Title: Why Choose Choices?

Session Type: Workshop

#### **Public Program Description:**

Learning to make good choices is an essential step toward becoming a responsible citizen and leading a productive, safe, and healthy life. This workshop will discuss the importance of teaching and supporting children in making choices, help you evaluate how well your program provides opportunities for choice-making, and offer practical tips and activities.





#### **EXAMPLE**



#### **Session Plan Outline:**

This workshop was created to share how important it is to allow children to make choices and educate school age professionals on how they can guide children in making good choices. Following is an outline describing the topics:

- 1. Welcome and Introduction
- 2. Objectives:

To discuss why children need the opportunity to make decisions and choices

To evaluate how well your program provides for individual choice making opportunities

To share ideas to help children learn how to make choices.

To participate in choice making activities that can be incorporated into school age programs.

- 3. Group Discussion: Why Choices?
- 4. Individual Activity: Evaluation of choice making opportunities. What choices are you really giving them?
- 5. Strategy Sharing: 5 Tips for Making Effective Choices and Guidelines for Offering Choices
- 6. Group Activity: Participate in "Take Your Choice", "Choices, Choices, Everywhere", and "The Shoe is on the Other Foot", "What If...", and "What Shall We Do?", activities that help children become aware of making choices, to illustrate how choices can affect others, to help children understand that choices have consequences.
- 7. Review: Game checking for understanding of information presented Closure: Share how information will be incorporated at different programs
