

Rethinking Recovery

A new approach to exercise and rehabilitation after stoma surgery







As a Health Care Professional, you know it's important for your stoma patients to get active after surgery, free from fear, and with a recovery programme tailored to the individual, there's nothing stopping them.

The me+ recovery programme has been empowering stoma patients since 2017. Using a series of evidence-based movement and breathing exercises, it aims to manage intra-abdominal pressure, build core strength and **reduce their risk of parastomal hernia**.


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In memoriam – Professor Dr Pavle Košorok 29th June 1944 – 3rd August 2023

Dear WCET® members, friends, colleagues, and those whose lives he touched,

With heavy hearts, we remember the life and contributions of an exceptional individual, Prof Dr Pavle Košorok, MD, PhD, a dedicated consultant surgeon whose passion for healing touched countless lives. He passed away on 3rd August 2023, leaving behind a legacy that continues to inspire all who knew him.

Born on 29th June 1944, Prof Košorok's journey in the medical field began at the University of Ljubljana in Slovenia, where he earned his medical degree in 1969. He went on to specialise in general surgery, earning his Masters degree in 1979 and achieving his PhD in 1992. Prof Košorok's thirst for knowledge led him to London's St. Bartholomeus Hospital, Guy's Hospital, and St. Mark's Hospital, as well as Royal Infirmary in Leeds, under the guidance of Prof Golligher. He expanded his horizons with experiences at the Cleveland Clinic and the Lahey Clinic in 1980, and at the Enterostomal Therapy School at the Cleveland Clinic in 1990.

Prof Košorok's impact extended beyond the operating room. He served as a consultant surgeon at UMC Ljubljana's Department of Abdominal Surgery from 1976 to 1994, leaving an imprint of expertise and compassion on his patients. In 1994, he founded the latros Medical Centre, a hub of excellence in general surgery, proctology, enterostomal therapy and incontinence care. As its Director and Clinical Lead, he created a nurturing environment centred around patients' wellbeing.

His contributions extended beyond clinical practice. He was a respected Professor of Surgery at the Medical Faculty of the University of Ljubljana, Slovenia. His academic pursuits were mirrored in his extensive involvement in professional organisations. He held membership in esteemed bodies such as the Medical Chamber of Slovenia, the Slovenian Association for Gastroenterology and Hepatology, the European Society for Coloproctology, Mediterranean Society for Coloproctology and the International Society of University Colon and Rectal Surgeons (ISUCRS), to name a few.

His commitment to medical education and collaboration was evident in his roles as President of the Slovenian Society for Coloproctology, National Delegate of the European Society of Coloproctology, and past President of the Mediterranean Society for Coloproctology. Prof Košorok's leadership extended to organising pivotal events, including the 17th Meeting of the World Council of Enterostomal Therapists® Society in Ljubljana in 2008, showcasing his dedication to advancing medical knowledge on a global stage.

Prof Pavle Košorok's legacy lives on in the hearts of all whose lives he touched. His passion for healing, commitment to education, and unwavering dedication will continue to inspire those who follow in his footsteps. Our thoughts are with his family, friends, colleagues, and patients as we remember and celebrate a life well-lived.

Dr Elizabeth A Ayello 2023 recipient of the INANE Margaret Comerford Freda Award

Congratulations to Dr Elizabeth A. Ayello, PhD, MS, BSN, ETN, RN, CWON, MAPWCA, FAAN, who, on 1st August 2023, received the Margaret Comerford Freda Award for Editorial Leadership in Nursing Publication from the International Academy of Nursing Editors (INANE) at their annual conference in Dublin, Ireland. It is the highest award given by INANE.

This award, known as the INANE Editor of the Year Award for Leadership and Mentorship, is given annually to an outstanding nursing editor in honor of Dr Margaret Freda, EdD, RN, FAAN, a past leader of INANE and Editor-in-Chief of MCN, The American Journal of Maternal Child Nursing. Immediately following the award presentation, Dr Ayello gave an outstanding conference-ending keynote speech entitled Nurse editor – an art and science: a powerful global influencer and mentor. Major concepts from her important and well received presentation were:

- Use every opportunity to make your core value dreams come true.
- Always acknowledge those who educated and supported you along your journey – most achievements come from team efforts.
- Gather and empower your teams; interprofessional teams are best to support change.
- Use your team members' strengths.
- Changing practices and healthcare systems is not easy, have a coordinated science / evidence-based and knowledge translation approach is effective.
- Education changes lives.

Dr Ayello ended the presentation with two of her favorite quotes. One is an old African proverb that she

learned while teaching in Cape Town South Africa: "If you want to go fast – go alone. If you want to go far – go together." The other is "Nothing is impossible, the very word says I'm possible."

During the INANE conference some nursing editors gave presentations about how they occasionally have articles translated into another language and the difficulties of providing translation in publications. Attendees were amazed when Dr Ayello spoke about the WCET® Journal and bullETin with language translations. They were impressed to learn that, under her leadership, and in conjunction with the publisher and the Editorial and Executive Boards, the WCET® Journal began regularly publishing its entire quarterly journal in multiple languages. No editor knew of any other journal regularly published in five languages. The editors were amazed that she worked with a team to get the cost of translation sponsored. The editors were complimentary of her creativity and achievement to have the journal available in so many languages to improve ostomy, skin, wound and continence care globally.

WCET® members have long known Elizabeth A. Ayello and her impact on WCET®. She joined the board in 2004 as the volunteer Journal Executive Editor, a role she served in for ten years. She continues to serve as Executive Editor Emeritus and supports our current journal Editor Dr Jenny Prentice who has continued to enhance the WCET® Journal. She is the Immediate Past President of WCET® (2018-2022) and continues to be an Associate Editor for the WCET® bullETin. Dr Ayello then was elected and served as Vice President (2014-2018) and then WCET® President (2018–2022). During her tenure, the WCET® Executive Board persevered through the challenges of COVID and broadening WCET®'s collaborations with numerous international associations. She is presently the International liaison for the World Union of Wound Healing Societies (WUWHS) and received their Lifetime Achievement Award in 2022 in Abu Dhabi.

Elizabeth A. Ayello's long and extensive nursing career has included clinical bedside practice, research, education, author/editor of over 200 articles or book chapters, as well as leadership positions in several associations. In her early career, Dr Ayello's practice included being a staff nurse and a clinical nurse specialist, the longest role in her career, at Booth Memorial Medical Center in Queens, New York City. She has held faculty positions at Queensboro Community College, New York University College of Nursing, and Excelsior University School of Nursing. For over 20 years she has been Faculty at the International Interprofessional Wound Care Group (IIWCG), under

the auspices of the University of Toronto, teaching in Toronto, Canada, Cape Town, South Africa, Tehran, Iran, and Abu Dhabi, UAE. She founded WoundPedia-Manila, a basic and intermediate course held in the Philippines. Dr Ayello was awarded the title of Professor from Zhengzhou Medical University in China. For many years, she has taught both in person and virtually at several WCET® ETNEPs in China.





World Council of Enterostomal Therapists® site visit: Glasgow and Edinburgh, Scotland: purpose and background

The World Council of Enterostomal Therapists® (WCET®) holds a biennial congress on even years, bringing together globally renowned speakers and presenters, nurse specialists in the field, and corporate sponsors who display and greet guests on the exhibition floor and give presentations in smaller symposium formats. Because the WCET® is a global association, the congresses move from continent to continent to enable as many members as possible to attend.

In 2024, the congress will be held in Glasgow, Scotland. It had been scheduled originally for 2020 but had to be postponed because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The arrangements had been made in 2019 by the previous management company and the previous congress coordinator.

The Barcami Lane team members on the WCET® account

are: Susan Barber, Executive Director; Karen Hill, Meeting Planner; and Melissa Striharsky, Coordinator. Because the arrangements had previously been made, the Barcami Lane team had not had the opportunity to engage in a site visit. It was determined that it was essential that we do so to see the entire event as an Executive Board (EB) member or a delegate or speaker might see it, including not only the venues but also the methods of travel in and around Glasgow and Edinburgh.

Glasgow Convention Bureau

The Glasgow Convention Bureau, at http://glasgowconventionbureau.com/, has been supportive, informative and very helpful throughout the process. The team made hotel reservations for us, made appointments at the reception venues, made appointments with the team at the convention centre,

and hired a driver to get us from place to place. They provided a detailed agenda for the four days that we were in Glasgow.

Mid-week, we had a meeting with the team who delved into the mission of the association and the goals of the congress. They know the area, of course, and know the people at various medical centres and hospitals and made recommendations as to who could provide relevant and important educational presentations. They even knew where to go for pigs' trotters for the debridement workshop. Their follow up was timely and thorough.

Travel including flight and local transportation – Edinburgh to Glasgow

Because the EB meeting will be in Edinburgh prior to the Congress, we flew into Edinburgh (direct non-stop from Boston, USA). There we were met by the congress coordinator, Alison Crawshaw, who is a life-long resident of Edinburgh. We took the tram to Haymarket station where we got on the train to Glasgow. In Glasgow train station, we were met by Laura Mackay and our driver Steven who took us to the first venue where our reception, for approximately 800 people, will be.

Venues – receptions

Platform – we were met by the director of Platform for a tour of the venue. This was followed by a tasting of food that the executive chef prepared specifically for us. It included many options, not all of which we would choose, but from which we would be choosing for our guests. It was a remarkable display and certainly eased our minds as we move forward with the planning of this event in this very unusual space.

Hotels – site visits (x12)

In addition to seeing the hotels that we stayed in, we had site visits at 10 other hotels in one day. Our morning hotels were within a small walking radius. The afternoon hotels were spread out and our driver Steven was able to take us easily to each. Each hotel was different, so we had quite a lot of exposure to the benefits of each. All these appointments were set up by the Glasgow Convention Bureau. We were able to prioritise several and de-prioritise several, leaving us with about six that we will be discussing.

Site-seeing and things to do

We took the City Sightseeing Glasgow Hop-On Hop-off bus tour, tickets provided by the Glasgow Convention Bureau. This took about an hour and drove all around the City Centre area, the university area, and the Glasgow Finnieston area. It is very informative and provides a lot of history of the area. We sampled several restaurants in the City Centre and Finnieston.

Green initiatives and LEZ

Sustainable Glasgow proposes reducing the city's carbon missions through improved energy management and the development of new integrated low carbon energy systems for the city. The initiative is

pervasive throughout the city and includes efforts at hotels and venues to implement and practice climate-friendly policies. The city is a Low Emissions Zone (LEZ) and cars that do not comply, primarily due to age, will be ticketed.

The city strongly encourages walking and bicycling.

Edinburgh

At the end of our appointments in Glasgow, we took the train back to Edinburgh. The Executive Board will spend up to 3 days in Edinburgh for an in-person meeting and strategy session. This will take place at Kimpton, which we toured to see the meeting space and sleeping rooms.

Results

This trip was highly successful in that we saw all the venues for receptions, exhibits, meeting rooms; we sampled food offerings; and we viewed many hotels that might be (or might not be) appropriate for our guests. We travelled on the trains, trams and buses, just as our guests would be doing. The Hunan Nursing Association held the 14th Enterostomal Therapist (ET) Graduation Ceremony in Hunan Province from 18–20th May 2023. After 3 months of hard work, 36 nursing graduates, from all over the country, successfully obtained the International Enterostomal Therapist Graduation Certificate issued

by the World Council of Enterostomal Therapists® (WCET®). This conference focused on the new progress of stoma wound and continence (SWC) nursing and pressure injury management. Professor Zhu Xiaomei, Head Nurse of the Stoma and Wound Clinic of Hunan Cancer Hospital, shared the Interpretation of China Anti-Cancer Association (CACA) guidelines for the treatment of malignant fungating wounds which elaborated from the integrated assessment and integrated nursing care of malignant fungating wounds, providing more standardised and professional methods and ideas for clinical medical staff to deal with malignant fungating wounds.

Professor Hu Yingbin, Director of the Department of Colorectal Surgery of Hunan Cancer Hospital, elaborated on the strategy of anal preservation for low rectal cancer from a medical point of view, emphasising that anal preservation is not for the sake of anal preservation; the primary consideration is the effect of surgical treatment of tumours, and it is necessary to firmly establish the concept of neuroprotection and adhere to the principle of "nerve as the core, anatomy along the space".

Dr Zhou Jie, Department of Burn and Plastic Surgery, Xiangya Hospital, Central South University, gave an in-depth talk on *Early biofilm treatment strategy for refractory wounds – interpretation of international expert consensus on 'wound hygiene'*, the mechanism of delayed wound healing by wound biofilm and the four steps of implementing wound hygiene, namely cleaning the wound and surrounding area, debridement, reshaping the wound edge, and effectively managing the exudate.

Professor Zhang Qijian, head nurse of Xiangya Hospital, Central South University, introduced the latest edition of the best practice principles of cutting edge wound infection in 2022, on the *Interpretation of the guidelines for the treatment of infected wounds*, and made a detailed interpretation from the aspects of wound infection risk, assessment, diagnosis, management, etc. Advocating that the overall assessment and management of wound infection is a key element in the treatment of wound infection.

Ms Yang presented the definition, classification and treatment of faecal incontinence, as well as the epidemiology, prevention and treatment of incontinence dermatitis to the participants, providing guidance and help for incontinence nursing work.

Professor Tu Li, Head Nurse of Gastrointestinal, Thyroid and Vascular Surgery of the First Affiliated Hospital of Hunan University of Chinese Medicine, made a special literature interpretation on Protecting skin, ensuring integrity.

This meeting invited Professor Wang Chunxue, Director of the Department of Neuropsychiatry and Clinical Psychology of Beijing Tiantan Hospital, to give a live lecture on the theme of *Using psychological techniques to improve the quality of life of patients with ostomy*, to improve the quality of life of patients from the perspective of psychology, and to bring inspiration and guidance to everyone. Peking University Health Science Center ETNEP receives site visit review from WCET® Education Committee

From 13th–14th June, the staff of Peking University Health Science Center (PKUHSC) ETNEP received the site visit review from Carol Stott and Shuangshuang Zhang, from the Education Committee of the WCET®.

Firstly, Deng Jun, the executive principal of the ETNEP from Peking

University First Hospital (PUFH), gave a report on the development of the program and theoretical teaching and clinical teaching work. Carol Stott and Shuangshuang Zhang then interviewed program leaders and representatives of the teachers about theoretical courses and internship arrangements, teacher qualifications, and clinical practice patterns. They listened to feedback from student representatives from previous programs and current students, as well as reviewing the training materials over the past five years.

Subsequently, Carol Stott and Shuangshuang Zhang visited five clinical practice hospitals, including PUFH, the Pediatric Medicine Department of the Seventh Medical Center of the General Hospital of the People's

Liberation Army of China, Beijing Hospital, Peking University Oncology Hospital, and Beijing Friendship Hospital affiliated with Capital Medical University. By speaking with actual clinical patients and by inspecting nurses' specialised practices and health education on wound ostomy and incontinence care, the experts provided specific and targeted guidance for improving quality and efficiency for both clinical practice and clinical teaching.

After investigating five representative bases, the experts appreciated our efforts in ET training, highly evaluated wound clinical practice, provided constructive suggestions for improving the efficiency and quality of ostomy care, and also encouraged us to enrich the continence related content, emphasised the equal importance of health education and specialised nursing operations, encouraged us to continue our hard work aimed at continually improving and providing high quality of education and training.

Since its establishment in 2004, the PUHSC ETNEP has always committed to educational vision of *Responsibility, Quality, and Influence*. This program is managed by the PUHSC and hosted and executed by Peking University

First Hospital. It is delivered once a year and trains 22–28 ET trainees in each session. So far, 18 sessions were completed, and 351 ETs graduated covering 31 provinces/autonomous regions/municipalities across China, including Xinjiang and Tibet.

The site review is a great opportunity for us to verify and improve. We will continue to make efforts to improve the curriculum and welcome the next review in 2027 with higher teaching quality, furthermore we will make a continuous contribution to the cultivation of ETs in China.

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Training experience in Wenzhou International Enterostomy Therapist School Student from Wenzhou ETNEP, Second affiliated Hospital of Wenzhou Medical University

Enterostomal therapists play a significant role in the medical field, such as handling various difficult enterostomies, as well as providing professional and personalised nursing services for patients to facilitate the recovery of their health. Although I did not directly engage in the treatment of

enterostomies in my previous work, I have learned the existence of enterostomal therapists. With great intention to win the opportunity to delve deeper into this field, I hope to broaden my horizons, and improve myself.

Therefore, I have paid much attention and would like to extend my appreciation to attend the 14th training class of Wenzhou Enterostomal Therapist Nursing Education Programs (ETNEP) for a period of 3 months. Here, I'm able to receive professional guidance from first-class teachers both domestically and internationally, and study enterostomies with a group of classmates who are also interested in this field together, so that it's possible for me to successfully become an enterostomal therapist after graduation.

In the stage of theoretical learning, the professional attitude and detailed explanations of the teachers made us deeply aware of the complexity and precision of enterostomal care. Whether it is from stoma evaluation to cleaning, or from wound observation to dressing change, every step should be standardised and proficient, as well as rigorous and meticulous. The class enabled us to learn cutting-edge theoretical knowledge and traditional Chinese medicine wound treatment techniques with the characteristics of China. After class, classmates exchanged experiences, shared insights, supported each other, and made progress together, making me deeply recognise the power of a team.

We learned from the guidance of senior nurses in the clinical practice setting, I was lucky enough to have been exposed to various real cases, enabling me to witness the entire process of enterostomal healing, and recognise the different roles played by ETs in various hospitals. However, whether it is an independent outpatient clinic or ward consultation, we also need to attach importance to the psychological needs of patients in addition to professional nursing techniques.

Besides, we have the necessity to learn how to communicate better with patients, as well as care for and make them feel relieved.

This training experience made me learn a lot. Principal Ms. Chen has deeply devoted herself to the field of ET treatment, building a bridge for international exchange for us. Under the guidance of experts and professors who have spared no effort and even travelled back and forth to teach us on the same day, we have been deeply influenced by their spirit of pursuing excellence and focusing on exploration. In the meantime, the enthusiastic and meticulous attitude of nurses and teachers have guided us to continuously provide nursing services of higher quality for patients. Based on this training, I will make unremitting efforts to continuously strengthen my professional knowledge and skills, while paying more attention to the needs of patients and team collaboration. Only in this way can I make greater contributions to the enterostomal field.





Operation of a public service for people with stomas in Southern Brazil

People with stomas go through important changes in their way of life, whether physical or mental. These changes have a direct impact on their self-care and quality of life¹. The aim of the professional stoma nurse is to reintegrate the person with the stoma into society, educate them in self-care and provide them

with a better quality of life. Caring for people with a stoma requires several dimensions of care, considering the changes caused by the surgical procedure such as the physiology of the gastrointestinal or urinary tract, self-esteem and body image, as well as other changes in their lives due to the presence of the stoma, which is a challenge to the care provided by health professionals². The role of the stoma nurse, through educational

practice, helps facilitate the adaptation of this new health condition, resolving doubts and motivating these individuals' autonomy³.

The stomatherapy service

Porto Alegre is Rio Grande do Sul's state capital, where the service for people with stomas in this case is based. It is located in the south of Brazil and has an estimated population of 1,332,570. The state is responsible for the purchase and distribution to all 497 municipalities. It has a computerised program where all people with an elimination stoma can register through the municipal health departments and begin to receive the necessary materials to care for their stoma; throughout the state, there are currently 11,428 people with stomas registered with the government program.

Porto Alegre has 1,792 people with stomas registered with the state government's program. It has three stomatherapy services for the care of people with stomas, and the site in this report has 645 people with stomas registered, it operates from Monday to Friday, from 7am to 12pm and from 1.30pm to 3.30pm, and is responsible for organising the service, including new patient registrations in the computerised system, nursing consultations and distributing materials.

The service team is made up of a stomatherapist nurse, two nursing technicians, a telephone operator, an administrative assistant, a proctologist, a nutritionist, and a psychologist. Nursing consultations for people with ostomies take place from 8am to 12pm. The nurse's job is to carry out a comprehensive assessment of patients with ostomies, who must have a consultation at least once a year. She also helps with the distribution and organisation of materials, managing the service, stock control, and ordering materials for the state. The nursing technicians distribute the materials to patients and/or their families, register new patients, and help organise the service and the materials in stock.

The service has two nursing offices, with a bathroom, a waiting room, a bathroom adapted for people with ostomies, a room for distributing materials, and storage rooms. Most of the time, the stoma patients seen at the stomatherapy service are referred by the doctors or nurses at the hospitals where they underwent the surgical procedure to have the stoma made, or by the team at their basic health unit. In order to register to receive the materials, you need to be present during the service's opening hours, carrying some documents such as proof of residence, identification documents, medical report, and the Unified Health System (UHS) card. If the patient is unable to attend the service, a family member or a close person indicated by the patient can open the register and pick up the materials, which are distributed on a monthly basis.

The registration and dispensing of materials is done by the Rio Grande do Sul State computerised system, called Management of Users with Disabilities (MUD), which has been in place since April 2007, and is responsible for organising the data, costs and distribution of materials to the registered population. There are 56 different items available to registered patients, such as drainable or closed, flat or convex, intestinal or urinary bypass bags, as well as adjuvant materials, which are: peristomal skin cleanser; powder for skin protection; protective film-forming spray for the skin; activated charcoal filter; support belt for collection bags; barrier pastes for skin protection and leveling.

Patients with a stoma are entitled to receive eight collection bags a month, as well as adjuvant materials;

however, depending on the case, an increase in this amount can be requested from the state, with justification from the stomatherapist nurse. Cases that require a greater number of bags include chemotherapy and poorly located stomas, where it is difficult to keep the collection equipment in place for longer.

Some of the activities carried out are the nursing consultation, which includes anamnesis (patients' recollection of medical history), changing the collecting equipment, assessing the stoma, training in colonic irrigation, active listening, reassessment of the quantities of materials needed to carry out self-care, home visits, support groups, requesting materials from the state, a duty roster and supervising the staff.

The stomatherapy service is a training ground for undergraduate nursing students, the public health residency program, and the specialisation course in stomatherapy nursing.

There is a complexity in caring for stoma patients, as they are people who are psychologically vulnerable due to the physiological changes that occur when they have a stoma. Coming to terms with this new reality imposed in many cases by some pathology or trauma, accepting oneself, and learning to handle collecting equipment, be it a urostomy, nephrostomy, ileostomy, and/or colostomy and their respective care, requires a lot of discernment on the part of both the team providing guidance and the patient using the device. The work of the stomatherapist nurse is essential in the lives of users, since they work directly in health education, promoting guidance, so that the user can carry out their self-care when possible, enabling a better quality of life and helping them to adapt to this new health condition.

The experience of carrying out a nursing consultation with a stoma patient adds technical and scientific knowledge. Learning to understand each patient, providing humanised care, fostering self-care and the autonomy of these individuals, and showing that they are capable of a normal life, even after the stoma has been made, is of great value.

Funcionamento de um serviço público de atendimento às pessoas com estomia no Sul do Brasil

Pessoas comestomia passam por mudanças importantes no seu modo de vida, sejam elas físicas ou mentais. Tais mudanças impactam diretamente no seu autocuidado e na sua qualidade de vida¹. O profissional enfermeiro estomaterapeuta tem como objetivo reinserir a pessoa com estomia na sociedade, educar para o autocuidado e proporcionar uma maior qualidade de vida. O atendimento às pessoas com estomia demanda diversas dimensões de cuidado, considerando as

mudanças ocasionadas pelo procedimento cirúrgico, tais como: a fisiologia do aparelho gastrointestinal ou urinário, a autoestima e a imagem corporal, além de outras modificações em sua vida devido à presença do estoma, o que constitui um desafio ao cuidado prestado pelos profissionais de saúde². A atuação do enfermeiro estomaterapeuta por meio da prática educativa, colabora de forma facilitadora na adaptação dessa nova condição de saúde, sanando as dúvidas e motivando a autonomia desses indivíduos³.

O serviço de estomaterapia

Porto Alegre é a capital do Estado do Rio Grande do Sul, onde está inserido o serviço de atendimento às pessoas com estomia deste relato. Situa-se no sul do Brasil e possui uma população estimada em 1.332.570 habitantes. O Estado é o responsável pela compra e distribuição para todos os 497 municípios, possui um programa informatizado onde todas as pessoas com estomia de eliminação podem realizar o cadastro por meio das secretarias municipais de saúde e passam a receber os materiais necessários para o cuidado com seu estoma, em todo Estado atualmente, existem 11.428 pessoas com estomas cadastradas no programa do governo.

Porto Alegre possui 1.792 pessoas com estomias cadastradas no programa do governo do Estado, apresenta três Serviços de Estomaterapia para o atendimento às pessoas com estomia, e o local do referido relato possui 645 pessoas com estomias cadastradas, funciona de segunda à sexta-feira, das 7h às 12h horas e das 13h30min às 15h30min, sendo responsável pela organização do serviço, a inclusão de novos cadastros de pacientes no sistema informatizado, consultas de Enfermagem e distribuição dos materiais.

A equipe do serviço é composta por uma enfermeira estomaterapeuta, duas técnicas de Enfermagem, uma telefonista, uma assistente administrativa, um médico proctologista, uma nutricionista e um psicólogo. As consultas de Enfermagem para o atendimento às pessoas com estomias ocorrem das 08h às 12h, a enfermeira tem como função a avaliação integral dos pacientes com estomias, que devem passar por uma consulta pelo menos uma vez ao ano. Além disso, auxilia na distribuição e organização dos materiais, no gerenciamento do serviço, controle de estoque, solicitação de materiais para o Estado. As técnicas de Enfermagem fazem a distribuição dos materiais aos pacientes e/ou familiares, e realizam os novos cadastros e auxiliam na organização do serviço e dos materiais do estoque.

O serviço conta com dois consultórios de Enfermagem com banheiro, sala de espera, banheiro adaptado para pessoas com estomia, sala para distribuição de materiais e salas para armazenamento deles. Os pacientes estomizados atendidos no Serviço de Estomaterapia, na maioria das vezes, são encaminhados pelos médicos ou enfermeiros dos hospitais onde realizaram o procedimento cirúrgico para a confecção do estoma, ou também pela equipe da sua unidade básica de saúde. Para realizar o cadastro para o recebimento dos materiais é necessário o comparecimento presencial durante o horário de funcionamento do serviço, portando alguns documentos como comprovante de residência, documento de identificação, laudo médico e cartão do Sistema Único de Saúde (SUS). No caso de o paciente não conseguir comparecer ao Serviço, um familiar ou indivíduo próximo indicado por ele pode abrir o cadastro e retirar os materiais, os materiais são distribuídos mensalmente.

O cadastro e a dispensação de materiais são feitos pelo sistema informatizado do Estado do Rio Grande do Sul, denominado de Gerenciamento de Usuários com Deficiência (GUD), que existe desde abril de 2007, sendo o sistema responsável pela organização dos dados, dos custos e da distribuição dos materiais à população cadastrada. Existem 56 itens diferentes disponibilizados aos pacientes cadastrados, como bolsas drenáveis ou fechadas, planas ou convexas, de derivação intestinal ou urinária, além dos materiais adjuvantes, que são: limpador de pele periestomal; pó para a proteção da pele; *spray* formador de película protetora para a pele; filtro de carvão ativado; cinto de sustentação para as bolsas coletoras; pastas barreiras para a proteção e nivelamento da pele.

Os pacientes estomizados têm direito a receber oito bolsas coletoras por mês, além dos materiais adjuvantes; porém, dependendo do caso, pode ser solicitado ao Estado, mediante justificativa da enfermeira estomaterapeuta, um aumento desse quantitativo. Casos que fazem com que um maior número de bolsas seja solicitado, com a inclusão de quimioterapia e,

também os estomas mal localizados, onde existe a dificuldade de manter o equipamento coletor aderido por mais tempo.

Algumas das atividades desenvolvidas são a consulta de Enfermagem, que engloba anamnese, a troca do equipamento coletor, avaliação do estoma, treinamento para irrigação de cólons, escuta ativa, reavaliação das quantidades de materiais para a realização do autocuidado, visita domiciliar, grupos de apoio, solicitação de materiais para o Estado, escala de tarefas e supervisão dos funcionários.

O Serviço de Estomaterapia é campo de estágio para os alunos da graduação em Enfermagem, do programa de residência em saúde pública e para o curso de especialização em Enfermagem em Estomaterapia.

Tem-se uma complexidade dos cuidados aos pacientes estomizados, pois são pessoas que possuem uma vulnerabilidade psicológica devido às alterações fisiológicas que ocorrem com a realização do estoma. Se deparar com esta nova realidade imposta em muitos casos por alguma patologia ou trauma, aceitar-se, aprender a fazer o manuseio de equipamentos coletores seja de urostomia, nefrostomia, ileostomia e/ou colostomia e seus respectivos cuidados, requer muito discernimento tanto da equipe que orienta quanto do paciente que faz o uso do dispositivo. O trabalho do enfermeiro estomaterapeuta se faz imprescindível na vida dos usuários, visto que atua diretamente na educação em saúde promovendo a orientação, visando que o usuário realize seu autocuidado quando possível, possibilitando uma melhor qualidade de vida e auxiliando na adaptação dessa nova condição de saúde.

A experiência em realizar consulta de Enfermagem com o paciente estomizado acrescenta conhecimentos técnico-científicos. Aprender a entender cada paciente, prestar um cuidado humanizado, fomentar o autocuidado e a autonomia desses indivíduos e mostrar que são capazes de uma vida normal, mesmo após a confecção do estoma é de grande valia.

1st Multiprofessional Symposium on Laryngectomized People

On 19th August, the 1st Multiprofessional Symposium for Laryngectomized People was held in Fortaleza/CE – Brazil and topics such as the surgical approach, speech rehabilitation, peristomal skin care, perspectives



and repercussions of head and neck cancer, postoperative care was discussed. Operations, visibility of laryngectomised people, organised in round tables, scientific panels and a talk show with laryngectomised people, made it possible to share their experiences. The event was organised by the SOBEST® Ceará Section, Hospital Dr Carlos Alberto Studart Gomes, Faculty Rodolfo Teófilo/ Rede Multiversa, Enterostomal Therapist Course and at the Federal University of Ceará (UFC), Atos Medical, Estomaterapia Florencente and League of Academic League Enterestomal Therapists at the State University of Ceará (UECE).

The program included a multidisciplinary team such as head and neck surgeons, stoma therapist nurses, speech therapists, laryngectomised people and their families. 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Report from Chile in commemoration of World Ostomy Awareness Day

The nurse dedicated to the care of the ostomy patient is increasingly empowered and their work is recognised as an important part of the coloproctology team. The objective of nursing is to provide care based on evidence; for this reason training, conferences, webinars and meetings are constantly carried out to understand the concerns and needs of patients, identify educational needs of professionals and provide them with tools to provide safe and quality care. In the context of giving visibility to the celebration of World Ostomy Awareness Day, different activities were carried out in Chile, both education with professionals and recreational activities with ostomy patients, with the aim of raising awareness of the problems of the ostomised person and raising awareness in the community. News-worthy items from the USA Pacific Northwest – Alaska, Idaho, Oregon, Washington

In August 2024, the first Pacific Rim WOCN® Conference will be held in Anchorage, Alaska. The states that are coming together to network and exchange ideas to improve healthcare delivery are Alaska, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Washington and US Territory of Guam.

Wound, ostomy, continence and foot care nurses will congregate in Alaska to meet, greet, share clinical and collegial concerns, ideas, suggestions and topics. Keynote speakers from Alaska, Idaho and Washington have been invited to discuss trends in pelvic floor intervention, professional growth and development, and inspirational self-care ideas. Traditional topics on wound care, skin, and ostomy case studies and other topics are to be decided and offered.

Other newsworthy events are the invitation to the University of Washington, Seattle, Annual Wound Care Conference in November 2023, to speak on *War, weapons, weather, and wounds.* This presentation focuses on the injuries and interventions from the Crimean War in 1855 to the current Ukraine War – a span of over 165 years with conflict in same geographical parts of the world. The content encompasses the history of wound care and military wound care inventions and interventions used day to day for the devastating ballistic/s leading to abdominal, thoracic, and genital injuries and extremity loss.

The Alaska Nurses Association has survived the isolating COVID days by conducting foot, wound and population health topics through webinars for annual conferences, regional meetings, and Tuesday Talk platforms. Recently topics such as the *Dermatologic mimics of Pressure Ulcers related to COVID* has been offered.

The grant-funded project *Developing a sustainable foot* and wound care clinic for the homeless natives of Alaska launched in Anchorage in 2016 is ongoing – the Alaska Parish Nurses and other community members have assumed the lead and are offering the clinic 1–2 times per month at Central Lutheran Church and the Brother Francis Shelter.

The new edition of *Wound care made visual* editor Patricia A Slachta, is now available on amazon.com – many US contributors shared their expertise for this publication.

Four-day Intensive Foot and Nail Care for Board Certification courses are being offered in San Diego, California October 2023 with the Pacific Coast Region of the WOCN® and Anchorage, Alaska in June 2024 with the Alaska Nurses Association and Northwest WOCN®.

I am sending this request on behalf of the WOCN® Board of Directors and would like to take this opportunity to kindly ask for your assistance. It has come to our attention that individuals and organisations throughout our industry have been improperly using the term "WOCN®". WOCN® is a trademarked acronym abbreviated for the Wound, Ostomy, and Continence Nurses Society™ (WOCN®). The most common issue is individuals referring to themselves as a "WOCN®". The acronym should never be used as a nursing credential. If the individual is not certified, they should refer to themselves as a WOC nurse, wound nurse, ostomy nurse, continence nurse. In addition, under no circumstances should the WOCN® trademark be altered, modified, or used in a manner that could potentially dilute or diminish its impact. It should not be used as a substitute for products or services or used in a possessive manner.

If eel confident you can appreciate and understand our position. Therefore, we are asking you to disseminate this request to all the appropriate individuals within your organisation to ensure compliance. We would greatly appreciate a review of your materials, including websites, brochures, presentations, and any other promotional or informational content, to ensure adherence to our guidelines. If any adjustments need to be made, please make them promptly to maintain consistency and protect the integrity of our brand. If you have any questions regarding the proper usage of the WOCN® trademark or need clarification on any of the guidelines, please do not he sitate to contact us at share@wocn.org.

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The importance of a proper title

Regardless of where you work in the world, it is important to use the correct title that accurately represents your role. A proper title can help clarify the work you do and elevate your professional status. Collectively, individuals doing the same work and identifying themselves with a common title helps to elevate the role and the profession. Opportunities arise to collaborate with others with a common interest, to work with governments, for job protection and for pay equality. Collaboration also helps to secure services needed by the individuals served. The impact of a proper title is evident in wound, ostomy and continence nursing.

The history of enterostomal therapy begins with the efforts of Norma Gill who brought together a small group of caregivers committed to providing individuals with ostomies help to live their best lives. The group identified themselves as enterostomal therapists and laid a foundation that changed the lives of all of those who followed the path they created as well as the countless individuals that benefited from their care and compassion. From a meager beginning, the role has continued to evolve and expand. With growth, change is inevitable.

The first enterostomal therapists were caring, non-healthcare providers. With time in the United States, the role became a nursing specialty recognised by the American Nurses Association (ANA). The nurses practising in the role were known as enterostomal therapists, enterotherapy nurses, or ETs for short, and were required to hold a bachelor's degree or higher. Over time, the specialty expanded to include care of individuals with wound and continence care needs.

A voluntary certification was added and those who successfully completed the board examination could use the title of certified enterostomal therapist, CETN. A generation of nurses, including us, began their careers as CETNs. However, in an effort to better describe the expanded role to include wound and continence care, some name changes occurred. The title of ET was lovingly retired. The new title of wound, ostomy, and continence nurse was born. This title may be abbreviated to WOC nurse. The professional organisation, of the United States of America, supporting these specialists changed

its name to Wound, Ostomy, and Continence Nurses Society and trademarked the acronym WOCN®, thereby limiting its use to only referring to the organisation or society. Using the acronym in any other manner is a trademark violation.

While totally separate entities, the certification organisation followed with change. Their name changed to Wound, Ostomy, Continence Nursing Certification Board, abbreviated WOCNCB®. Exam opportunities changed by splitting into three separate certification exams: one for each specialty area. Nurses could now certify in those areas more reflective of their individual practices. That could be all three, only one or several combinations. Like WOCN®, the acronyms referring to the organisation and the certifications are also trademarked. Table one identifies the certification acronyms. More information may be found at their website: wocncb.org.

Acronym	Certification
CWOCN®	Certified Wound, Ostomy, and Continence Nurse
CWON®	Certified Wound Ostomy Nurse
CWCN®	Certified Wound Care Nurse
COCN®	Certified Ostomy Care Nurse
CCCN®	Certified Continence Care Nurse

When signing their name, certified nurses should use the acronym which accurately represents their certification. For example, an individual certified in all three specialties would use the credential CWOCN. If a certification is held in wound and ostomy, but not continence, the correct acronym would be CWON. Using the acronyms in any other manner would be, at the very least, a trademark violation.

Around the world, titles may vary. In the UK and a number of other countries where the focus of the work is still centred around ostomy care, nurses are known as stoma nurses. The international organisation, the World Council of Enterostomal Therapists®, has also trademarked their organisation's acronym WCET®.



Trademarking lends a level of protection to all entitled to utilise the trademark. In other words, both individuals and organisations have exclusive rights to the trademark. Those not entitled to its use and choose to use the trademark are subject to litigation.

Although titles may be different, the commitment is universal around the world. The commitment is to provide quality, specialised care to individuals with ostomy, wound and/or continence care needs. Titles, then, are important. By identifying yourself properly, you will clearly establish your specialisation and commitment to providing the highest quality of care.






