Enterostomal Therapy Shines at the 27th Brazilian Congress of Brazilian Nursing Councils

From September 8th to 11th 2025 the Salvador Convention Center hosted the 27th Brazilian Congress of Nursing Councils (CBCENF), bringing together over 45,000 healthcare professionals. 15th Brazilian Congress of Enterostomal Therapy (XV CBE)

The 15th Brazilian Congress of Enterostomal Therapy (XV CBE) was held in Florianópolis, Santa Catarina, Brazil, from October 15th to 19th 2025. This congress marked the 33rd anniversary of the Brazilian Association of Enterostomal Therapy (SOBEST®) and the 35th anniversary of the first enterostomal therapy course in Brazil, coordinated by Professor Dr Vera Lúcia Conceição de Gouveia Santos at the School of Nursing, University of São Paulo.

The XV CBE carried profound significance for all participants, a celebration of a journey that has transformed lives, built connections and strengthened professional integration. The congress theme, Integration and Transition of Care in Enterostomal Therapy, reflected the commitment of Brazilian enterostomal therapists to advancing comprehensive, patient-centered care. This congress represented not only the history of Brazilian enterostomal therapy but also the continuous story we write daily through our professional practice.

The event took place at the CentroSul Convention Center, a modern venue featuring multiple conference rooms and a large exhibition area that comfortably accommodated 31 sponsors. The congress brought together 1871 participants, with 361 e-posters and 48 oral presentations showcased in the newly inaugurated Scientific Arena, dedicated to Professor Dr Vera Lucia Conceição de Gouveia Santos in recognition of her outstanding scientific contributions and leadership in the field. Among these, 16 oral presentations were selected and awarded as the most distinguished works of 2025.

We had a special space dedicated to the presentations of oral scientific papers and e-posters. In our Scientific Arena, all selected works were presented, providing a dynamic environment for the exchange of knowledge and experiences.

The certification process consists of three stages evaluation of a professional portfolio, a theoretical exam, and

a practical skills assessment all conducted by the Certification Committee of SOBEST®'s Department of Professional Development. During the congress in Florianópolis, certificates were awarded for the 2024/2025 and 2023/2024 calls, the latter marking a record number of applicants, with 40 portfolios submitted. This demonstrates the growing pursuit of excellence certification among professionals in the field. The awarding of certificates represents more than the achievement of a title: it symbolises the recognition of a career devoted to stomatherapy. The next call (2025/2026) will be announced soon, with the examination scheduled to take place during the CPE in São Paulo, in June 2026, inviting new candidates and professionals due for recertification to attain this important milestone of professional recognition.





World Ostomy Day®: joint efforts inside and outside the hospital to safeguard the "Roses of Life"

For the occasion of World Ostomy Day®, which is the first Saturday of October every three years, the International Ostomy Association (IOA) announced this year's theme, Invisible Disabilities: Visible Support — the Global Unity of Ostomates. In response our hospital's Department of Gastrointestinal Surgery, Department of Hepatobiliary Surgery, and Department of Gastroenterology jointly launched a linked activity both inside and outside the hospital. With the core of 'Caring for Intestinal Health, Protecting the Roses of Life', the activity aimed to provide professional health services to the public, show sincere care for the ostomy population, and popularise knowledge about ostomies and intestinal health concepts.

Knowledge empowerment inside the hospital: laying a solid foundation for health awareness:

The activities inside the hospital focused on knowledge dissemination, building a learning platform for the public. Professor Liu Ganglei centered his lecture on the prevention and treatment of rectal cancer. Combining clinical cases, he explained the hazards of the disease, high-risk factors, and preventive measures, emphasising the importance of "early detection and early intervention" to help the audience establish scientific health awareness.

Executive Nurse Manager, He Xiaohua, focused on practical ostomy care. She not only detailed the application scenarios of different ostomy products but also demonstrated the process of ostomy bag

replacement and the handling of common problems on-site. Meanwhile, she discussed dietary and exercise taboos for individuals with a stoma, enabling participants to quickly master practical nursing skills that can be applied in daily life. During the interactive session, medical staff patiently answered the public's questions about intestinal diseases and ostomy care, eliminating misunderstandings and knowledge gaps.

Free clinic and science popularisation outside the hospital: bringing care to the doorstep

To reach more people in need, the medical team went into the community to carry out a free clinic outside the hospital. A consultation desk was set up on-site, where experts provided one-on-one diagnosis and treatment services for residents, offering personalised suggestions for intestinal discomfort and ostomy care difficulties. Volunteers distributed ostomy health brochures, popularising relevant knowledge in a vivid way with pictures and texts. In addition, a temporary nursing

guidance area was established to teach individuals with a stoma, and their family members, how to replace ostomy bags and handle skin problems hands-on, effectively solving the troubling points in daily care. Many residents said: "It's convenient and heartwarming to get professional guidance right at our doorstep."

This linked activity both inside and outside the hospital not only improved the public's health awareness through knowledge empowerment inside the hospital but also extended services to the grassroots level via the free clinic outside. A total of over 200 people were served, and more than 300 copies of materials were distributed. The activity not only made the ostomy population feel social care but also enhanced the public's understanding and tolerance towards this group. In the future, our hospital will continue to promote such linked activities, safeguarding every "Rose of Life" with professionalism and warmth, and helping the ostomy population embrace life with confidence.

Turning stigma into strength: Indonesia's innovative support movement for individuals living with a stoma

In Indonesia, the journey towards acceptance and empowerment for individuals living with a stoma has experienced a significant shift in recent years. While in the past their presence was often hidden behind walls of stigma and shame, a wave of hope now brightens their lives, driven by the innovative movement led by WOCARE Indonesia. What started as a simple celebration of World Ostomy Day® has grown into a catalyst for change through the creation of the country's first Stoma Museum.

In a society where a stoma is still too often linked to weakness or loss, the Stoma Museum sheds new light on public perception. This is no ordinary museum; it is a true sanctuary that combines education, psychosocial support, and economic empowerment in an integrated system. It's a second home, a safe space to share, learn, create, and support each other.

The Stoma Museum: a window to understanding and acceptance

The establishment of Indonesia's Stoma Museum marks a significant milestone, not only as a form of education but also as a challenge to the social stigma surrounding a stoma. Inside, visitors, individuals living with a stoma, families, healthcare workers, and the general public can learn about different types of stoma, medical appliances, and, perhaps most importantly, the daily struggles faced by individuals living with a stoma.

More than facts and figures, it's the real-life stories of resilience that leave a lasting impression. Photographs, testimonials, and works of art created by individuals living with a stoma, line the walls, serving as living evidence that they are not simply survivors of illness or trauma, but sources of inspiration for individuals who turn adversity into strength.

As one visitor, Mrs Suryati (56), said: "I used to feel deep shame. People thought I was powerless after my operation. But, here I am grateful to meet friends who truly understand. I learned how to make eco-enzymes. Now, my house is always clean and I can share my knowledge with neighbours."

A holistic ecosystem: From stomapreneur to psychosocial support

What makes the Stoma Museum truly unique is its Stomapreneur economic empowerment program. Instead of simply offering material assistance or therapy,

WOCARE Indonesia fosters an entrepreneurial spirit among individuals living with a stoma through training sessions on hydroponic gardening, baking, handicrafts, eco-enzyme production and financial literacy. This not only boosts confidence but also opens the door for individuals living with a stoma to achieve economic independence.

By 2025, 35% of participants will have acquired income-generating skills, such as selling hydroponic vegetables, cookies, handmade crafts, and more. Many who once depended solely on family now find themselves becoming breadwinners, restoring their sense of dignity and self-worth.

This holistic solution goes beyond economics. The museum also provides arts facilities and physical activities, such as art therapy, weekly walking groups, and intergenerational exercises with elderly community members. These activities have been shown to significantly reduce psychological distress and social isolation, with 85% of participants reporting improvements in psychological well-being. Artistic activities such as painting, knitting, or simple conversations during group walks offer healthy outlets for expression and foster solidarity among individuals living with a stoma.

Yuliana School: Training stoma doulas, companions for the Ostomate journey

Personalised support plays a pivotal role in this movement. Yuliana School, a specialised training centre for stoma doulas, sets a new standard. Unlike general healthcare workers, stoma doulas are professional companions and empathetic peers, trained to support the emotional, physical, and social adjustment needed during the transition to life with a stoma. They teach basic stoma care skills, foster new self-confidence, and, perhaps most crucially, listen without judgment.

Eka, a graduate of the first stoma doula cohort, said: "I know exactly how frightening it is after surgery. I used to feel so alone, but now I help others through their journey. I want every individual living with a stoma to know: you are never alone."

Breaking barriers: Preparing for Congress and building global capacity

WOCARE Indonesia has achieved a major breakthrough by enabling individuals living with a stoma to participate internationally through the English-free stoma programme. The course enhances English communication, allowing individuals living with a stoma to share experiences and learn from the global Stoma community at events such as the ASPOA Congress (Asia South Pacific Ostomy Association) and the upcoming gathering in Bogor, 2026.

Active involvement on the international stage emphasises that physical boundaries do not restrict individuals living with a stoma's contributions; instead, they include advocacy, education, and the creation of more inclusive communities.

Stoma Care Week: Driving national awareness

Each year, Stoma Care Week is held as part of a structured effort to raise national awareness of stomas. Seminars, exhibitions, and talk shows involve individuals living with a stoma, families, healthcare professionals, and the general public in proactive education and discussion. These initiatives challenge the idea that a stoma is an embarrassment or burden; instead, they emphasise that a stoma is a vital medical procedure that deserves recognition and genuine support.

Challenging Stigma, Uniting Hope

All these efforts perfectly align with the global theme of World Ostomy Day[®]: **Invisible Disabilities. Visible Support.** The theme serves as a powerful reminder that the challenges faced by individuals living with a stoma are not always apparent. Discomfort, shame, depression, and physical limitations are often hidden behind everyday clothing and forced smiles.

However, when society provides visible support, measured, tangible, and consistent help, the journey towards self-acceptance and a meaningful life becomes much easier. From a corner of the Stoma Museum in Jakarta to international stages abroad, ghe voices of individuals living with stomas now resonate as powerful proof that invisible does not mean powerless.

Stories of Resilience, Networks of Hope

Beyond statistics and data, it is the web of hope spun by personal stories that shines brightest. Bayu (22), a young individual living with a stoma who once ventured outside only at night, now mentors hydroponic gardening and has been invited to university seminars to speak on resilience.

"Shame isn't a reason to hide away. At the Stoma Museum, I found new brothers and sisters, we encourage one another to keep fighting," he said.

Siti (47), a mother of two, says she feels more valued since joining handicraft classes: "Every piece I create is a symbol of my own journey. Every time I make a sale, I find the pride I thought I'd lost."

Cross-generational and cross-professional collaboration

This ecosystem thrives on cross-collaboration. WOCARE Indonesia has partnered with medical professionals, psychologists, local governments, and volunteers of



all ages. Youth volunteers conduct digital marketing workshops for Stomapreneure programmes, assist in promoting stoma products, and train members in technological literacy.

This community-based movement inspires solidarity across all ages and backgrounds, ensuring that individuals living with a stoma never feel isolated. Volunteers, families, and the wider community become integral to their transformative journey.

Real impact: The numbers speak

The impact of WOCARE Indonesia's comprehensive support is both emotionally heartfelt and supported by data. Over 127 individuals living with a stoma participate in weekly activities through online and offline channels, with 75% reporting reduced anxiety and 60% gaining economic benefits. Participants have also become more comfortable sharing their stories, fostering a new culture of openness, empathy, and acceptance.

Building the future: Setting an example for the world

Indonesia's model for a comprehensive support system is attracting international interest. Delegates from neighbouring countries visit the Stoma Museum for study tours. They praise WOCARE for confidently introducing the museum and the training school, initiatives rarely seen elsewhere.

"Indonesia proves that when challenges are faced together, limitations can spark creativity and solidarity," remarked a delegate at the last ASPOA Congress.

Redefining the meaning of disability

What emerges from Indonesia's Stoma movement is not simply a story of individuals facing illness or injury. It is a collective struggle against stigma, isolation, and social barriers that so often marginalise people with invisible disabilities. WOCARE Indonesia and the Stoma Museum have become pioneers, redefining disability as a fertile ground for resilience, creativity, and new hope.

As the community's motto declares:

"In every stoma, there's a story of resilience. In every support, new hope is created. Indonesian individuals living with a stoma: Invisible doesn't mean powerless."

And further:

"We are the silent generation now finding our voices. Step by step, we prove that real support can tear down the walls of stigma, opening the way to meaningful, independent, and inspiring lives. There is no limit to dreaming. There is no reason to give up, for together, we are strong. Together, we kindle hope for millions of dreams behind every stoma."

Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital in Western Kenya serves a population of more than 25 million Kenyans. As a 1200 bed teaching and referral for 23 counties, patients with acute/chronic wounds and ostomy complications are encountered within the outpatient and inpatient care areas. The nursing workforce of 1000 undergraduate, graduate and post graduate nurses necessitates continuous wound and ostomy care sensitisation and training to enhance knowledge and skills for improved patient outcomes.

To mark 2025 Norma N Gill Day $^{\circ}$ on 26 $^{\text{th}}$ June, the wound care team conducted training for 51 nurses

(Figure 1) recruited in the institution in 2024 and 2025 with wound and ostomy care patient materials support from Philips Therapeautics Limited.

encountered are mainly due to trauma, burns, surgical site infections, diabetic foot ulcers, pressure injuries, cancer and venous insufficiencies among other causes. Cancer and surgical complications are leading causes of ostomy creation among adults whereas congenital anomalies are the major causes among the children.

The training that was held at the Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital Nurses Simulation Centre served as a sensitisation session on the Wound Awareness Month of June 2025 as well as the Norma N Gill Day® 2025, the founder of the World Council of Enterostomal Therapy® (WCET®). The topics covered included:

- Wound bed preparation
- Wound and ostomy care materials choice
- Practical patient demonstrations.



In the UK, ASCN has recently presented and published the EXPASS best practice recommendations for exercise and physical activity after stoma surgery. A huge milestone for the expert panel and authors Sarah Russell (registered exercise physiologist) and Kerry Archer (oncology physiotherapist), who have been working on this project for over 3 years under the guidance of ASCN UK and a significant achievement for ASCN UK. The EXPASS recommendations are a global first and are proudly endorsed by the World Council of Enterostomal Therapists® (WCET®), Nurses Specialised in Wound Ostomy Continence Canada® (NSWOCC®), Association Coloproctology Nurse (ACPN) and physiotherapy groups: Association of Chartered Physiotherapists In Oncology and Palliative Care (ACPOPC) and the Pelvic, Obstetrics and Gynaecology Physiotherapy (POGP), with others pending. The recommendations are aimed at ALL medical, exercise and healthcare professionals working with individuals having stoma surgery or living with a stoma and it is hoped they will provide education, information and support that is desperately needed specifically about safe exercise, physical activity and core abdominal rehabilitation. From the 24th to 26th of September the European Pressure Advisory Ulcer Panel (EPUAP) was delighted to welcome 555 delegates, from 37 different countries, to its annual meeting in the Finlandia Hall in the beautiful city of Helsinki, Finland. The busy scientific programme included a broad range of topics relating to the prevention and treatment of pressure ulcers/ injury. To coincide with the launch of the 2025 updated version of the International Pressure Ulcer Prevention and Treatment Guideline, a preconference workshop was held to highlight the key updates for participants. A further conference highlight was a panel discussion on moral distress and missed care in relation to PU/I prevention and treatment. Also very well received was the Meet the Expert forum where clinicians, researchers and industry representatives were brought together with PU/I experts from a variety of fields to explore

specialist topics. We were also very happy to have patient involvement in the session on the impact of pressure ulcers on body image and social interaction. Looking to the future of healthcare, another highlight was the session on digital twins and the use of AI in pressure ulcer care and prevention. The conference also had a thriving social programme with a reception in Helsinki City Hall preceded by, the now traditional, Stop Pressure Ulcer Walk. This culminated in the presentation of a Declaration to the Finnish Parliament (see more detail below). The warm Finnish welcome and sterling work of the local organising committee made for an extremely convivial event where the exchange of scientific knowledge and making new connections was to the fore. As the curtain comes down on EPUAP 2025 in Helsinki, we look forward to Dublin, Ireland (9th to 11th September 2026) where the prevention and treatment of pressure ulcers/injury will be the key focus.

WCET® supports initiatives to stop pressure ulcer/injuries

Worldwide Pressure Injury Prevention Day (STOP Pressure Ulcer Day) occurs each year on the 3rd Thursday of November, this year it occurs on Thursday November 20th. Around the globe interested parties in the specialties of wound, ostomy, continence/enterostomal therapy/tissue viability and quality and safety, join together to hold awareness and educational events. Despite our growth in relation to advanced knowledge and availability in prevention technology



global pressure ulcer/injury prevalence is said to be around 13% while global hospital acquired (HAPI) rates sit around 8% (Zhaoyu Li et al, 2020). There is global consensus that pressure ulcer/injury causes significant burden in relation to pain and suffering and reduced quality of life (QOL) and increased costs; there is also consensus that the vast majority are preventable. We congratulate the EPUAP on signing the *Declaration to Stop Pressure Ulcers*, and for presenting it to members of the Government of Finland in Helsinki (Dr Päivi Sillanaukee, Special Envoy for Health & Well-being of Finland. Dr Paula Risikko, First Deputy Speaker of the Finnish Parliament).



EPUAP Declaration to Stop Pressure Ulcers

The European Pressure Ulcer Advisory Panel (EPUAP) presented their declaration to stop pressure ulcers at their annual meeting in Helsinki. Calling for governments to recognise that pressure ulcers are preventable and advocating for integrating evidence-based prevention into national healthcare systems.

EPUAP Declaration

Declaration by EPUAP at the Helsinki EPUAP Annual Meeting 2025 The prevention of pressure ulcers is a patient safety issue

The STOP Pressure Ulcer Day is held globally every November. It aims to raise awareness about the prevalence of pressure ulcers (also known as bedsores or decubitus ulcers), highlight the importance of prevention, and thereby promote evidence-based management in care for both prevention and treatment.

Pressure ulcers are injuries to the skin and underlying tissue that can affect individuals of any age in any setting. Their prevention must be a daily priority.

Despite advancements in healthcare, pressure ulcers remain a significant adverse event and common complication in complex patients. The growing number of individuals requiring intensive and prolonged medical care, arising from aging populations and complexity of care, has contributed to a higher risk of pressure ulcers. They are painful, increase the risk of infection and mortality, compromise patient safety, and reduce quality of life. Globally, the cost of treating pressure ulcers is estimated to account for 2% to 4% of total healthcare expenditure.

The majority of pressure ulcers are preventable. Prevention must be embedded into every stage of the care pathways and continuum — in hospitais, long-term care facilities, home care and during patient transport. Achieving this goal requires a shared vision, strategic leadership, consistent policies, a commitment to prevention, and continuous staff education.

We call on governments and policymakers to recognize and acknowledge pressure ulcer prevention as a key patient safety issue and to take decisive action by integrating evidence-based prevention strategies into national healthcare systems. Furthermore, we urge the allocation of dedicated funding for professional education and scientific research in this field.

EPUAP Helsinki Declaration calls for pressure ulcer prevention to become a core health priority in Europe

Signed during the EPUAP 2025 Conference in Helsinki, the Declaration urges governments and healthcare leaders to take coordinated, evidence-based action for patient safety and quality of care.

Helsinki, 24th September 2025 — During the opening ceremony of the European Pressure Ulcer Advisory Panel (EPUAP) Annual Meeting 2025 in Helsinki, the EPUAP leadership officially signed the Helsinki Declaration and presented it to the Special Envoy for Health and Well-being of Finland. The signing marked a landmark step in Europe's collective commitment to preventing pressure ulcers — one of the most common yet largely preventable complications in modern healthcare.

The EPUAP Helsinki Declaration serves as a policy appeal to governments, healthcare authorities, professional organisations, and decision-makers across Europe to recognise pressure ulcer prevention as a fundamental component of patient safety, quality, and dignity in care. It calls for the systematic integration of evidence-based prevention strategies, education, and research within national and institutional health policies.

A Strategic Framework for Prevention

The Declaration outlines three key objectives that form the foundation of a comprehensive approach to pressure ulcer prevention:

- 1. Raise political and institutional awareness Pressure ulcers are not only a clinical concern but a system-wide health issue that reflects the quality and safety of care. The Declaration calls for stronger policy recognition, leadership, and accountability to address the human and economic burden associated with preventable pressure ulcers.
- **2. Promote preventive action across all care settings** Evidence shows that most pressure ulcers can be prevented through systematic risk assessment, early detection, and adherence to established care protocols. The Declaration encourages healthcare institutions—from hospitals to community care—to embed evidence-based guidelines and standards into everyday practice and to use prevention outcomes as measurable indicators of care quality.
- **3. Strengthen education, research, and innovation** Sustainable prevention depends on continuous professional training, data-driven decision-making, and investment in research. The Declaration calls for national and international support for multidisciplinary education, research collaboration, and innovation to further advance prevention science and implementation.

From Treatment to Prevention: A Shift in Health Policy and Culture

With the Helsinki Declaration, EPUAP emphasises that pressure ulcer prevention must move from being a reactive clinical task to a proactive, strategic health priority. Protecting skin integrity should be seen as a marker of excellence in patient safety and a fundamental right to quality care.

The Declaration embodies both a policy roadmap and a moral commitment, inviting healthcare leaders, clinicians, and educators to unite behind a shared vision of "Quality and timely prevention of Pressure Ulcers" across Europe. It underscores that preventing avoidable suffering is not only a medical responsibility but also an ethical and economic imperative that strengthens healthcare systems and safeguards patient dignity.

Next Steps: Expanding the Helsinki initiative across Europe

Building on the momentum created in Helsinki, EPUAP aims to follow up on the success of engaging governmental representatives and to replicate this collaborative approach in other European countries where EPUAP Trustees are active. The first such national follow-up will take place in the Czech Republic on

November 12th 2025, during a Round Table organised in collaboration with the Ministry of Health, focusing on national strategies for pressure ulcer prevention and patient safety. Similar initiatives are expected to be launched in additional countries over the coming months, reinforcing the shared European commitment to sustainable prevention and care quality.

The 19th WCET® Nanjing Enterostomal Therapy Nursing Education Program (ETNEP) has started

On August 31st, 2025, the 19th WCET® Nanjing Enterostomal Therapy Nursing Education Program (ETNEP), co-sponsored by the Jiangsu Nursing Association and the Nursing School of Nanjing Medical University, successfully commenced. The 14th Xi'an Enterostomal Therapist Nurse Education Program wraps up

The 14th cohort of Xi'an Enterostomal Therapist Nurse Education Program has successfully completed its intensive 12-week training program, graduating 26 new certified Enterostomal Therapist. Drawing participants from 11 provinces and municipalities across China, the participants continued the school's tradition of small-class, elite education delivered in strict accordance with the World Council of Enterostomal Therapist®s (WCET®) standards.

A rigorous, evidence-based curriculum

The program integrates 230 hours of theoretical instruction with six weeks of immersive clinical practice. The curriculum covers core modules such as stoma care, stoma complications, wound management, continence care, and the use of specialised nursing products. Seven comprehensive assessments ensure consistent academic and clinical standards throughout the training.

Global and local expertise

The faculty comprised 97 educators and clinicians, including two international experts. Distinguished guest lecturers included Ms Louise Forest Lalande, past WCET® President, Professor Keryln Carville from Curtin University, Australia, and National leaders such as Zhou Yujie of Peking University Third Hospital and Yajuan (Julie) Weng of Nanjing Drum Tower Hospital, all of whom delivered cutting-edge lectures for the participants.

Blended learning and hands-on practice

The program adopted a hybrid model that integrated theoretical lectures with hands-on workshops. Daily self-study periods and interactive seminars fostered active learning, while targeted skill labs covered core procedures such as stoma care, wound debridement, compression therapy and ankle brachia index (ABI) measurement.

Clinical practicum: Standardised and immersive

Clinical training took place across 16 hospitals and 20 practice sites. A unique "one-to-two" mentorship model paired each senior ET nurse with two trainees, ensuring high-quality instruction. Clinical rotations included observation of stoma surgeries, urodynamic studies, outpatient stoma care, ward rounds, inpatient consultations, burn wound care, and continence management.

Outcome and impact

All 26 participants passed the final assessments and received the International Enterostomal Therapist certificate, becoming the newest cohort of specialised nursing professionals.

From April 7th to 10th 2025, the University Medical Centre Ljubljana (UMCLJ) had the great honor of hosting Professor Dr Juliano Teixeira Moraes and Dr Giulia Villa, distinguished representatives of the WCET® Education Committee. The purpose of their visit was to evaluate and support the Wound, Ostomy and Continence (Enterostomal Therapy) Nursing Education Course in Slovenia. It was coordinated by the Nurses Counselling Service at UMCLJ.

continuously running for more than 30 years. She introduced the 12-month curriculum, the four-module structure, mentorship network, and collaboration with the University of Ljubljana. Special emphasis was placed on the inclusion of continence care content and the strong practical component of the course.

Following the presentations, guests visited several

clinical learning stations within UMCLJ, including the Departments of Vascular Diseases, Thoracic Surgery, Urology, and Abdominal Surgery, where they met clinical mentors and students in training.

Educational and academic visits

On Wednesday, April 9th, the delegation visited the Faculty of Health Sciences, University of Ljubljana, where they were welcomed by Dr Manca Pajnič, Head of the Nursing Department. Guests toured the library and discussed academic cooperation and access to educational resources for ET students. Later that day, the WCET® representatives met with participants of the current ET course. The meeting provided valuable insight into students' learning experiences, motivation, and perspectives on the program. Individual discussions followed, enabling open dialogue about clinical practice and educational challenges.

Evaluation and closing session

The final evaluation meeting was held on Thursday, April 10th, at UMCLJ. The discussion highlighted the high quality, structure, and international alignment of the Slovenian WOC Nursing Education Course.

The visitors commended:

- · the dedication of educators and mentors,
- the integration of theoretical and clinical learning, and
- the strong inter-institutional cooperation among UMCLJ, the Oncology Institute, General Hospital Jesenice, the Ljubljana Health Centre, and IATROS Medical Centre.

Dr Villa and Professor Moraes expressed support for Slovenia's efforts to establish a national specialisation in Wound, Stoma and Continence Nursing, emphasising that formal recognition of the ET role would significantly strengthen the profession's development and sustainability.

Reflections and future directions

The visit concluded in a spirit of gratitude and professional inspiration. The WCET® evaluation
