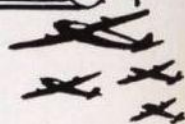




Dedication

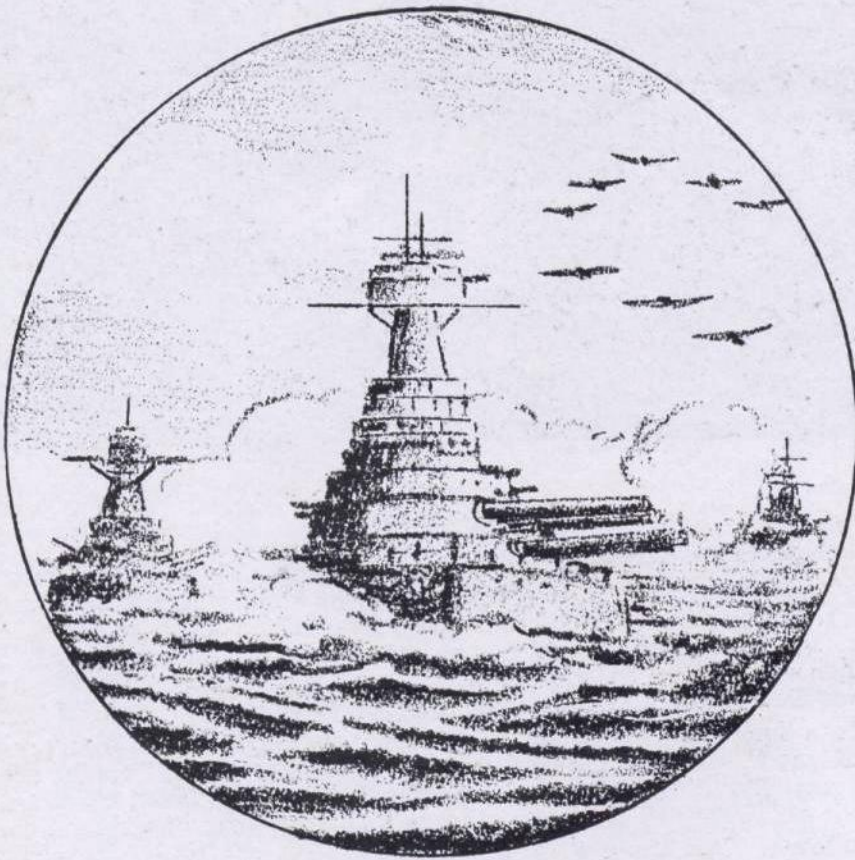

Shack

To help publicize the doings of their religion club and to make some money to aid missionaries, a group of boys under the direction of Father Thomas Hendrickson in 1937 decided to publish a little paper. They named it "Shack". The first three letters are initials for S.H.A. The "C" then stood for club, the "K" for kernels. In other words, the name signified kernels of news about their club.

It's a long story from that first hectographed sheet to the present printed paper. During the first year "Shack" was adopted as the school paper and the "C" in it's name now stands for class. Paul Clemens, as editor-in-chief, guided the paper through its first year of publication.

Following him John Saefke took the helm. At that time "Shack" came out two columns wide on glossy paper, and ads were \$1 an inch.

In '38-'39 Audrey Lucier became the first woman editor, and "Shack" was enlarged to its present width of five columns. Father George Mehok succeeded Father Hendrickson as advisor.

"Shack's" first co-editors, Betty Lamb and Bill Durkin, carried on in '39-'40. Allan Nilles succeeded them the following year.

Head of the '41-'42 "Shack" was Mary Hablas. This year's publication is under the direction of Yvette Martineau.

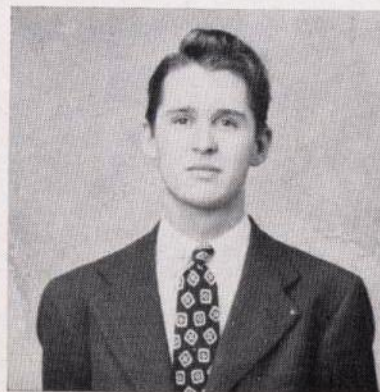

MILITARY CALISTHENICS

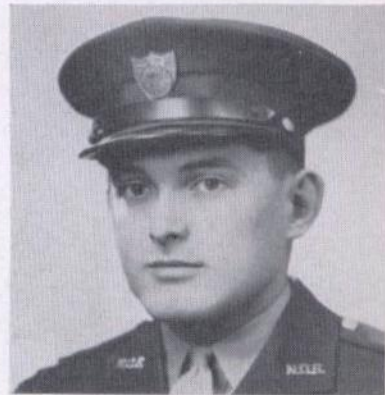

Mother's Club

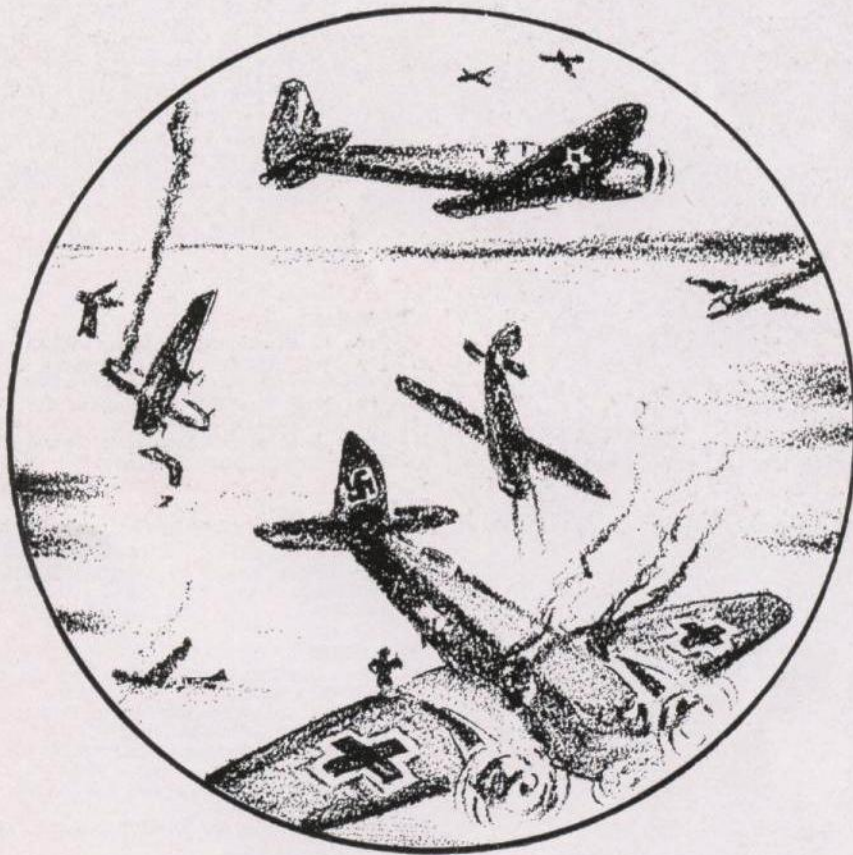
