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Chicago Wilderness Recognizes Excellence in Conservation Leadership

19 organizations honored for habitat restoration efforts in the Chicago region

Chicago, IL—On **November 6, 2013**, Chicago Wilderness honored 19 organizations for their exceptional work to restore the region's natural areas to benefit both people and nature at its inaugural *Celebrating Nature* benefit. Celebrating Nature brought together conservation and civic leaders from across the region to celebrate organizations that achieved the **Excellence in Ecological Restoration accreditation** and **Conservation and Native Landscaping award**.

"As a regional alliance of more than 300 organizations dedicated to protecting and restoring our natural areas, it is essential that we recognize and promote excellence in habitat restoration and natural resource preservation," said **Melinda Pruett-Jones, Executive Director of Chicago Wilderness**. "We are proud to honor these organizations for their achievements; their projects serve as a terrific example of what conservation organizations, corporate partners, community groups and others can do to advance biodiversity recovery efforts in the Chicago Wilderness region."

The newly-launched **Excellence in Ecological Restoration Program (EERP)**, sponsored by ArcelorMittal, was developed to recognize large, high-quality restoration sites and the organizations that manage them. Through the EERP, organizations conduct comprehensive self-assessments of their natural resource management programs and the quality of the natural areas being accredited; the assessments are based on a set of rigorous, science-based standards that recognize best management practices in natural resource management. Sites are evaluated in five categories:

- 1. Landscape context and site features
- 2. Management practices
- 3. Threat assessment and action plan
- 4. Collaboration and resources
- 5. Organizational programs, practices, policies and procedures

The Chicago Wilderness Commission on Excellence in Ecological Restoration reviews the assessments and determines the level of site certification. Site accreditation, which lasts for five years, is awarded at four levels based on a 100-point system: Bronze (50%), Silver (65%), Gold (75%) and Platinum (85%). A score that achieves any level of accreditation is a demonstration of excellence in the use of best restoration and management practices.

"The natural areas and organizations accredited through the EERP are important elements of our shared heritage and landscape," says **Elizabeth S. Kessler, Executive Director of the McHenry County Conservation District** and Co-Chair of the Excellence in Ecological Restoration Commission. "These sites provide habitat for native plants and animals, and they are tremendous assets to the local communities and to our region as a whole."
