

THE LIST: ANJRPC POSTS DETAILED LIST OF FULL ASSEMBLY & COMMITTEE VOTES

In the wake of the worst attacks on the Second Amendment in state history, ANJRPC has compiled a detailed list of every Assembly member's vote in both the full Assembly voting session on February 21, and the Assembly Law & Public Safety Committee hearing on February 13. While the entire session is worth watching, several notable debates occurred, including:

- Debate over reducing magazine capacity (begins at approximately 1:15:25)
- Debate over terror watch list bill (begins at approximately 1:00:40)
- Debate over elimination of private sales (begins at approximately 1:52:30)

Heroes of the session included Assemblywoman [Alison McHose](#)(R-24), Assemblyman [Michael Patrick Carroll](#) (R-25), and Assemblyman [Anthony M. Bucco](#)(R-25), whose dedication to Constitutional principles and willingness to stand by their convictions was evident from their impassioned floor speeches and debates, their votes, and their work behind the scenes. Gun owners owe a huge debt of gratitude to these courageous legislators for their extraordinary efforts.

Notably, a total of 12 Republicans spoke against the package of bills, yet not a single Democrat spoke against them. Assembly Minority Leader [John Bramnick](#)(R-21) spoke against the bills, and held a press conference calling them "poorly drafted, rushed through, illogical, and part of a political agenda during an election year."
