

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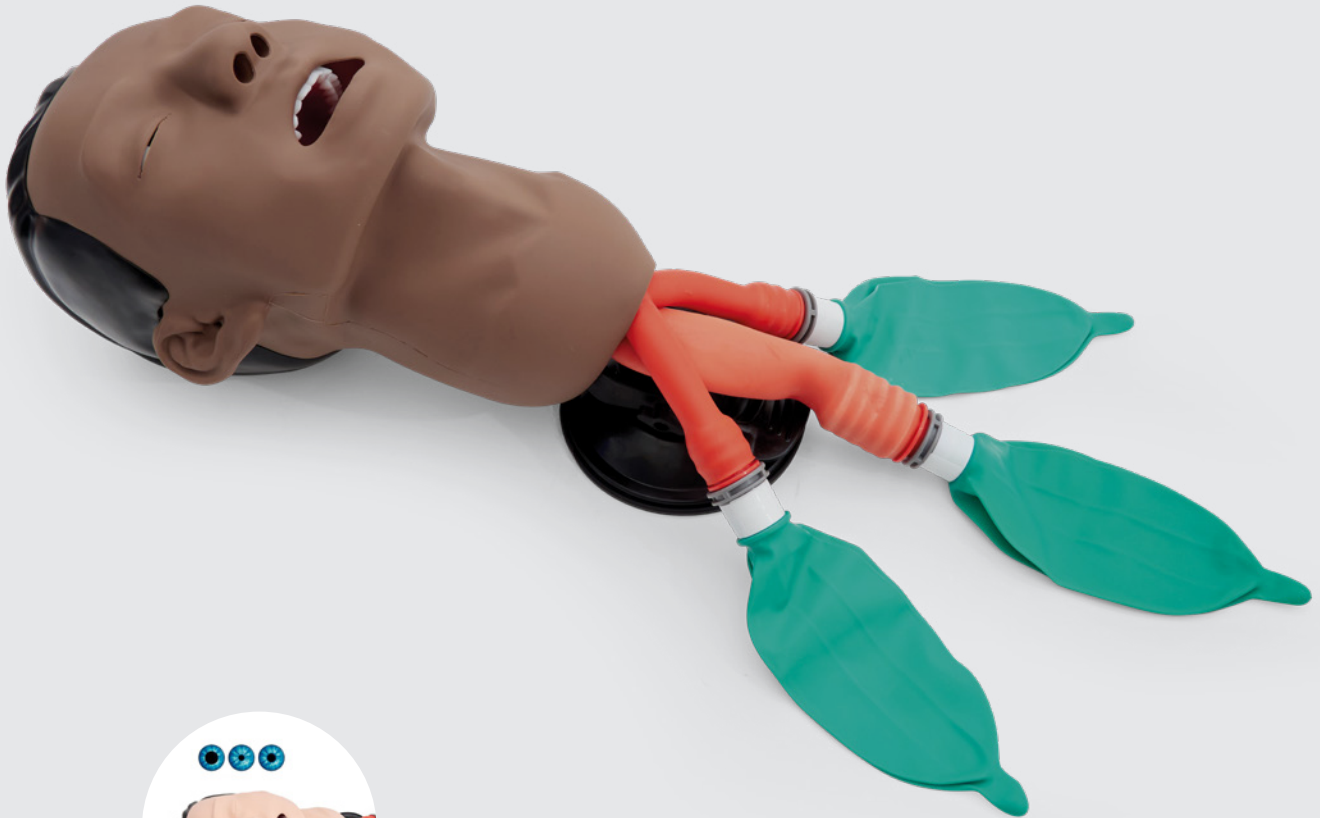

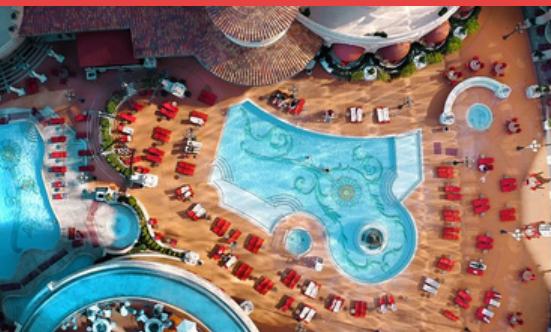

The Feedback Lab: How to Grow Great Clinicians

Effective feedback is the most powerful, and undertrained, tool in EMS education and leadership. This immersive 8-hour workshop equips preceptors, FTOs, educators, supervisors, and managers with a practical framework for delivering feedback that is specific, timely, and actionable; the kind that truly drives performance improvement. Participants will examine why feedback often fails: vague, overly positive comments, personal bias, unsafe learning climates, and moments when cognitive overload makes feedback impossible to absorb. Through guided discussion, real EMS-based scenarios, and structured peer coaching, attendees will both give and receive feedback in a supportive environment designed for rapid-cycle, deliberate practice. Participants will leave with evidence-based strategies, repeatable tools, and increased confidence and competence to engage in feedback conversations that change behavior, strengthen relationships, and elevate provider performance in the field.

Sim Smarter, Not Harder Part I

High-quality EMS simulation is the result of intentional, evidence-based design decisions that align learning objectives, scenario structure, environmental cues, and debriefing strategies. Simulation designers must balance realism, cognitive load, operational constraints, and psychological safety while preparing learners for high-stakes clinical environments.

This course provides an in-depth exploration of evidence-based EMS simulation design. It will guide attendees through a structured design framework that includes needs assessment, objective development, fidelity selection, environmental and sensory design, facilitation strategies, and outcome evaluation.

Participants will work through the process of creating or refining an EMS simulation using evidence-informed principles. Emphasis will be placed on translating research into practical, scalable design decisions that improve learner performance and debriefing quality while remaining feasible in real-world EMS education settings.

Sim Smarter, Not Harder Part II

Effective simulation includes the combination of structured debriefing, robust assessment, and ongoing quality assurance that ensures learning translates into safe, competent clinical performance. This course builds on foundational simulation design principles (Part I) and dives deeply into the evaluation and feedback side of simulation programs.

Participants will explore evidence-based debriefing frameworks, strategies to measure and improve learner performance, and methods for integrating simulation-based assessments into broader quality assurance initiatives. Emphasis will include practical applications: designing assessment tools, conducting structured debriefings that foster reflective learning, and implementing QA processes to ensure program fidelity and continuous improvement. Through interactive exercises, case discussions, and scenario-based practice, attendees will leave with actionable strategies to elevate the educational value, reliability, and impact of their simulation.

Teaching the Invisible Work: Emotional Labor, Burnout, and Sustainability in EMS

Emotional labor is a core, yet rarely taught, component of EMS work. Clinicians are expected to regulate fear, empathy, and authority in rapid succession — often without language, training, or organizational support. This extended pre-conference session provides a deep dive into emotional labor as it operates in high-stress professions, with a specific focus on EMS education and workforce sustainability. Participants will explore the evolution of emotional labor research, examine how surface acting and deep acting differentially impact burnout and wellbeing, and analyze how organizational factors such as display rules, autonomy, and psychological safety shape emotional strain.

1A - The Invisible Curriculum: The Lessons We Teach Without Realizing It

Every EMS program has two curriculums: the one we plan — and the one students quietly absorb. This invisible curriculum is taught through tone, fairness, role-modeling, and how we respond to mistakes. It shapes psychological safety, confidence, and professional identity — sometimes more than lectures ever could. This session helps educators uncover the unintended messages students receive and intentionally align culture with the values we say we teach. Walk away with practical ways to build curiosity, compassion, accountability, and safer learning environments — without adding workload, policies, or stress.

1B - Teaching Clinical Judgement

It is paramount that EMS providers use good clinical judgement when caring for patients. Certifying exams are using clinical judgement models to assess prospective EMS providers. 1D - Simulation in EMS - Traps to Avoid

Simulation, just like any other educational tool, requires careful planning, design, execution, and quality to ensure that the learners achieve the desired outcomes. For many of us, our story in healthcare simulation was crafted through learning as we go, often based on the mistakes we made, or by being limited to what we ourselves have experienced or seen others do. It is a difficult challenge to overcome to achieve the KSAs to do great simulation—and by proxy, created EMS practitioners with great KSAs in delivering great care. But there are many traps to avoid. This panel will explore many traps, identifying where the problems but also the good intentions are so we can craft good simulation. Evidence-based standards, constructs, and questions to ask will be woven into the presentation to help grow your simulation expertise. Build your sims into what we all want them to be—great experiences for our learners that reinforce learning and transfer good practice to the real world.

2B - Frequently Asked Questions About National Certification Examination Content

This course will feature a variety of informational content centered around examination development and will provide detailed answers to questions that are frequently asked of the examinations content team. Specific subjects will include the details of how an examination is developed, how content is chosen for the examination, how the examinations are referenced, what happens when medical standards change, and the National Registry's role in the field of EMS.

2C - Perspectives on Professionalism: Defining, Assessing, and Advancing Our Professional Climate in Medical Education

11:30am - 12:30pm PT *Dr. Heather Davis*

Professionalism is central to EMS practice, yet defining and assessing it often frustrates educators and learners. This interactive session brings together prehospital clinicians to examine the challenge of teaching, observing, and supporting professionalism across training and career stages. Participants will share examples of professionalism lapses, then work together to define what "professional behaviors" should look like in EMS. These ideas will be refined into a shared, practical working model to guide teaching, feedback, and accountability. Attendees will explore evidence-based strategies and tools from EMS and other health professions. In small groups, participants will co-create recommendations to strengthen how professionalism is taught and evaluated across education and practice. The session closes with opportunities for change in curriculum, policy, admission, and culture.

2D - Play with Purpose: Game-Based & Experiential Learning in EMS Education

Game-based learning and experiential strategies can powerfully reinforce critical thinking when used intentionally. This session moves beyond "games for fun" to explore how structured play, scenarios, and experiential activities align with learning objectives, assessment, and professional behaviors in EMS education.

General Session - When Rigor Becomes Threat: Rethinking the Affective Domain in Trauma-Informed Paramedicine Education

8:00am - 9:00am PT *Dr. Ryan Batenhorst*

In the high-intensity environment of EMS, trauma is often unseen—embedded in patient histories, behaviors, and even the responses of providers themselves. This session introduces Trauma-Informed Care (TIC) as a critical shift in paramedic education and practice, moving beyond treating conditions to recognizing the whole person behind the call. Participants will explore the foundational principles of TIC, examine its relevance to both patient care and provider well-being, and discuss how traditional EMS approaches can unintentionally re-traumatize or overlook essential human needs. The presentation highlights practical strategies for integrating trauma-informed practices into paramedic education to foster trust, resilience, and cultural humility. Designed for educators, preceptors, and clinical leaders, this session promotes a more compassionate and reflective approach to care—because every call is more than a patient; it is a person with a story.

9:15 am - 10:15 am PT

4A - The Case for a Civilian-to-Paramedic Pathway

9:15am - 10:15am PT *Melissa Stuive*

This presentation examines the long-standing assumption that EMT-Basic certification is a prerequisite for becoming a competent paramedic. Using comparisons to other health professions, workforce data, educational theory, and accreditation standards, participants will explore the viability and benefits of a Civilian-to-Paramedic (Direct-to-Paramedic) pathway. Emphasis is placed on structured education, competency-based progression, and leadership-driven program design rather than time-based tradition.

4B - Prehospital Guidelines Consortium: Helping to Drive Change in EMS Curricula

9:15am - 10:15am PT *Kenneth Navarro*

To sort through the voluminous amount of information published each year, multiple national organizations are engaging in ongoing efforts to develop, implement, and evaluate prehospital evidence-based guidelines. The Prehospital Guidelines Consortium (PGC) is collaborating with the National Registry of EMT's to continually identify current scientific literature to incorporate into education and certification activities. Earlier this year, the PGC released a new batch of EMS-centric literature. This presentation will examine the latest high-quality evidence that should drive changes to EMS curricula and testing practices.

4C - Beyond Burnout: Teaching Mental Health, Resilience, and Provider Wellness

EMS educators are increasingly responsible for preparing students for the psychological realities of the profession. This session addresses how to integrate mental health literacy, resilience skills, and wellness strategies into EMS curricula while maintaining educational rigor and professional boundaries.

3:30 pm - 4:30 pm PT

3A - Un-Teaching Dogma: Helping EMS Students Challenge “Because We’ve Always Done It” Medicine

3:30pm - 4:30pm PT *Rick Slaven*

EMS education sometimes passes along practices that feel right but aren't supported by current evidence. When students feel unsafe questioning ideas, they memorize instead of thinking. This session explores how clinical dogma forms, why it persists, and how educators can safely teach learners to evaluate claims without undermining medical direction or program culture. Using real EMS examples, participants will gain tools to build respectful curiosity, clinical judgment, and evidence-informed decision-making — creating providers who understand not just what to do, but why.

3B - Assessment Synergy: A Comparison of Classroom and National Certification Examinations

3:30pm - 4:30pm PT *Matt Ozanich*

This course will feature a variety of informational content centered around the purpose and development of assessments, both at the classroom level and the national certification level. Discussion points will include the difference between formative and summative assessments, the origin of assessment content for both settings, the scoring of assessments, and how clinical competence relies on the overlap of, and distinction between, education, licensure, and certification.

3C - Precepting your Preceptors

3:30pm - 4:30pm PT *Dennis Edgerly*

EMS students spend a significant amount of time with preceptors in the prehospital setting both during ambulance clinicals and field internship. Programs can be required to provide education about precepting to their field preceptors. This session will look at processes that can be implemented to help field preceptors better prepare the students for testing and work as an independent provider. The session will incorporate concepts to use clinical judgement models during coaching, and while providing feedback.

3D - Closing the Education to Operations Gap in EMS

3:30pm - 4:30pm PT *Dr. Heather Davis*

EMS education programs are expected to produce workforce-ready clinicians, yet too often they operate without shared expectations, aligned equipment, or feedback from the agencies who will eventually employ their graduates. Educators shouldn't have to guess what “field ready” looks like, nor carry the responsibility alone. This session empowers educators to lead collaboration across the EMS system to improve student readiness, retention, and transition to practice. Through practical examples, we'll explore where schools can proactively engage EMS departments with easy wins like scheduling alignment, equipment familiarity, and national exam preparation and deepen partnerships including incorporating QI fallouts into curricular revisions and building recruitment pathways. General Session - Live, Laugh, Loathe: Not Your Typical EMS Pep Talk

Live Laugh Loathe is my real story, told by the person who lived it. It traces my experience struggling with addiction and trauma, and the turning point that led me into EMS as a paramedic and educator, to show how compassion is formed, lost, and reclaimed in this profession. The session explores stigma, provider burnout, culture, and responsibility, and how presence and humanity can change outcomes for patients, educators and providers alike. This is not your typical motivational talk. This is honest, uncomfortable at times, and grounded in the realities of EMS. This is a rare opportunity to engage with one of the most honest, challenging conversations in EMS education, one that audiences don't just attend, but carry with them long after the conference ends.

As a respected paramedic and EMS educator, Bill Young presented a façade of strength to his colleagues while privately battling the crushing weight of PTSD. Years of traumatic calls silently accumulated—the infant he couldn't save, the mutilated crash victims, the colleagues lost in the line of duty—until darkness overwhelmed him. He had reached his breaking point. In this powerful session, Bill shares his raw, unflinching account of his descent toward suicide and his challenging path to recovery. He reveals the subtle warning signs others missed, the barriers that prevented him from seeking help sooner, and the life-changing interventions that ultimately saved him. Most importantly, Bill provides practical guidance for EMS providers facing similar struggles, including specialized resources designed for emergency responders and strategies for overcoming the profession's persistent stigma around mental health. It's a roadmap for those still fighting.

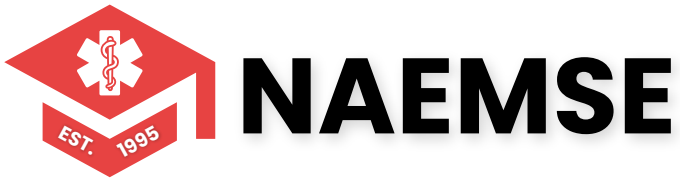
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
