





Grady Gammage Jr. is a founding member of Gammage & Burnham and a highly respected leader in Arizona's legal and public policy landscape. With more than 40 years of experience, his practice focuses on the intersection of real estate, development, zoning, water, and public policy. A sought-after speaker and author, Grady's contributions to Arizona's growth and legal community have had a wide-reaching impact. Over the course of his career, Grady has been instrumental in numerous public-private projects, including the development of Tempe Town Lake and innovative redevelopment incentive programs in Arizona. He has also worked extensively with cities and towns to revise land use ordinances and has litigated land use and election issues related to development. His work in urban development has helped shape Maricopa County's growth and policies.

In addition to his legal practice, Grady has had a profound impact on Arizona's water policy, serving on the Central Arizona Project (CAP) Board of Directors for 12 years and leading the board as president during a critical period of federal litigation. His leadership helped restructure the federal-state relationship in water rights, solidifying his reputation as one of the state's foremost authorities on water policy.

Grady has authored two books on the Phoenix metropolitan area and his expertise has made him a frequent guest on NPR, PBS, and in major media outlets, including The Economist, The Wall Street Journal, and Newsweek.




Mobile Tour | Emerald Tracks and Urban Facts: The Great and Powerful Streetcar

Experience Tempe's Streetcar and learn how innovative strategies and public art have improved the Apache Corridor and stimulated over \$200M in growth since 2022. Operating along a 3-mile guideway, Tempe's streetcar serves 14 stops in Downtown Tempe and along ASU's main campus. She is the architect of the Home Ownership Means Equity (HOME) initiative, a multi-year movement to transform the economic trajectory of Latinos through homeownership. The HOME initiative leverages policy, research, communications, and community investments to expand homeownership opportunities.

Laura has held senior positions in the private, nonprofit, and public sectors, including at Wells Fargo & Co., the Federal Housing Finance Agency (FHFA), and on Capitol Hill. She is on the boards of the Center for Responsible Lending and the National Housing Conference. She serves on the FHFA Federal Advisory Committee on Affordable, Equitable, and Sustainable Housing and the Fannie Mae Affordable Housing Advisory Committee.

Laura is a graduate of the University of California at Berkeley and holds a master's degree in urban planning from Rutgers University.

Complying with Mandated Housing Needs Projections

Description: The legislature says Arizona has about 270,000 fewer housing units than needed. To help meet this need, SB1162 requires that all cities over 30,000 people publish housing needs assessments every five years including population growth, job growth, and housing needs across various income levels. This session has four goals. First, it shows that the figure of 270,000 under-supplied housing units is vastly over-stated, though more housing is needed nonetheless. Second, it presents a method developed for the Arizona League of Cities and Towns to comply with SB 1162's projection needs. Third, it presents a regional housing demand method developed for Pima County which was used to calculate SB 1162 housing needs for its largest cities. Fourth, the session will engage the audience on what planners believe is needed to meet Arizona's housing needs.

The San Tan Valley Urban Core Zoning Journey

Bellevue Comprehensive Plan and LRTP - Bridging the Planning and Engineering Divide

Description: The City of Bellevue, Nebraska and Olsson leveraged a joint planning approach by integrating its comprehensive plan with a long-range transportation plan. This innovative, year-long process aligned land use and mobility strategies, streamlining community engagement and enhancing collaboration between planners and engineers. The result was a unified vision supported by actionable goals and a detailed implementation plan. By advancing both plans concurrently, the team bridged the gap between planning and engineering, creating a more efficient, interdisciplinary model. This presentation explores how the city's integrated approach improved outcomes, fostered practical solutions, and positioned Bellevue for successful, future-focused development.

Two Decades of Progress: Reflecting on Planning, Policy, and Implementation in Phoenix and Tucson

Take-Away: Participants will leave with a deeper understanding of the long-term impacts of planning and policy decisions in Phoenix and Tucson, including practical insights into what drives successful implementation of transit-oriented development and zoning reform. Attendees will gain valuable lessons from both achievements and setbacks, equipping them with strategies to navigate political, technical, and community challenges in their own communities as they plan for more walkable, transit-friendly, and inclusive growth.

Description: Over the past 20 years, Phoenix and Tucson have made significant strides in building more livable, connected, and equitable communities. This panel brings together planners and practitioners for a candid retrospective on the region's efforts to reshape the urban landscape through major investments in transit infrastructure, zoning reform, and the creation of more walkable, compact, and transit-oriented neighborhoods. The session will explore key initiatives—such as code overhauls to enable greater housing diversity, corridor planning to support light rail and bus rapid transit, and long-range planning efforts that engage large swaths of the community in planning the future of their city. Panelists will examine what has worked well, what has fallen short, and the lessons learned along the way. Attendees will gain insights into the challenges of implementation, the importance of sustained political and community support, and the evolving role of planning in addressing growth, affordability, and climate resilience. This session is designed for practitioners, advocates, and students seeking a grounded, real-world look at how long-term planning vision translates (or doesn't) into outcomes on the ground—and what the next two decades might hold.
