

## Introduction

This report outlines ELIA's work and achievements over 2023 and 2024, including the final months of 2022. Reflecting on this period, we are grateful for the energy and passion our members have invested amidst significant challenges and uncertainties.

The year 2023 was significant for several reasons, marked by the <u>ELIA Academy</u> at the University of Évora School of the Arts and the <u>Leadership Symposium</u> at Manchester Metropolitan University, Manchester School of Art. We also celebrated a record-breaking <u>ELIA Biennial Conference</u> hosted by the University of the Arts, Helsinki in November 2022. Our 2024 events include the <u>ELIA Biennial</u> at Nuova Accademia di Belle Arti (NABA) in Milan. We extend our gratitude to all our host institutions for their support in hosting these landmark signature events. Many other member institutions hosted smaller events which are acknowledged throughout this report.

Over the past two years, ELIA has advanced its 2020–2024 strategic priorities, focusing on equity, diversity, inclusivity (EDI), global engagement, research, skills and generationality, among other topics. In 2023, we achieved eco-certification, joining 15 cultural networks in Europe, and are finalising a comprehensive set of operational EDI policies.

As we near the end of our strategic period in 2024, we are

crafting a new 10-year vision for ELIA with extensive member input. This effort was highlighted at the Manchester Leadership Symposium and aims to clarify ELIA's values and strategic missions, while allocating resources effectively.

ELIA's membership continues to grow, enhancing our network's diversity and relevance. This expansion has strengthened a diverse community informed by each institution, promoting strategic and professional development. By being involved in several EU-funded initiatives and projects of utmost importance, especially in the area of the Cultural and Creative Sectors and Industries (CCSI), ELIA continues to ensure that the higher arts education community is deeply integrated into these cross-sectoral, sector-changing trajectories.

As the development of ELIA's new strategic vision nears its completion, ELIA confirms its commitment to responsible impact on a wider scale, in addition to our network's core activities related to arts education, research and creative futures.


The <u>UAx Platform</u>, supported by the Abakanowicz Arts and Culture Charitable Foundation, supports arts education in conflict zones, particularly with the ongoing conflict in Ukraine.

Our response to the humanitarian crisis in Gaza and the

violations of human rights and international law in Palestine and Israel, guided by member feedback, highlights our dedication to addressing pressing humanitarian issues.

ELIA's success over these years is due to the tireless efforts of our members as well as the dedication of the ELIA Team. As we close this chapter, we look forward to continuing our collaborative journey, shaping a resilient and dynamic future for the higher arts education sector together.




## **Strategic Focus**



ELIA (The European League of Institutes of the Arts) is a globally connected European network for higher arts education. A 294-strong member community in 53 countries, representing approximately 350,000 students across all arts disciplines, ELIA provides an invaluable platform for knowledge exchange, discovery, and research. ELIA advocates for higher arts education by empowering and creating new opportunities for its members, facilitating professional development, and the sharing of good practices. ELIA achieves its goals by organising events of various scales, such as the ELIA Biennial Conference, ELIA Academy, ELIA Leadership Symposium, platform meetings, and regional events. The organisation also forms cross-membership connections to advance knowledge, participates in research projects, and produces policy papers addressing current issues.

In these endeavours, ELIA collaborates with partner networks around the world, bringing together the knowledge and networking capacity of many discipline-specific organisations. ELIA values the power of community and the generative quality of diverse perspectives. We strive to create and facilitate brave and safe spaces that encourage active engagement throughout our membership.

Recognising the importance of connection, ELIA aims to inspire authentic dialogue that enables professionals at every level in the field of higher arts education to reach their full potential to





#### **Our Mission**

ELIA's principal mission is to represent higher arts education across all disciplines and to be an influential voice that advocates and promotes the interests of its members throughout Europe and worldwide. In placing emphasis on the value of arts education and artist research, ELIA is dedicated to enhancing the conditions in which higher arts education can flourish, both nationally and internationally.

#### **Strategic Focus**

ELIA's Strategic Focus 2020–2024 was approved at the (online) General Assembly on 24 November 2020. These strategic priorities have guided ELIA's activities in the past two years. ## Spotlight on...



The First EDI Platform Meeting

The inaugural <u>ELIA Equity</u>, <u>Diversity</u>, and <u>Inclusivity</u> (<u>EDI</u>) <u>Platform Meeting</u> took place on 15–16 April 2024 at the <u>Nida Art</u> <u>Colony</u> of the <u>Vilnius Academy of Arts</u> in Lithuania. This event brought together ELIA members from various artistic disciplines to address equity, diversity, and inclusivity in higher arts education.

Under the theme 'Taking Space – Making Space', participants explored who has historically taken space, who has been denied it, and who is creating space today. They discussed how faculty, artists, administrative and technical staff, and students navigate and situate themselves within art academies, highlighting how our navigation of spaces is connected to power structures and societal agreements, shaping our movements and interactions.

Set against the backdrop of the Curonian Spit, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, the event featured an interactive programme examining the physical and sociopolitical dimensions of space. With the contribution of Aminata Cairo guiding discussions on identity, belonging, and community, the EDI Platform Meeting was not merely a gathering but a journey of self-reflection, dialogue, and unity, resonating with all.

The Beginning of Now in Manchester

It is always an exciting and sometimes daunting challenge for ELIA signature event hosts, event steering groups, and the ELIA Team to conceptualise groundbreaking themes for the ELIA Leadership Symposium. However, for the 2023 edition, the team at Manchester Metropolitan University, Manchester School of Art, had a clear vision for 'The Beginning of Now', an event that would establish positive ways forward for the higher arts education community. Instead of adopting a traditional speaker or keynote format, curious and inquisitive minds were invited to provoke the audience. These provocateurs included Ogutu Muraya, eunice bélidor, and Sameed Rezayan, among others.

Each questioned the participants' positions, pushing buttons to encourage them to confront the topics head-on. This format inspired deep and reflective conversations while at the same allowing for mischief and humour, as well as truth-telling and self-evaluation.

We are indebted to our hosts in Manchester for their creative handling of this format and event, another first for the ELIA community.

We Left No Stone Unturned at ELIA Biennial 2022

In 2022 the ELIA community regrouped in the wake of the global pandemic that was Covid-19. As the ELIA Biennial prepared for its first in-person event after an online hiatus, the steering group met in Finland at the invitation of our hosts, University of the Arts Helsinki.

At this time, arts institutions, leaders, and educators were under intense pressure. Students were dealing with increased anxiety, social disillusionment, and a growing appetite for change. Lecturers were adjusting to new teaching frameworks and processes while dealing with increased criticism and confrontation on pertinent issues that had been lying dormant. Tensions were running high, and the ELIA Biennial Steering Group correctly gauged that the Biennial could be the safe and brave space for people with diverse views and perspectives to connect, collaborate, and occupy space.

Under the theme 'No Stone Unturned', ELIA
Biennial 2022 sought to create an open,
exploratory space for all. A place where
the unique complexities facing higher arts
education at that time could be picked up,
turned over, and closely examined to see what
lay beneath. We wanted to look at all sides,
from all angles. Run our fingers down the
cracks, study the joins, take the rough with
the smooth, and discover those hidden gems.

With over 50 speakers and 500 attendees, the ELIA Biennial succeeded in its aims to create an open and welcoming space. This was also the first time the ELIA UAx members and their sister schools met in person. Biennial participants shared their experiences, leaned into close conversation with international colleagues, and took comfort, strength, and support from each other.

## CYANOTYPES & SACCORD Project + CSW 2023/24/25

ELIA is playing a significant role in the cultural and creative sector's Blueprint Project, CYANOTYPES, which addresses critical skills needs in the Cultural and Creative Sectors and Industries (CCSI) ecosystems. Launched in 2022 in Utrecht, this pan-European project focuses on creating innovative skills clusters and a training the trainer framework to meet the sector's evolving needs. As a key partner, ELIA is instrumental in engaging its members and other stakeholders, disseminating outputs, and promoting events and workshops, thereby shaping the future of arts education and skills development across Europe.

ELIA is also a partner in the <u>SACCORD</u> project (combining SKILLS and ACCORDANCE), which aims to support, transfer, and foster innovation and the localisation of the Creative Skills Partnership through the <u>Creative Pact for Skills</u>. ELIA supports SACCORD's mission mainly through leading the development of <u>Creative Skills Week</u>, a groundbreaking largescale annual event, aimed at building and strengthening the creative skills community, fostering collaboration, and communicating information and updates on skills intelligence, new policies, and trends.

In October 2023 the first <u>Creative Skills</u>

Week in Vienna, Austria, highlighted urgent and future CCSI skills needs. Creative Skills

Week 2023 was powered by CYANOTYPES and the European Creative Hubs Network, in alignment with the EIT Culture & Creativity,

Vienna Centre. The second Creative Skills

Week, powered by SACCORD in association with CYANOTYPES, and with the support of the City of Amsterdam and EIT Culture &

Creativity, was held in September 2024 in Amsterdam, Netherlands. During this event, CYANOTYPES presented the Creative Agency Clusters, built around five groundbreaking competency clusters that can be applied to any creative field. This framework aims to transform the way we think about education and equip learners of any age with competencies that will enhance their agency across a variety of contexts. Read more here.

Looking ahead, CYANOTYPES will continue until Autumn 2026, with upcoming milestones including a Call for Pilots in February 2025, a training for educators and learners at the third Creative Skills Week (2025), and the finalisation of the Train-the-Trainer Framework.

Creative Skills Week 2025 will take place in Prague as a collaborative initiative again between SACCORD and CYANOTYPES, as well as other partners wishing to join the shared goal of strengthening the CCSI and enhancing collaboration.

CYANOTYPES is part of Alliances for Sectoral Cooperation on Skills, co-funded by the European Commission Erasmus+ Programme. SACCORD is co-funded by the Erasmus+ Forward-Looking Project Scheme and supports the development of the Creative Pact for Skills.



## **Higher Arts Education Responding** to Crisis

Since October 2023, the ELIA community has been deeply shaken by the atrocities committed in Israel and Palestine, and the ongoing humanitarian crisis in Gaza. Not only were ELIA members in the region affected, but many heated debates and protests in higher arts education institutions took place across Europe and globally.

Reaffirming ELIA's position as an advocate for freedom, peace, and human rights, ELIA seeks to find ways to support the higher arts education community through this crisis.

Ongoing dialogue and knowledge exchange have been crucial in this process, which led to three statements in December 2023, May 2024, and October 2024.

In 2024, ELIA launched a set of follow-up actions (currently ongoing): the <u>Dialogue</u>

<u>Series: Higher Arts Education in Times of</u>

<u>Conflict</u>, the <u>Online Repository: Higher Arts</u>

<u>Education Responses to the Crisis in Gaza</u>, and bilateral dialogues with institutions in the affected areas.



The world is facing numerous fundamental challenges that demand wisdom-infused solutions. The 'know-how' of expanded generations must be included if we are to survive and thrive—from the full range of humans and non-humans who are physically present, to the generations of ancestors whom we have lost, to the unborn to whom we owe everything. How do we look back while looking ahead? How do we reflect and repair and feel joy in an uncertain present? We fear future pandemics, climate emergencies, global conflicts, digital disinformation, refugee crises, and pervasive loneliness.

With mistrust in core institutions, including higher education, at an all-time high, we must change the status quo to include all voices in shaping a better future. ELIA is dedicated to pioneering new generational approaches and expanding our understanding of 'generationality'. ELIA's Supporting Members have identified the art school as a special place for generational dialogues, and the same

could be true for ELIA. In 2023, we started to explore what a sustainable generational dynamic could mean for ELIA and how it might shape the organisation's work. After a conceptual overview was presented to the ELIA Supporting Members, Representative Board, and ELIA Team, we are now poised to move generational thinking outwards by looking at how higher arts education might change from within. This four-year project builds on learnings from the Agents of Transformation Series and the CrAft Project, and will involve several initiatives backed by our Supporting Members. One of these is our call for contributions—an open invitation to students from ELIA member institutions to present their work at the ELIA Biennial in Milan. These proposals have been peer-reviewed, and we look forward to their input and collaboration.

#### Student Showcase

In 2023, ELIA launched a call for all member institutions to submit works of art created by their students. The call welcomed a diverse range of submissions, from paintings, photography, performing arts, and documentation of artistic practices to fashion, drawings, and architectural plans. What emerged became the basis for ELIA's Student Showcase 2023, which featured hundreds of submitted works from more than 40 institutions.

This showcase provided a platform for students to exhibit their projects, allowing different members the chance to explore the works emerging from their peer institutions. These inspiring works received additional attention through ELIA's newsletters and social media platforms.

Given the success of the Student Showcase, ELIA is following up the series with the Emerging Artists Showcase 2024, which is already underway and attracting even more participants. As a member organisation for higher arts education around the world, we are proud to showcase works by emerging artists who we believe will shape and influence the art world for years to come.




#### Introduction

## **Eco-Responsibility** at ELIA

ELIA acknowledges the detrimental and dangerous impact that current human activities have on the planet and its ecosystems. The continuous extraction of resources, toxic waste dumping, and unmitigated carbon emissions freely flowing into our atmosphere all threaten the delicate balance of Earth's ecology. There is an urgent need to take moral and ethical responsibility for the long-term protection and care of our planet for generations to come. This begins with actively transforming organisational practices, systems of governance, economic paradigms, and educational frameworks.

The building blocks developed in the past two years provide a solid foundation to continue working on improving our ecoresponsibility in the coming years and creating even more platforms for exchange for our members. Indeed, implementing environmental responsibility transversally in the organisation is an ongoing and evolving process of change. It also builds on the previously published SHIFT Eco-Guidelines for Cultural Networks, which ELIA had a key role in creating in 2022.

The eco-certification is a wonderful tool helping to hold ourselves accountable to our eco-responsibility commitment. The certification is awarded following a third-party audit where we must share evidence of the implementation of a variety of measures to promote ecological responsibility. Apart from setting up the fundamentals (such as the governance and policy documents on this page) there have been three particularly important areas of action: dissemination and raising awareness, events, and travel. Some of the figures from 2023 have been collected on the next pages.

**ELIA's Eco-Responsibility Facts and Figures:** Since 2023, ELIA is getting eco-certified on a yearly basis.



- Became one of the first SHIFT Eco-Certified Networks, following an independent audit
- Published the ELIA Eco-Policy
- Set up an internal Green Team and created and implemented an Environmental Responsibility Action Plan
- Created and implemented <u>Guidelines for Eco-Responsible</u> Travel
- Set up the Arts & Ecology Working Group, which will spearhead the new Arts & Ecology Community Hub starting in 2025
- Created dialogue and exchange on eco-topics at its events, while raising awareness through its communication channels
- Took a leadership role in cooperating with other international cultural networks engaged in SHIFT to create collective change, most notably collaborating with its certification buddy, ECHO (European Concert Hall Organisation).

ELIA Biennial Conference 2022: NO STONE UNTURNED aimed to create an open, exploratory space for all. It was a place where the unique complexities and current dilemmas of the higher arts education sector could be picked up, turned over, and closely examined to see what lay beneath.

Hosted by the <u>University of the Arts Helsinki</u>, it fostered dialogue to grow resilient ecosystems that meet the needs of humanity, the environment, the arts, and social justice. Social entrepreneur Ama van Dantzig opened with a keynote on bridging education with reality, including its climate and people. The conference featured a hybrid programme of plenaries, workshops, presentations, and cultural events, welcoming both in-person and online participants. Concert pianist Sara Davis Buechner concluded the conference, stressing the urgent need for arts educators to elevate student aspirations towards a healthier, more equitable world. She emphasised the artist's and educator's duty to share stories, communicate, and encourage creativity.



The ELIA Leadership Symposium 2023: The Beginning of Now was hosted by Manchester School of Art, Manchester Metropolitan University (MMU).

Bringing together global thinkers, arts education leaders, researchers, policymakers, changemakers, and strategists, this symposium aimed to immerse participants in Manchester's rich tradition of radicalism. Over three days, attendees were invited to provoke, stimulate, experiment, and exchange ideas centred on the theme of global urgencies. Their active engagement contributed to shaping the Manchester Provocation, a powerful call to action co-created by participants and MMU students. The

event delved into new political ideologies, leadership theories, and alternative models, while encouraging active involvement in shaping ELIA's future strategic priorities.

The ELIA Leadership Symposium featured the first edition of the <u>Satellite Events</u>, a programme designed to create an inclusive opportunity for ELIA global members to be actively involved in and participate in the main programme. Arts education institutions in Kenya, Canada, the United States, Colombia, Singapore, Hong Kong, and Egypt hosted these events, which were spread over three days and eight different time zones.

ELIA remains steadfast in its commitment to diversity and inclusion, rejecting racism, and systemic discrimination based on gender, sexuality, religion, race, class, ethnicity, age, and ability—categories that unfortunately are prevalent in our societies and thus influence our education institutions.

The ELIA Equity, Diversity and Inclusivity (EDI)
Working Group, guided by chair Cecilia Roos,
Professor in Artistic Practice at Stockholm
University of the Arts, has the strategic
focus 'Excellence through Diversities: Equal
Opportunities and Inclusivity'. The working
group aims to promote good practices,
strategies, and initiatives that help ELIA
members to:

- Address equity, diversity, and inclusivity within their institutions
- Raise awareness among leadership, staff, and students
- Connect to other relevant organisations and parties addressing EDI
- Help ELIA raise its voice against discrimination in the Higher Arts Education (HAE) sector



In October 2024, the ELIA Equity Diversity and Inclusivity policy was approved by the ELIA Representative Board. This policy outlines ELIA's approach to EDI within the organisation and across all aspects of its work. As such, it introduces a set of additional policies: the ELIA Internal Anti-Harassment and Discrimination Policy, the ELIA Event Anti-Harassment Policy, the ELIA EDI Event Guidelines, the ELIA EDI Communications Guidelines, the ELIA Recruitment Process. and the ELIA Development Review Process, all of which will be published in 2024. To highlight the importance of ensuring gender balance and acknowledging the EU's Gender Equality Strategy 2020-2025, ELIA has also published a separate Statement on Gender Equity, Diversity, and Inclusivity and the ELIA Development Review Process, all of which will be published by the end of 2024.

#### **ARTISTIC RESEARCH**

The Artistic Research Working Group and Platform support the development of the field of research in and through the arts by creating opportunities for professional exchange and peer learning. Building on the Florence Principles and the Vienna Declaration on Artistic Research, they also explore ways to strengthen international collaboration to increase the recognition of Artistic Research at both European and global levels. Between 2022 and 2024, they engaged in a collaborative campaign with partner networks to propose changes to the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development's (OECD) Frascati Manual (see advocacy on page 43).

Recurring platform meetings organised by the working group stimulate sector-wide conversations. Two in-person platform meetings were scheduled for 2022 and 2024, integrated into the framework of the ELIA Biennial Conferences. In Helsinki in November 2022, the platform discussed collaborative advocacy efforts around the OECD's Frascati Manual and kick-started a discussion on Open Research paradigms. This discussion continued in 2024 through the series of online platform events, 'Towards a Manifesto for Critical Openness in Artistic Research'. The platform meeting in Milan in November 2024 will be a key milestone, bringing together insights from these discussions on open research. It will also explore how to create better synergies between international and national advocacy efforts on the recognition of artistic research and the need for supporting frameworks, using the Italian context as a case study.

#### **ETHO**

Organisation) has been actively advancing its mission to support technical staff across European arts and design institutions.

Its mission is to empower professionals in technical services and education from all disciplines to exchange, innovate, and collaborate in addressing new challenges in higher arts education.

The ETHO Community Conference 2023 took place in London on 22–24 February 2023, hosted by the Royal College of Art (RCA). Several ELIA members in London and surrounding areas participated in this event, hosting mobile sessions and technical visits (Kingston School of Art, London South Bank University, Middlesex University, Staffordshire University London, University of the Arts London, University for the Creative Arts, Farnham Campus). The ETHO Community Conference was considered a major success, with more than 160 in-person participants and a large online audience.

The ETHO Core Group was highly active in 2023, holding several strategic meetings to shape the future of the technical community in ELIA. ETHO developed a long-term strategy and workplan for its platform and has developed a new governance process to ensure the future sustainability and diversity of the Core Group.



The Core Group holds monthly sessions to delve deeper into specific aspects of their work. These meetings are essential for discussing and developing the content of the platform with a larger community beyond the Core Group.

In 2024 the ETHO Leadership Meeting took place in Prague, hosted by <u>UMPRUM</u> on 18 and 19 April. A collaboration with UAx has been established to provide a support system for the technical staff of Ukrainian member institutions.

ETHO will also host a session at the ELIA Biennial Conference 2024 in Milan.

The ETHO Technical Community Conference is in development and will take place 19–21 March 2025 in Riga, hosted by RISEBA University of Applied Sciences.

#### PIE - PLATFORM FOR INTERNATIONALISATION ELIA

Following the success of the PIE session at the ELIA Biennial Conference in Helsinki, the working group immediately started planning the <u>PIE Annual Meeting 2024</u>, which was co-hosted by the <u>Academy of Fine Arts in Prague</u> and the <u>Academy of Performing Arts in Prague</u>.

The event took place in Prague on 5–7 June 2024 and reached maximum capacity. The event explored the paradoxes of internationalisation, focusing on matters related to the health and well-being of staff and students, the impact of geopolitical concerns on internationalisation, and challenges faced by institutions experiencing conflicts with students.





The PIE Annual Meeting in Prague was considered a success and showed how internationalisation in higher arts education is taking a more central role in the institutions.

PIE will be hosting a session at the ELIA Biennial Conference in Milan.

The 2025 PIE Annual Meeting will be hosted by <u>Llotja Art School</u> and <u>ESDAPC</u> (Escola Superior de Disseny i d'Arts Plàstiques de Catalunya) in Barcelona, Catalonia, Spain, on 4–6 June 2025.



#### **ARTS IN EDUCATION**

The Arts in Education Working Group and Platform engage with the ELIA community and relevant stakeholders on three focus areas: connecting arts education at the primary and secondary levels across Europe, life-long learning in the arts, and teacher training.

The working group curated two platform events, one during the ELIA Biennial Conference 2022 in Helsinki, and another during the Biennial Conference 2024 in Milan. The first Arts in Education Platform Meeting explored and discussed the implementation of innovative learning processes in arts teaching, such as peer-learning and deep interactivity. For the second session, the working group teamed up with colleagues from the European

Collaboration of Creative Institutes for Transition Education (ECCITE) project to focus on the gap between secondary education and higher arts education.

The working group also co-curated the online session 'Creative Education Manifesto. A UK case study on launching a movement for creative arts education'. This open session, a collaboration between ELIA, CHEAD, and AICAD, discussed pathways for advocating for arts education, inspired by a successful campaign based in the United Kingdom.


#### **ARTS & ECOLOGY**

The Arts & Ecology Working Group is being established to support the implementation of <u>ELIA's Eco-Policy</u>, <u>Environmental Responsibility Action Plan</u>, and the strategic priority of Achieving Ecological Responsibility and the Green Shift. Its primary mission is to advance eco-responsibility within the higher arts education sector and beyond by preparing, curating, and facilitating peer exchange opportunities, networking, and content creation, such as policy papers.

A central focus of the working group is to enable ELIA members to share best practices, learnings, and experiences on climate action, ensuring ongoing dialogue and collaboration across the network. The group will concentrate on two key areas: climate action, including climate change mitigation and adaptation strategies within higher arts education institutions, and the integration of green skills, competencies, and ecocritical thinking into curricula and arts education practices. Through these initiatives, the working group aims to raise awareness and inspire change within arts education to better address environmental challenges.







The <u>UAx Platform</u> was launched in November 2022 by ELIA with the support of the <u>Abakanowicz Arts and Culture Charitable</u> <u>Foundation</u> (AACCF). Operating over a three-year period from 2022 to 2025, the platform not only supports Ukrainian arts students and their institutions but also aims to serve as a global model for other crisis-affected higher arts education communities.

#### **Achievements and Milestones**

Managed by ELIA's UAx Bureau and guided by the UAx Steering Group, the platform focuses on several core objectives: strengthening the resilience of Ukrainian higher arts education, supporting war-affected arts students, and fostering the integration of Ukrainian institutions within the European arts education community.

Partnerships with Sister Schools: The UAx Platform has successfully established partnerships with ten sister school institutions annually (five from Ukraine and five existing ELIA members). See the list of schools <a href="here">here</a>.



Abakanowicz Fellowships and

Bursaries: Each year, 30 students from selected Ukrainian arts universities are awarded Abakanowicz Fellowships, with a total of 90 fellows expected by 2025. Annually, €60,000 is distributed in bursaries (€2,000 per student), totalling €180,000 by 2025. the war.

Mentorship Programme: The UAx Platform has matched over 12 mentors from non-Ukrainian sister schools with Abakanowicz Fellows each year.

UAx Days and ELIA Events: Since its inception, the UAx Platform has organised three UAx Days and ELIA events.

*UAx School Visits*: Two <u>school visits</u> took place in 2023, with future visits in 2024 and 2025 currently being planned.

Knowledge Exchange Events: The platform hosted two significant knowledge exchange events in 2023 and 2024, including the Artistic Research Symposium and the Art Hives Training Programme.



Student Webinars: In 2024, two webinars focused on the art market and visual arts were held for Abakanowicz Fellows.

Student Symposium: A landmark achievement was the first-ever in-person Student Symposium in June 2024, which took place in Uzhhorod and was entirely run by Abakanowicz Fellows.

Community Meetings: The UAx Platform has held ten regular community meetings, addressing pressing issues and ensuring continuous dialogue among members.

#### **Future Plans**

Looking ahead, the UAx Platform will build on its successes with plans to increase the number of events, integrate the last five Ukrainian institutions into ELIA, and continue its bursary and mentorship programme. The platform remains committed to supporting Ukrainian students and institutions, ensuring that higher arts education in Ukraine not only survives but also thrives in the years to come.

## **Projects** in Partnership



#### FAST45

FAST45, an Erasmus+ Knowledge Alliance project led by LUCA School of Arts, concluded with its final event, 'Futures (Un)Known', held in Brussels on 6 and 7 December 2023. ELIA played a key role in dissemination and contributed to all work packages, particularly the FAST45 Advocacy Agenda and Future Scenarios. The project's major outputs, including the Future Labs Guidelines, Data Map, and Policy Recommendations, were showcased and integrated into a Learning Platform. FAST45 successfully introduced future thinking and anticipatory strategies into higher arts education.

CYANOTYPES is a unique pan-European project that brings together a wide variety of organisations and European networks. It addresses the skills gaps, and imagines new competence ecosystems for the Cultural and Creative Sectors and Industries (CCSI). This Blueprint Project is funded by the Alliances for Sectoral Cooperation on Skills of the Erasmus+ Programme (European Commission).

ELIA is leading the consortium's work on communication and dissemination and is the lead organiser of Creative Skills Week, a large-scale collaborative event.

Through this project, ELIA is building a community of change that co-creates curricula and develops learning processes for diverse learners and contexts.

CYANOTYPES now enters the training piloting phase which includes sectorial and cross-sectorial pilots across Europe, and will feed into the <u>Train-the-Trainer Framework</u>. Following insights from the initial pilot phase, CYANOTYPES will seek additional pilots for the framework through an open call to be launched in February 2025.





## **Projects** in Partnership



SACCORD

The SACCORD project combines SKILLS and ACCORDANCE by collecting skills intelligence and data to support the European Skills Agenda. In alignment with CYANOTYPES, SACCORD focuses on enhancing skills development and strengthening collaborations between stakeholders in the Cultural and Creative Sectors and Industries (CCSI) through the EU initiative the Creative Pact for Skills. ELIA brings in the higher arts education community and is the lead organiser of the Creative Skills Week 2024 in Amsterdam and in 2025 in Prague.

Originally proposed in the Creative Pact for Skills Manifesto, Creative Skills Week is a large-scale event aimed at providing a collaborative space for experimenting on innovative knowledge development for skills and competencies.

Furthermore, SACCORD will also provide the development of a Policy Action Plan to connect the outcomes with local and European policies. The project is co-funded by the Forward-Looking Project Scheme from the Erasmus+ Programme of the European Commission.







CrAFt – Creating Actionable Futures is an EU-funded coordination and support action aimed at facilitating New European Bauhaus transformations towards climate-neutral, beautiful, and inclusive cities. With eight consortium partners and close alignment with the EU Cities Mission, CrAFt focuses on supporting over 70 cities in shaping their transition to climate neutrality and inclusivity by 2030.

As an active partner, ELIA was responsible for connecting urban transformations with higher (arts) education stakeholders and led efforts to engage students in the CrAFt project over the past two years. ELIA created a framework supporting the CrAFt partners <u>Amsterdam University of Applied Sciences</u>, <u>Czech Technical University</u>, <u>University of Bologna</u>, and <u>Norwegian University of Science and Technology</u> to host interdisciplinary/STEAM courses and workshops for their students.

ELIA also established an ongoing Student Core Group (international and interdisciplinary), tasked with proposing participatory models and setting up mechanisms to engage students in city transformation. The students have taken an active role within the project, collaborating with project partners and organising their own student events, the Think/Do Tanks. In the period 2022–2024 five student events were scheduled in Helsinki 2022, Évora 2023, Manchester 2023, Amsterdam 2024, and Milan 2024. The students also participated in some of ELIA's signature events during this time frame. This project is creating learnings on student-led engagement formats and competencies needed to support urban transformation and interdisciplinary, cross-sectoral work.

Cultuur&Campus Putselaan

The <u>Cultuur&Campus Putselaan</u> (C&CP) project, dedicated to sustainable and inclusive urban development, is located in Rotterdam-Zuid. This space, which is being co-created by the project partners, brings together people from diverse backgrounds to conduct research, nurture creativity, and exchange ideas. As a centre for learning and inspiration, C&CP encourages collaboration and innovation, creating a welcoming environment where new ideas flourish.

#### **Climate Truth Crisis (Envirology)**

'Climate Truth Crisis (Envirology)' is the follow-up project to the successful Erasmus+ collaboration Plastic Justice. Coordinated by the Iceland University of the Arts, with partners University of the Arts The Hague, University of the Arts London, Vilnius Academy of Arts, ELISAVA, Estonian Academy of Arts, and University of Sarajevo, the project aims to empower young people to critically evaluate climate-related information amidst widespread disinformation. By leveraging the expertise of art and design schools, the project creates tools to trace the origins and credibility of claims. Collaborating with European institutions and experts in social science and media, the consortium seeks to counter climate disinformation through a book and digital toolbox, helping to restore trust in expertise and improve information literacy. Climate Truth Crisis's work started in August 2024.





## **Advocacy**



# The Advocacy Sounding Board Members (Current)

ELIA's advocacy actions primarily focus on policy and funding at the European level. Through these actions, ELIA supports the higher arts education community in both facing challenges and identifying and creating new opportunities. To effectively advocate for the conditions in which higher arts education can thrive, we have worked to increase ELIA's visibility at the EU and strategically combined forces with partner networks and members. ELIA is actively engaging in dialogue with policymakers and other key stakeholders about policy and funding frameworks and putting (or keeping) important topics on the agenda. We do this by contributing to stakeholder consultations by the EU (for instance, on Horizon Europe or the European Education Area), actively participating in forums and platforms for dialogue, writing (open) letters and policy recommendations,

and participating in bi/multilateral meetings. We are gradually including formats to engage our members more directly in the way we approach advocacy. The first step was to set up an Advocacy Sounding Board, co-opted by the ELIA Representative Board, for fast member feedback on campaigns. We hosted (online) events on advocacy-related themes as well, bringing together policymakers and the higher arts education community to discuss hot topics related to the field.

While ELIA's focus is on developments within Europe, many trends and political debates are global. Staying connected and having regular exchange with our global partners and members has also become an important aspect of what we do.

## **ELIA Advocacy** Campaigns



Advocacy is integrated in most of ELIA's projects. For instance, the FAST45 project explored future thinking in higher arts education and was concluded with a set of policy recommendations. The CrAFt project is active in discussions on the future of the New European Bauhaus Initiative, the CYANOTYPES and SACCORD projects connect to the Creative Pact for Skills Manifesto and create platforms for dialogue between the CCSI and European Commission.

Following is a brief overview of campaigns, consultations, and other initiatives that have been the main building blocks of ELIA's advocacy in 2022-2024.

#### On the Value of STEAM and Arts Education

The position paper 'On the Value of STEAM and Arts Education - Joint Response to the Horizon Europe Coordination and Support Action Calls 2023' was co-published in May 2023 by ELIA, AEC, CAE, and EMC. It was endorsed by 247 representatives of organisations from the cultural sectors, including from many higher arts education institutions.

In June 2023, it was sent to key policymakers in the European Commission and European Parliament. This started a fruitful exchange with the European Commission's Directorate General for Education, Youth, Sport and Culture (DG EAC). In this exchange, we addressed a problematic framing of STEAM in recently published calls for funding. Eventually, the dialogue moved towards the value of arts in interdisciplinary contexts, relating this to opportunities in the EU's funding mechanisms and evidence gathering efforts.

The topic remains high on ELIA's agenda, and we aim to continue this collaboration and dialogue in the coming years.

#### **Future of New European Bauhaus**

In 2023 and 2024, much debate has been taking place on the future direction and funding of the New European Bauhaus initiative of the European Commission, which eventually resulted in the 'NEB Facility', a funding instrument that is currently being finalised.

ELIA has represented the interest of its members in this debate in various ways, always stressing the added value of the arts within the initiative, and of cross-sectoral, participatory and interdisciplinary approaches.

In September 2023, we sent a letter to the members of Working Party on Research of the Council of the European Union. We shared the open call for members of the European Commission's NEB Mission Board across our community. We participated in open consultations on the future of the New European Bauhaus (in particular on the NEB mission), in collaboration with the CrAFt project and independently. We also joined the New European Bauhaus Alliance.

ELIA Advocacy Campaigns



In 2022 and 2023, ELIA, <u>AEC</u>, and <u>SAR</u> led a <u>collaborative campaign</u> proposing changes to the Frascati Manual, published by the <u>OECD</u>. The proposal was formally submitted to the OECD NESTI Bureau, responsible for possible revisions of the manual. The campaign is ongoing. The Frascati Manual influences a broad array of national and international research frameworks, policy documents, and funding instruments. Proper descriptions and references in this document are therefore key for the field of artistic research.

The Frascati manual campaigns should be seen in the framework of the sector-wide collaboration on advancing the recognition and supporting infrastructure for artistic research, which started with the 'Vienna Declaration on Artistic Research' (2020). In September 2024, this group of partner networks met in Vienna to discuss a shared strategy for the coming years. The newly coined Artistic Research Alliance shortly after released its first official statement, titled "Leveraging the Full Potential of Artistic Research".

Skills and the Cultural and Creative Sectors and Industries

As a partner in the Creative Pact for Skills since 2022, ELIA is actively participating in policy conversations around skills, competencies, and the development of the Cultural and Creative Sectors and Industries (CCSIs). In particular, ELIA aims to ensure a strong connection between those conversations and the higher arts education sector.

ELIA organised exchange between CCSI stakeholders and policymakers at Creative Skills Week 2023 and 2024, supporting the development of relevant frameworks and lexicon. This was possible due to the EUfunded CYANOTYPES and SACCORD projects. In both editions of Creative Skills Week, ELIA engaged the EIT Culture and Creativity in

different capacities. Furthermore, ELIA is associate participant in EIT Culture and Creativity, joining its Cities and Regions Network (formerly known as Policy Club) launched in Bilbao (October 2023).



## Championing Democracy and Humanitarian Values

Rooted in ELIA's 2020–2024 strategy, is the aim to continuously act as an advocate of democratic and humanitarian values, in particular freedom (including artistic and academic freedom and organisational autonomy), peace, and human rights. Promoting international dialogue through our activities is the most important tool used for this purpose. In specific cases that are strongly impacting our members, the ELIA Representative Board introduces specific campaigns and statements. For instance, in February 2023, ELIA published ELIA Community Supports Urgent Turkey and Syria Earthquake Appeals for Emergency Aid and ELIA Stands in Solidarity with the Performing Arts Education Sector in Greece. In September 2024, we also joined forces with our colleague networks in a Call for Artistic Freedom and Autonomy of the Arts. Two other campaigns have been more elaborate:

In reaction to the events in Israel and Palestine since October 2023, the ELIA Representative Board published a statement in December 2023, followed by an updated statement in May 2024, and a further update in October 2024.. A series of follow-up actions aiming to support the higher arts education community through this crisis were set up and are currently being implemented.


The ELIA community has been deeply shaken by the bloodshed in Israel and Palestine. Not only were ELIA members in the region affected, but heated debates and protest took place across Europe and globally on the role of higher arts education institutions in this conflict.


#### **Recovery and Reconstruction in Ukraine**

In terms of European policy development, ELIA represented the higher arts education community at conferences where the international contribution to recovery and reconstruction efforts in Ukraine was discussed. ELIA also endorsed the Vilnius Call for Action at the International Conference towards the Recovery of the Cultural Sector of Ukraine (June 2024). ELIA's delegate statement reflected on the needs of higher arts education in that space.

# Collaborations with International Networks







ELIA has been proud to collaborate with colleague networks on several significant advocacy actions and campaigns in the period 2022–2024. Some collaborations were specific to a particular action. However, most collaborations have mid- or long-term outlooks. Some relevant consortia have already been mentioned in the campaigns above, including: the New European Bauhaus Alliance, the EIT Culture and Creativity Cities and Regions Network and the Creative Pact for Skills, and the Artistic Research Alliance.

Additionally, it is important to note ELIA's role as an active member of <u>Culture Action Europe</u> (<u>CAE</u>), a network organisation that represents the European cultural sector with respect to EU policymakers. We give input and feedback to CAE's campaign and participate in its platforms for dialogue with policymakers and colleague networks.

ELIA also has an ongoing collaboration with the <u>European</u>
<u>Association of Conservatoires (AEC)</u>. This was formalised by participation in the AEC's Artemis Advocacy Taskforce, together with colleagues from CAE, <u>European Music Council (EMC)</u>, <u>European Grouping of Film and Television Schools (GEECT)</u>, and <u>European Performing Arts Students' Association (EPASA)</u>.

On the topic of sustainability and eco-responsibility, ELIA collaborates closely with the 16 other networks of SHIFT Eco-Certification for Cultural Networks. ELIA also regularly exchanges and collaborates with networks that are active on the national level (such as ANdÉA and CHEAD), as well as networks whose main focus is in other areas (geographically or in terms of disciplines). In this sense, two recent collaborative events stand out:

#### **ELIA and EUA: Beyond ChatGPT**

On 23 June 2023, in collaboration with the <u>European University</u> <u>Association (EUA)</u>, ELIA facilitated an informative webinar on Artificial Intelligence (AI) titled '<u>Beyond ChatGPT - What's next for generative AI in higher education?</u>'. Co-moderated by ELIA Executive Director Maria Hansen and Director for Policy Coordination and Foresight (EUA) Thomas Jørgensen, this webinar delved into the potential of generative AI in higher arts education and its impact on learning experiences and creativity.

#### ELIA, CHEAD, and AICAD: Creative Education Manifesto

On 14 June 2024, in collaboration with the <u>Council for Higher</u> <u>Education in Art & Design (CHEAD)</u> and the <u>Association of Independent Colleges of Art & Design (AICAD)</u>, ELIA facilitated an online session titled '<u>Creative Education Manifesto - A</u> <u>UK case study on launching a movement for creative arts education</u>'. Including an expert panel discussion and exchange with the participants, this event explored ways to mobilise the sector to advocate for the value of arts education, learning from experiences from the United Kingdom, the European Union, the United States, and Canada.



ELIA's Strategic Focus 2020–2024 concludes this year. Since 2023, the ELIA Executive Group and ELIA Team have been working on a ten-year future vision incorporating a more process-oriented approach to 'strategising', supported by For Planet Strategy Lab. In this process, key strategic missions and a renewed value statement have been identified to guide the association's development. Engaging with members, particularly during the Leadership Symposium in Manchester, has been vital in shaping this strategy.

In the past two years, ELIA has strengthened its organisation and aimed to set an example for members through sustainable policies. Proudly, ELIA is now one of 15 cultural networks in Europe to receive eco-certification, a milestone that will impact its internal practices and partnerships. ELIA is also finalising its Equity, Diversity, and Inclusivity (EDI) policy, ensuring these principles are reflected in all areas of its work. ELIA's strategic collaborations across Europe, particularly on topics like EDI, sustainability, skills, research, and the cultural sector, will continue. Notably, its strong ties with members in the United Kingdom, ELIA's largest member base, and global membership through satellite events have been crucial. Looking ahead, ELIA will offer a variety of online, hybrid, and in-person events to further engage its community. Several of these are outlined in this section.

ELIA's governance structure consists of a Representative Board, an Executive Group, an Executive Director, and the ELIA Team. Continuous consultation within these governance layers ensures productive collaboration in setting and implementing ELIA's strategic goals and network objectives.

As a membership-based organisation, ELIA holds General Assemblies where representatives from all member institutions elect the President and the Representative Board. While board members typically come from the leadership of European higher arts education institutions, ELIA encourages non-European members to join and bring a global perspective. To this end, two seats on the Representative Board are reserved for non-European members.

The Representative Board meets twice a year and is responsible for developing and monitoring ELIA's strategic focus. During these meetings, the board discusses topics such as membership strategy, events, and project proposals. Additionally, the board develops the topics and content on which ELIA's events and activities are based. Board members often contribute to working groups and event steering committees as well.

The ELIA President serves a four-year term and selects the Executive Group from among the members of the Representative Board. This group supports the board in its responsibilities and guides the organisation. The Executive Group regularly meets with ELIA's Executive Director, who oversees the implementation of strategy and the execution of decisions by the ELIA Team throughout the year.

To address specific topics of interest, ELIA also relies on working groups, which connect with the broader membership through platform events and occasionally through task forces dedicated to particular issues.



## **Finance**

ELIA is in a healthy financial position, bolstered by a growing income stream and measured expenditure, enabling our organisation to maintain a solid reserve. In the past two years, there has been an increase in revenue from membership fees and sponsorship. Moreover, project activities are expanding. The UAx project, which started in 2022, reached its full annual capacity of 15 members in 2023 and will continue until 2025. Additionally, ELIA has initiated and completed a significant number of EU projects as a partner and is set to raise its sights and ambitions as a network in the coming years. The diversity and number of tasks within the projects have led to a focus on automation, making tasks, project costs, and time expenditure transparent. The Statement of Income and Expenditure 2022-2023, with a budget to 2024, provides an overview of ELIA's finances over the past two years. 
#### Our message is being received






