Certification in Patient Safety

CPPS Exam

ASPPS members receive a discount on the certification exam to earn the Certified Professional in Patient Safety (CPPS) credential. The evidence-based exam establishes core standards for the field of patient safety, sets an expected proficiency level, and gives those working in patient safety a means to demonstrate their proficiency and skill in the discipline. Candidates are tested on the following five patient safety domains: Culture, Leadership, Patient Safety Risks and Solutions, Measuring and Improving Performance, and Systems Thinking and Design/Human Factors. ASPPS members also receive a discount when recertifying as a Certified Professional in Patient Safety (CPPS).

Review Course

ASPPS members receive a discount on the CPPS review course. Participation in this course will provide attendees with the opportunity to review in depth the five patient safety domains, discuss patient safety scenario examples similar to actual exam questions, and assess their own level of preparedness for the exam and address additional areas for self-study.

Practice Exam

Patient Blood Management Through the Lens of Patient Safety

While blood has played a central role in clinical practice for decades, the proof of safety and efficacy of blood transfusions remains ill-defined in comparison to other forms of medical and surgical interventions. This module reviews the safety implications of blood transfusion and introduces the practice of patient blood management.

Patient blood management (PBM) is the scientific use of safe and effective medical and surgical techniques to manage anemia, optimize coagulation, and decrease bleeding, while incorporating patients as partners in decision making.

Reducing Diagnostic Errors

Diagnostic errors are a top concern in the patient safety field. Studies have shown that malpractice claims related to diagnostic errors outnumber all other classes of medical error. Health care organizations need a more systematic approach for identifying diagnostic errors and educating clinicians on strategies for reducing the prevalence of these errors.

This resource-rich module provides a diverse set of tools and resources to educate health care professionals on diagnostic errors, as well as a dedicated set of materials specific to engaging patients and families in the prevention of diagnostic errors.

Health Information Technology Through the Lens of Patient Safety

This educational module explores the fundamentals of health information technology (HIT) and examines the challenges for information collection, use, and application in health systems. It focuses on patient safety principles such as organizational culture, transparency, patient engagement, integration of care, and human factors engineering and provides the rationale for using these principles as the guiding science behind any effective HIT strategy. Through error reduction and clinical support, effective use of HIT allows providers to deliver safer, higher-quality care in a more efficient and cost-effective manner.
