
EXECUTIVE BOARD


Overall, the Deacons played spectacularly, continuing in the Shanley football tradition.
















I went into the season sight unseen























The Shanley Hockey Team under coaches Jim Shaw, Steve Madsen and Tad Deutsch, skated

Because only 6 golfers may compete in the high school league meets, eliminations were held before each meet at Shanley's home course, Edgewood. Every girl qualified at least once.



They lived in the homes of various Shanley students for two week periods. To learn some English, they attended classes, spending most of their time in Spanish classes.





