
#### **Better together**

### 1.Who are we?

Founded in 1909, the Canadian Association of Fire Chiefs (CAFC) is an independent, non-profit organization representing approximately 3,200 fire departments across Canada. CAFC's Mission is to advance safe, effective, and sustainable fire and emergency services across Canada. CAFC's Vision is to see Canada's fire and emergency management leaders united in service of public health and safety.





# 2. What's Needed?

# A. Canada Needs a National Fire Administration (NFA) to Coordinate Fire and Life Safety Issues



Consider ... What do we mean by a national fire administration?

A coordinating office which liaises nationally between local fire departments and federal departments as well as with provincial and territorial governments and agencies, non-governmental associations, insurers and other bodies. Its purpose is bidirectional communication and coordination with fire departments which are often authorities having jurisdiction in an emergency and/or who are in a position to advise on the fire and emergency implications of federal policy proposals and decisions.



Consider ... Why do we need a national fire administration?

FEDERAL PRIORITY	FIRE DEPARTMENT CONSIDERATIONS	WHY IS NFA IMPORTANT?
Housing: Canada needs to build 3-5M new housing units by 2030	<b>69%</b> of cities are experiencing rapid <b>new housing</b> construction, but only <b>17%</b> have <b>new fire resources</b>	Ensure building code proposals like "single egress" (federal budget) don't exacerbate safety issues.
Affordability: Keep home insurance rates affordable	47% of fire departments concerned about losing fire protection rating due to old equipment. Insurance losses from 4 climate events (\$7.7B) exceeded all fire department budgets for 2M calls (\$6.1B).	Coordinate measures to maintain fire protection ratings so insurance rates and losses don't increase.
Wildfire: Reduce catastrophic losses	90% of fire departments engage in wildfire response. 51% of fire departments need equipment. 80% have no Fire Smart™ resources.  Improve local-provincial-federa coordination/information gaps	
Civilian emergency response: being considered to help in emergency	<b>60%</b> of urban fire departments serve as <b>authorities having jurisdiction</b> in an emergency. <b>71%</b> of firefighters are volunteers, 20% are already cross appointed to other emergency agencies.	Facilitate coordination nationally between civilian response organizations, fire departments and governments.
<b>Explosives:</b> NRCAN looks after Explosives Act, which includes fireworks	500+ communities responded to <b>firework calls</b> 50% have bylaws against sale/use to consumers  Federal Explosives Act underm local bylaws by permitting sale without appreciating implication	
Electric vehicles: 100% of new vehicles electric by 2035.	<b>400+</b> communities responded to lithium-ion battery fires which power electric vehicles (EV)	Lithium-ion battery fires are different than traditional fires
Federal responsibility for fire in Indigenous Communities*	Indigenous people are <b>10X</b> more likely to experience death by fire	Ensure fire operations managed by Indigenous fire leaders*

### B. Canada Needs a Modernized Version of the Joint Emergency Preparedness Program (JEPP+)

8	Consider Why Canada needs a JEPP+?	Did you know?
<b>~</b>	Incent renewal of fire and emergency preparedness equipment	of fire departments have deferred essential equipment purchases, including fire trucks, personal protective equipment, etc.
<b>~</b>	Prepare for wildfire seasons	of fire departments received no equipment from the federal flow of wildfire equipment funds to provinces
<b>~</b>	Stabilize fire protection rating for house insurance affordability and save structures	of fire departments indicate the age of their equipment may compromise their community fire protection rating (insurance costs
<b>~</b>	Optimize commitments to firefighter cancer framework	of fire departments have no designated equipment for cleaning toxic chemicals from personal protective clothing or are using gear over 10 year old
<b>~</b>	Ensure that women firefighters are protected during fire and emergency	women firefighters may be using personal protective equipment designed for men

Preparedness Program differ from the former?

Consider ... Why is the federal government being asked to participate in local fire equipment purchases?

**Maximum flexibility** to accommodate the variation in needs across the country, funding would be available **prior to purchase**, and contingent on **matching funds** from other levels of government.

The JEPP would stimulate **matching funds** from other levels of government to create an **economy of effort** and more effectively address a **national problem** in fire and emergency equipment.

**?** Consider ... How much would it cost?

The former JEPP was funded at \$5M per year. A good starting point today may be **\$10M**, but **any amount** matched by other levels of government would be a **step forward**.
