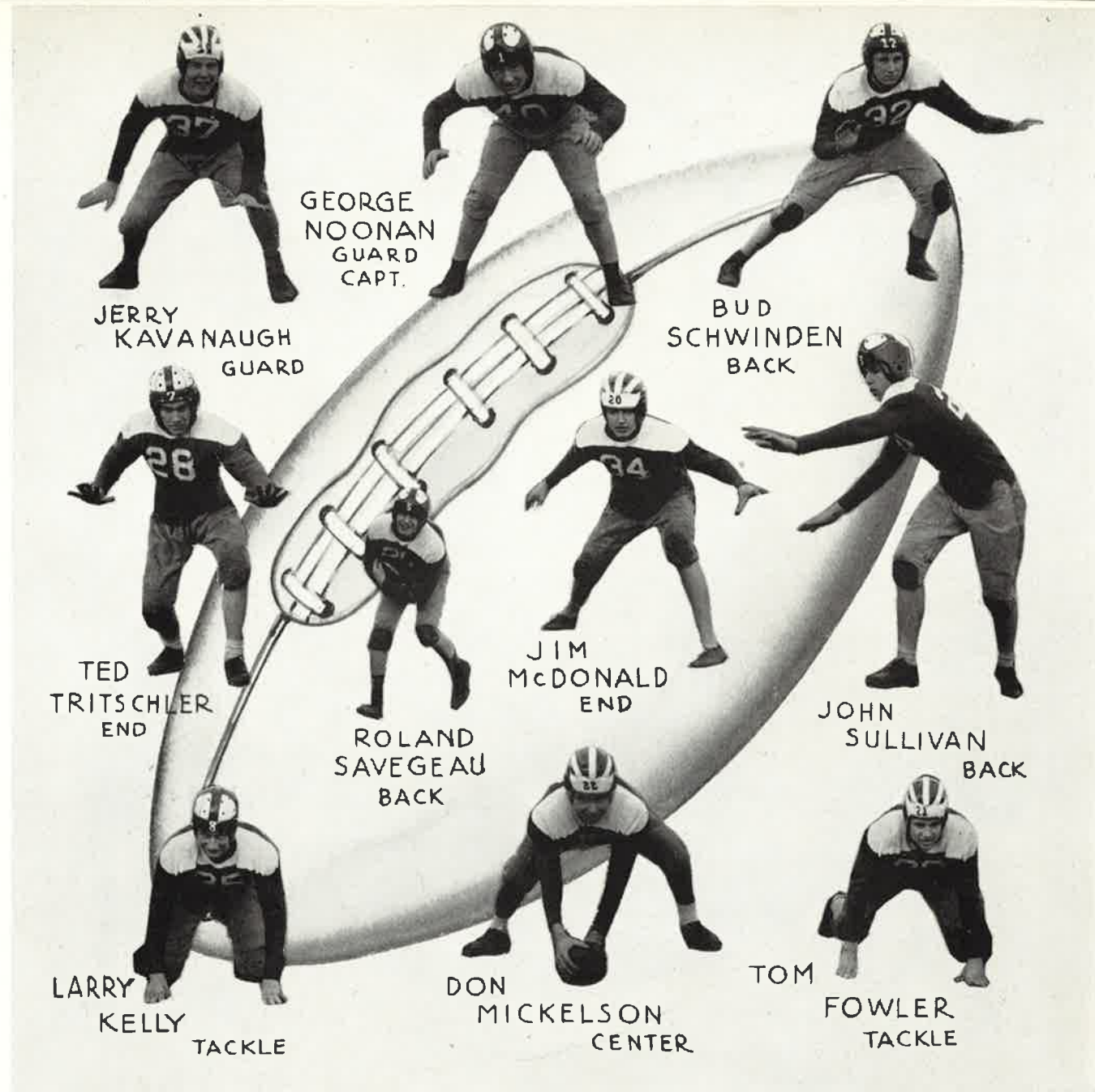

COACH CAMPAGNA

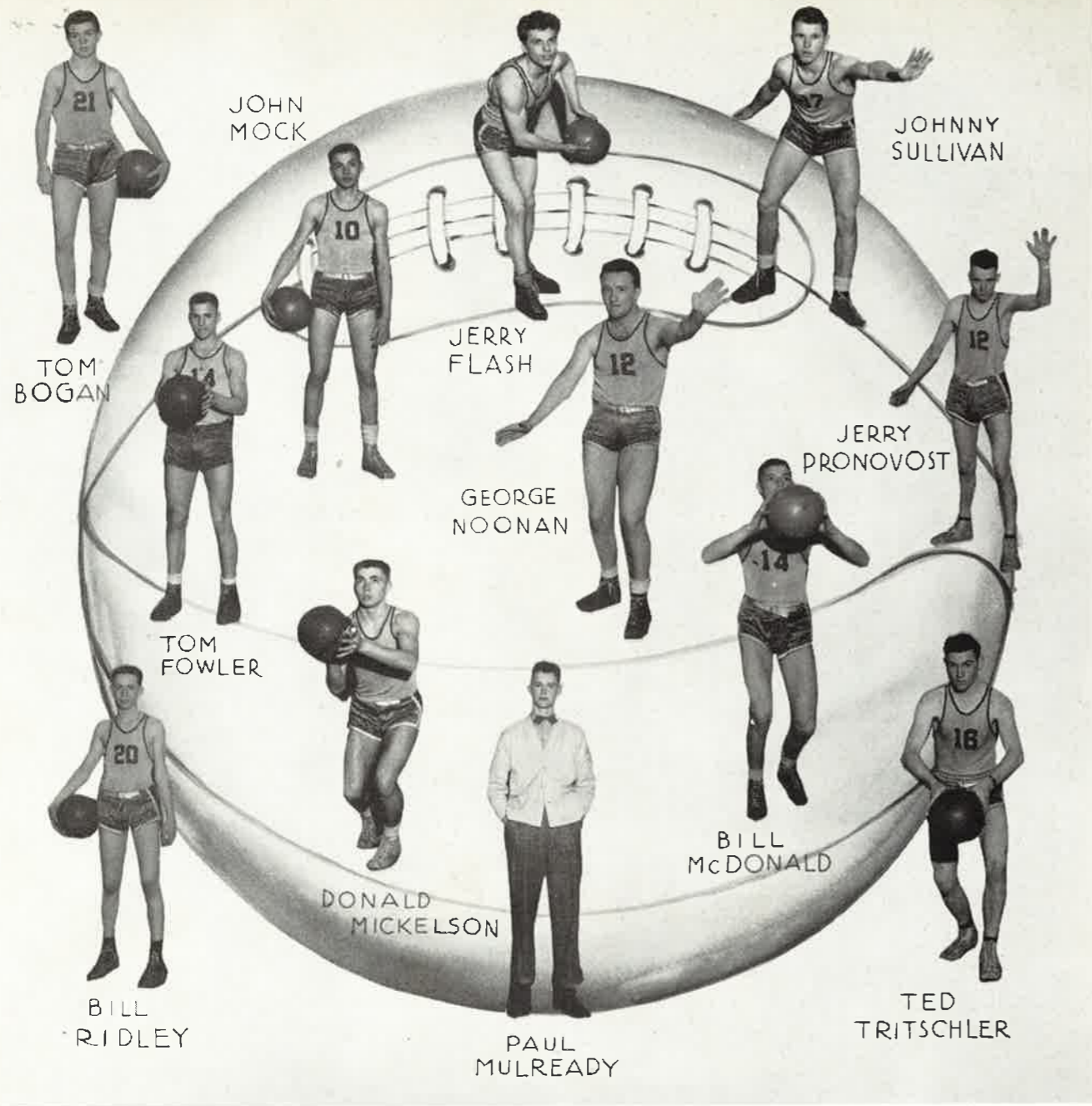
