The Importance of Health Care in Atlantic Canada's Economy

Our health, and the state of our health care system, are important determinants of our current and future economic prosperity





Over **200,000 people** work in Atlantic Canada's health care sector



Health care accounted for over **10%** of Atlantic Canada's economic output in 2023, compared to 8% nationally

The wages generated in the health care industry in Atlantic Canada in 2024 exceeded **\$11 billion**



The health care industry created nearly **42,000 jobs** over the last decade - 30% of total job growth in the region





An average of **12,000** people did not participate in the labour force for health reasons from 2020-2024



Governments in Atlantic Canada will spend over **\$19 billion** on health care this year – 46% of total spending

The number of people aged 85+ is forecast to grow from 60,000 in 2024 to

160,000 by 2044

The prevalence of several chronic diseases is higher in Atlantic Canada than the rest of the country

The annual cost to care for someone aged 85+ in Atlantic Canada is \$35,000 - 10 times the level for someone aged 20-44



The health challenges in this region are intensified by an older population, lower fiscal capacity, and a more rural population than the rest of Canada
