Seniors and Freshmen Jam at Orientation












Prayer Unites Shanley






"Catholic Schools Week Shares the Spirit"




















Prom Becomes a Black and White Blitz

Sandpebbles and Quintessence Rock the Town Musically










Five Transfer to Shanley








Golfers Stay Out of the Rough; Mayer is Champ






New Coach Wrestles with Deacon Program





Under newcomer Glenn Vetter's coaching, the Shanley wrestlers entered into the '87-88 season, grappling with more than just their opponents. The Deacons faced the problem of competing with an incomplete squad, injuries and illness among the team members, and the future of the program. However, there were many bright spots along the way. DEACONS REACH SEMIS





Class of '88 Flips Their Lids


