

Keynote Speaker

Camara P. Jones, MD, MPH, PhD
President, American Public Health Association



Camara P. Jones, MD, MPH, PhD, is a research director on social determinants of health and equity in the Division of Adult and Community Health, National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion, and President of the American Public Health Association (APHA).

Dr. Jones is a family physician and epidemiologist whose work focuses on the impact of racism on the health and well-being of the nation. She seeks to broaden the national health debate to include not only universal access to high quality health care but also attention to the social determinants of health (including poverty) and the social determinants of inequity (including racism).

Afternoon Panel

Opioid abuse has hit record levels in the United States, with drug overdose deaths quadrupling over the last 15 years. According to the Centers for Disease Control, Connecticut is experiencing a death rate for drug and opioid overdoses that surpasses the national rate and has reached epidemic proportions.

Senator Chris Murphy has been invited to sit on a panel of policymakers, research scientists, and overdose prevention advocates to tackle the conversation on the opioid epidemic and provide insight what is being done at the local, state, and federal level to better understand opioid abuse and reduce exposure in the community. Explore how advocates are working hard to improve community efforts to prevent dependence and improve overdose outcomes.
