THE FINAL DAYS...

This week is the final week of the Missouri legislative session. Debate will end on Friday at 6 p.m.

Prevailing wage, separate right-towork measures, public employee union dues, tax cuts, transportation funding, tort reform, and the IOU grid modernization and rate reform bill are a list of what lawmakers want to make final decisions on before the week ends.

Also left for the House to pass this week is the Small Wireless Facility Deployment Act, HB 1991, which broke its logiam last week in the Senate and passed 30-1. MPUA is also monitoring issues on water wells, non-city customer rates, and opportunities to address utility appraisals for 4th class cities. Last week, the Senate passed a floor substitute (SS SCS HCS HB 1991) stripping out municipal electric utility distribution poles and facilities from state regulation over small cell antenna attachment contracts between cities and wireless carriers. This allows municipal utilities to continue to negotiate independently on price and attachment requirements without limitation. Since January, all prior versions had municipal utilities under state regulation. Cities still must follow state oversight for other right-of-way infrastructure with a rental cap of \$150. However, mid-span wireline micro cell attachments by cable providers are exempt from additional application and notification when a wireline agreement exists. MPUA conceded this to achieve the municipal utility exemption from the bill. HB 1991 now returns to the House for a final vote. If approved by the House, the bill will be truly agreed and finally passed, ready to head to the Governor for signature.

Lawmakers finally approved appropriations bills last week that make up the \$28.31 billion state operating budget for FY2019. As previously reported, monies for the Stockton Lake study by members of the Southwest Missouri Joint Municipal Water Utility Commission was included, along with monies for other water commissions (Clarence Cannon and North Central). Also included were monies for DNR to spend from the Volkswagen Settlement Trust, which could include monies for local government fleet vehicles and machinery as well as electric vehicle charging stations.

It was rumored last week that compromise had been reached on prevailing wage, to set a \$100,000 floor before prevailing wage requirements are triggered, as well as loosening requirements for counties with little reporting. We will watch HB 1729 expectantly this final week.
