Ted Wysocki advanced a community development model, which integrated economic & employment development programs with sustainable development by collaborating and partnering with local business, government, and community leaders.

- Secured federal Office of Community Services grant to establish loan fund for tenants of the *Green Exchange* [the redevelopment of the former Cooper Lamp Factory], who agree to hire low-income individuals.
- Designed and implemented two-year city TIF-funded Community Jobs Initiative initially focused on the Green Exchange which included a website, worklocal.org, to match residents to local job openings.
- Explored a social enterprise based on management of transitional jobs program, Green LEEDers, previously funded by the City, to provide further on-the-job training and work experience for graduates.
- Secured state funding for a Green Careers Pathway training program, which includes Green Carpentry & Weatherization, Solar Installation, and Home Energy Auditor training.
- Convened the Chicagoland Green Collar Jobs Initiative in 2007.
- Initiated North River Corridor Infrastructure Task Force to meet with City officials quarterly to identify & monitor improvements for traffic mitigation.
- Launched Computer Skills Training program for low-income Chicagoans in 2008, adding advanced MOS certifications in 2010 with state funding to Eliminate the Digital Divide.
- Directed the first demonstration corridor for the Clean Air Counts campaign of the Metropolitan Mayors Caucus [2003-2007].
- Established Entry-Level Industrial Skills Training [ELIST] program for low-income, low-skilled Chicagoans in 2004 with state funding.
