CE changes: what licensees/registrants need to know		
State	Current CE rules	
Alaska	no required CE hours	
Arizona	30 hours per year	There are no in-person requirements for CE hours. Any fees required to be collected by the Board are being waived at the board's discretion.
California	60 hours biennially.	There are no in-person requirements for CE hours
Colorado	25 hours per year	There are no in-person requirements for CE hours
Connecticut	15 hours per year	Suspension of the continuing education requirements for naturopathic physicians. Licensees with expiration dates between March 10, 2020 and February 28, 2021 are not required to complete the continuing education required for license renewal.
DC	30 hours biennially	There are no in-person requirements for CE hours
Hawaii	35 hours biennially	There are no in-person requirements for CE hours
Idaho	July 1, 2020 will begin licensing NMDs	
Kansas	25 hours per year	extended CE deadlines until 90 days following the termination of the State of Disaster Emergency due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
Maine	25 hours per year	Licensees whose licenses are scheduled to expire on or before March 20, 2021 may renew that license without satisfying any continuing education requirements that would otherwise apply.
Maryland	50 hours biennially	There are no in-person requirements for CE hours
Massachusetts	statute has been passed, they are still writing regulations	

Minnesota	25 hours per year	There are no in-person requirements for CE hours. The state has deferred CE reporting requirements until the first full reporting cycle following termination of the peacetime emergency.
Montana	15 hours per year	There are no in-person requirements for CE hours
New Hampshire	45 hours every 3 years	There are no in-person requirements for CE hours
New Mexico	Senate Bill 135 in effect July 2020.	
North Dakota	40 hours biennially	There are no in-person requirements for CE hours
Oregon	32 hours per year	There are no in-person requirements for CE hours
Pennsylvania	statute has been passed, they are still writing regulations	
Puerto Rico	36 hours triennially	
Rhode Island	30 hours biennially	There are no in-person requirements for CE hours
Utah	48 hours biennially	The requirement to participate in "live" CE hours is temporarily suspended for those with license expiration dates between now and September 30, 2020.
Virgin Islands	30 hours biennially	no licensing body exists, only statute
Vermont	30 hours biennially	There are no in-person requirements for CE hours
Washington	2020: 20 hours per year 2021: 60 hours biennially	The board granted a CE extension that coincides with the license renewal extension authorized by the Secretary of the Department of Health until September 30, 2020. The board also determined to accept online courses as meeting CE requirements through December 31, 2020
