KAREN CORNELL, DVM, PhD, DACVS



Dr. Karen Cornell is a graduate of Purdue University's veterinary school, and she also completed her internship, small animal surgery residency, and PhD there after two years in private practice. In 1998, she joined the University of Georgia's College of Veterinary Medicine faculty as a soft tissue surgeon. She is currently a professor of small animal surgery and has been the assistant department head since 2010. Her primary interest include the following: communication skills training for veterinary professionals, teaching methodologies, and reconstructive surgeries.

She has received numerous recognitions for her teaching skills including the highest teaching honor awarded to veterinary educators, the Carl J. Norden Distinguished Teaching Award, twice. In 2011, she was named a Josiah Meigs Distinguished Teaching Professor, which is the highest teaching award available at the University of Georgia. The David Tyler Award for Innovative Advances in Teaching was awarded to her in 2004 by the university faculty. Six different senior classes have voted her as the faculty member that most contributed to their fourth year education.

Dr. Cornell has been an active participant in the Bayer Animal Health Communication Project of the Institute for Healthcare Communications since 2004 when it was started. She believes that communication skills should be taught to veterinary students to allow them to communicate effectively with both their clients and colleagues as well as the media. She has lead the initiative to introducing communication skills training into the curriculum of Georgia veterinary students.

KATE E. CREEVY, DVM, MS, DACVIM-SA



Dr. Kate Creevy completed her DVM in 1998 at the University of Tennessee. The following year she completed a rotating small animal internship at the Univeristy of Minnesota. She spent the next four years in emergency medicine: two years at at a small animal and exotics emergency clinic in Minnesota and an additional 2 years at a twenty-four hour general and speciality practice in Washington, DC. While in Washington, DC, she completed a two year Cancer Research Training Award Fellowship at the National Cancer Insitute of the NIH. She studied transplant and gene therapy for Canine Leukocyte Adhesion Deficiency. In 2003, she joined the faculty of the University of Georgia's College of Veterinary Medicine as an emergency medicine clinician. Here she completed a small animal internal medicine residency as well as her Master's degree in infectious disease. She is currently an assistant professor of internal medicine.

Her research interests include the following: canine and feline infectious diseases, immune deficiency diseases, immune-mediated diseases, and canine epidemiology and mortality. She has been the receipient of the Lilly Teaching Fellowship from the Univeristy of Georgia. She has also been an author on multiple journal articles.
