COURSE OVERVIEW AND INTENDED AUDIENCE

The meeting is attended by clinicians and researchers from a variety of disciplines, including gastroenterology, neurology, otolaryngology, radiology, speech-language pathology, nutrition, biomedical engineering, dentistry, pediatrics, psychology, nursing and basic sciences. The course provides an excellent opportunity for clinicians to gain understanding of the scientific bases for the treatment selection and implementation. The conference includes a number of symposia aimed at providing comprehensive and objective coverage of topics of interest to researchers and clinicians in the form of focused lectures, original research paper presentations and poster presentations.

COURSE FORMAT

A series of lectures, panel discussions, and oral and poster presentations of submitted scientific abstracts will be provided.

- Recognize and make decisions based on key nutrition issues in patients in the NICU and PICU
- Understand appropriate criteria for weaning off of tube feedings for neonates and young pediatric patients
- Describe new findings in neonatal pharyngoesophageal motility and how this translates into advances in neonatal and pediatric feeding
- Identify the differing presentation, diagnostic criteria and determine appropriate management strategies in pediatric and adults with eosinophilic esophagitis
- Describe and understand how eosinophilic esophagitis impacts the airway and how this complicates pediatric airway surgery
- Identify the multi-factorial nature of chronic cough and identify the key factors in the evaluation and management of these patients
- Distinguish between behavioral and organic causes of chronic cough and describe how a speech-language pathologist can positively impact the treatment of both categories of patients


Annual Meeting Objectives:

- Recognize the controversies with the clinical bedside swallowing examination and understand its role in the evaluation of many hospitalized patients
- Determine when the clinical bedside swallowing examination assists in diet determination and when it does not
- Develop their own oral presentation style with various types of proper slide formatting and organization suitable for scientific presentations
- Describe the development of simultaneous manoflourography and reflect on how it may affect our understanding of swallowing in the future
- Understand the concepts behind the development of various mechanical swallowing devices and recognize the important role these may play in both research and the rehabilitation of chronic dysphagia patients
- Identify the role of sensory pathways in the head and neck and understand how they relate to normal swallowing and various protective mechanisms involved in the interplay between respiration and swallowing
- Understand the limitations and applicability of animal models and how animal research relates to human clinical dysphagia care
- Describe the role of clinical investigators in mentoring the next generation of researchers

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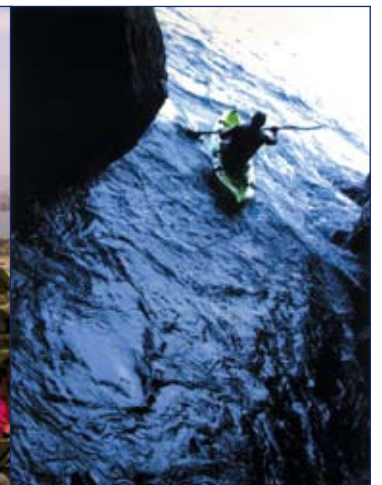

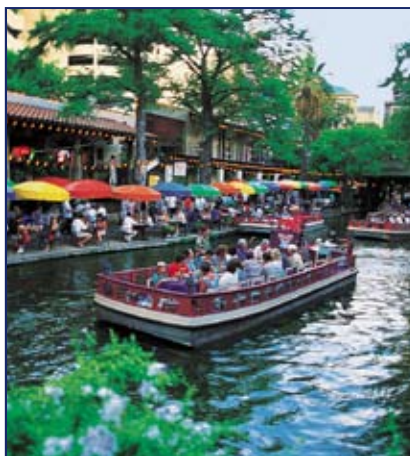
