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Health informatics is crucial to reducing costs for mental health

A report issued last month by Medibank has estimated the overall cost of supporting people with mental illness in Australia at \$28.6 billion per year.

The report found that our current mental healthcare system is fragmented and uncoordinated, making it impossible for most consumers to receive satisfactory care.

In order to achieve successful reform to address these issues, proper foundations need to be laid.

Health informatics trained workers are necessary at every stage of any health system reform to ensure successful implementation.

Health informaticians are vital to system design and implementation to make sure new systems or system improvements integrate rather than further fragmenting the system.

Among the report recommendations is expansion of community care and online Cognitive Behavioural Therapy for those suffering mild forms of mental illness.

Evidence from Australia is growing to suggest online CBT increases rates of treatment and quality of life for people suffering from mild forms of depression and anxiety.

The report contends that Australia is in a position to reform our system using existing technologies such as online CBT to create an 'end-to-end' mental health service.
