Marylyn was not only the generous founder of the Marylyn McManus WCET® Scholarship for Africa but was considered a stoma therapy pioneer and icon; she was a founding member of the WCET® and the South African Stoma Association. We send our heartfelt condolences to Judy's and Marylyn's family, friends and associates. May they both rest

in peace. We also again thank those who have sent remembrances for Suzanne Montandon.

We send our deepest sympathy to members who had loved ones lost or injured in the earthquakes in Indonesia, Turkey and Syria, as well as the flash floods in Brazil and Saudi Arabia, and the recent tornados in the USA. Marylyn, in common with many other dedicated pioneers of stoma caring, was herself one who had walked the walk of debilitating ulcerative colitis and as a young mother undergone life changing surgery with little if any skilled or informed support from the nursing profession, at a time when products other than non-disposable rubber bags and no ideal skin protection were all that was available.

These tough times led her to dedicate her life to ensuring that others would never be faced with the same inadequacies. Shortly after surgery she approached her surgeon Professor Bert Myburgh at the Johannesburg hospital and offered her services to his in and outpatients as a preoperative supporter and subsequently as a practical advisor and educator. This led to her extending her completely voluntary services to Baragwanath hospital, the largest hospital in the southern hemisphere full of pathologies and cultural and social challenges! At the same time, she was employed by the Cancer Association of South Africa in their Johannesburg offices. I am sure that readers will find a close alignment to our own Norma Gill in this story!

In 1973, when I commenced a formal nursing-led stomaltherapy service at Groote Schuur Hospital in Capetown, Marylyn flew to our first symposium and invited me to speak at a cancer conference in Johannesburg on the role of a stomaltherapist. It rapidly became apparent that the two of us were the ultimate team... She the brains and facilitator and myself the trained nurse with clinical experience and the gift of the gab! Together we worked hard to formulate getting our message and expertise out to nurses throughout the country and Rhodesia. Suffice to say that the next 50 years together we succeeded in establishing formal stomaltherapy in South Africa and were pioneering members of the WCET®. Marylyn on a personal level not only raising funds for our South African stoma trust but also providing significant funding to the WCET® and the Norma N Gill Foundation. She put her entire life into supporting both these organisations and it was a delight to see her efforts rewarded and recognised by the WCET® in 2002 awarding her life membership and in 2016 naming a scholarship in her honour. I know this gave her immense pleasure and she found it very humbling.

Marylyn's husband John recalled that when she was so sick with her colitis, he was on an overseas business trip, she rang him to say she was undergoing surgery the following morning, but he mustn't worry! He had no idea of the stoma or what had taken place until he returned. But he did say that over the following years Marylyn had been amazing, conducting a very full life travelling the globe, tiger fishing on the Zambesi, hiking in the mountains, camping in the bush, going

on archeological digs, never once referring to her stoma as being an impediment in any way! He was full of admiration and just wanted everyone to know how proud he was!

It is hard to believe I am writing about someone so dynamic and indestructible as my dear friend Marylyn in THE PAST TENSE! We have travelled the world together; in fact, it was noted that we shared hotel accommodation in more delightful spots than with our husbands! We also ran up bigger phone bills than many other husbands would have tolerated, remembering that much of our work was conducted before the advent of the cell phone or cyberspace.

We had highs and lows and the rejection of South African stomaltherapists because of the apartheid nursing constitution at the Swedish WCET® meeting in 1988 was indeed shattering. However, we feel we contributed greatly to getting that racial document removed and re-written by our lobbying of the nursing association on our return. All gatherings of the WCET® were highlights and, in major part were made possible for the South African delegation by the superb organisation of our trips by Marylyn and her contributions to the meetings, by dynamic presentations and by her executive work.

There will never be another Marylyn... but she led such a worthwhile life and meant so much to so many. I am the richer for knowing her! HAMBE KHAHLE DEAR FRIEND.

In memory of Suzanne Montandon, the first enterostomal therapist in France

Suzanne Montandon, the first enterostomal therapist in France, a graduate of the Cleveland Clinic in the United States of America (USA), passed away on 29th June 2022. Suzanne Montandon was born in 1928 in Pontarlier (Doubs), from Paul and Alice, of Swiss origin. She was named

Suzanne Andrée. Her little sister Denise was born in 1930. Since childhood, Susanne distinguished herself by a strong character, even rebellious, and sometimes abrupt, in any case infinitely sensitive to injustice. She was always boldly committed to asserting her position. At the age of 16, during the war, she was part of a group of scouts and worked with resistance fighters as a rescuer. Always moving forward, as a good visionary, but with a healthy reflection on the risks involved, that is how we knew her. To take care of others, to learn and to pass on, that was her credo.

Her early life was not a path lined with roses; her mother was rather rude towards her. Just after the war, she became an au pair in German Switzerland, then a factory worker at the calibration of watches. This was certainly not her vocation: she trained at the Cours Pigier and became an accountant's assistant at a notary, which proved to be very useful to her when she ran her own company. She was unable to realise her dream of becoming a teacher, because although she was naturalised French, her Swiss origins prevented her from enrolling in a teacher training college. Her experience as a first-aid worker led her to turn to the nursing profession, to the great displeasure of her parents who refused to fund her training. She studied as a scholarship holder at Chalon-sur-Saône. After a year without any way to repay her scholarship, she decided with two friends, Monette and Gaby, to go to work in Morocco. Fifteen years in a Muslim hospital in Casablanca. What a journey! She told it in her book Mon kaleidoscope: she worked in medical services, with patients with tuberculosis, leprosy and burns, and also in intensive care units. Everywhere her rigor, her sense of organisation and her clinical thinking worked wonders, including after the Agadir earthquake with its many wounded admitted for dialysis.

Back in France in 1968, she joined the Hospices Civils de Lyon (HCL), the Croix-Rousse then the Hôtel-Dieu,

in the service of Professor Georges Guillemin. All the interns and assistants, nurses and staff who worked with her remember her with esteem and affection. It is there that she inherited the nickname of "Suzon", which was meant to be demeaning with regard to the former expatriate, but which she carried high and far, by her intelligence, her audacity, and her humour.

1976 saw the creation of the Stoma Associations, and Suzon's departure for Cleveland (Ohio – USA) to train at the Cleveland Clinic, birthplace of stomatherapy, with Professor Turnbull and Norma Gill, who had an ileostomy. Suzon became the first French nurse to graduate in stomatherapy, which was in English of course: an outstanding experience!

Immediately upon her return Suzon was requested by the surgeons to care for their stoma and wound patients. With the support of Professor Guillemin and Professor Philippe Bérard, she organised consultations for people with stomas and wounds. Renée Bonnin, a young woman with an ileostomy, who had been providing help and sharing her own experience with patients with a stoma, started to work with Suzon and later became a stoma therapist herself.

In 1978, thanks to Professor Guillemin and his many colleagues from all over France, and with the help of Catherine Mordacq, Director of the International School at HCL, Suzon created the first stomatherapy school in France. The school also hosted nurses from various European countries, and even more distant countries. At the end of this first training program, she created the French Association of Enterostomal Therapists, to bring together ETs in a permanent professional group. In parallel, she actively participated in the research of new materials with the laboratories, both in stomatherapy and in wound care, notably with the pharmacist Didier Chedorge, on hydrocolloids.

In 1984, it was time for retirement, and Michelle Guyot-Pomathios took over the Hôtel-Dieu consultations services and the training for the Clinical Certificate in Stomatherapy. But they still worked together until 2015.

Retired, free certainly, but so dissatisfied, she was not meant to stay at home: she was full of energy and ideas and always motivated by the desire to share her knowledge and help the sick people. She then decided to create a stomatherapy school in Paris. It was not an easy task for a woman from Lyon to teach in Paris! Thanks

to a few surgeons and nursing executive Michelle Conge, this school proved to be a great success.

In 1988, wanting to fly on her own, as usual, she created a training organisation, ESFORD, (ESpace de Formation Recherche et Développement) (French private WOC Nursing school in Lyon (HCL) and Paris) with two associates. Others then joined her. Many training programs are now set up throughout France, with a great team of trainers.

Her personal health problems, her insatiable curiosity, and her benevolence to suffering people pushed her to train again and again and to participate in research on senology, AIDS, education of the patient, organisation of care, and here too she was a pioneer.

In parallel, she valued her personal development: she completed a 2-year university degree in psychology, transactional analysis, symbolisation, and even Chinese animals and Bach's flowers. Her Chinese zodiac sign was Dragon/Tiger: she claimed this aspect of her personality!

Her spiritual investigation into the meaning of life was born very early in her life, and she was very open to all cultures and religions, while maintaining her attachment to the Protestantism from her origins.

Her political and social commitments also benefited from her energy: she created several professional associations to share knowledge and to publish. Of course, her desire to share her knowledge also involved writing. She could write easily and with her personal style, fluid and pleasant. She was involved in numerous articles and fundamental works, particularly about stomatherapy and wound care.

In 1992, the WCET® World Congress was organised in Lyon: it was a huge success, ET colleagues from all countries who attended the meeting have great memories, and still tell us about it today! Testimonials of sympathy received from around the world since the announcement of her departure prove this.

All of her work, and especially her major contribution to stomatherapy, deserve to be recognised for its full value. In 2008, she received the distinction of Knight in the Order of the Legion of Honour, and she dedicated this sign of gratitude to all those who made it possible to establish this competency for the sick people.

Her private life was rich in sharing and affection. Single without children, yet hundreds of people considered her as their spiritual mother, especially the ETs. Because of her ability to connect with others, we can no longer count the number of her friends who today mourn her all over the world. More than her professional activity,

her entrepreneurial spirit has spread to several places in the world: Mauritius, where she promoted a store and brought her generous help to a family (Jinnah considers her as his mother); Algeria with Hayet, ET, who she considered as her granddaughter; and Morocco in 2015, with the creation of Dar Taliba: she brought her help to this association with Bernadette Bracq; led by Fatima Zohra, it aims to educate Berber girls and help women through work.

Knowing the world and sharing her discoveries motivated her to travel, by all means of transport and also on foot. Sporty, she discovered target hunting archery and became passionate about this demanding discipline. Alongside Raoul, her companion for half a century, she took an active part in the activities of the Compagnie du Sagittaire, of which she was captain for two years. The title of senior vice-champion of France crowned her career in this field.

She loved playing games, among others bridge and tarot. What memorable evenings with her friends of the Erables building! Her closest friends allowed her to stay at home until the end, thanks to their dedication.

Her library is full and eclectic: from essays to crime novels, from novels to poetry, from esotericism to religions, from history to beautiful books, not to mention professional writings. The newspaper kiosk lost their best customer!

She left without physical suffering, fully aware that her end was near. She fell asleep and left us slowly, like a candle going out.

Dear Suzon, thank you and not farewell, but goodbye!

Suzanne Montandon, 1ère stomathérapeute en France, diplômée à la Cleveland Clinic aux Etats-Unis nous a quittés le 29 juin 2022

Suzanne Montandon est née le en 1928 à Pontarlier (Doubs) au foyer de Paul et Alice, d'origine suisse. Elle fut nommée Suzanne Andrée. Sa petite sœur Denise naquit en 1930.

Dès l'enfance, elle se distingue par un caractère bien trempé, voire rebelle, et même parfois abrupt, en tout cas infiniment sensible à l'injustice. Elle s'engage toujours hardiment pour affirmer ses positions. A 16 ans,

durant la guerre, elle fait partie d'un groupe de scouts et intervient avec des résistants comme secouriste.

Aller de l'avant, en bonne visionnaire, mais avec une saine réflexion sur les risques encourus, c'est ainsi que nous l'avons connue. Prendre soin des autres, apprendre et transmettre, ce fut son credo.

Ses débuts dans la vie ne sont pas un sentier bordé de roses, et sa mère est plutôt rude à son égard. Juste après la guerre, la voilà jeune fille au pair en Suisse allemande, puis ouvrière d'usine au calibrage de verres de montres. Ce n'est certes pas sa vocation: elle suit une formation au Cours Pigier, et devient aide-comptable chez un notaire, ce qui lui sera bien utile lorsqu'elle dirigera sa propre société. Elle ne peut réaliser son rêve de devenir institutrice, car bien que naturalisée française, ses origines suisses sont un empêchement à l'entrée à l'Ecole normale. Son expérience de secouriste l'incite à se tourner vers la profession d'infirmière, au grand dam de ses parents qui refusent de financer cette formation. Elle fait ses études comme boursière à Chalon-sur-Saône. Après une année sans salaire pour rendre sa bourse, elle décide avec deux amies, Monette et Gaby, de partir travailler au Maroc. Quinze années en hôpital musulman à Casablanca. Que d'aventures: elle les a contées dans son ouvrage «Mon kaléidoscope»: services de médecine, des tuberculeux, des lépreux, des grands brulés, en réanimation. Partout sa rigueur, son organisation et son sens clinique firent merveille... y compris lors du tremblement de terre d'Agadir avec ses nombreux blessés à dialyser.

De retour en France en 1968, elle intègre les Hospices Civils de Lyon (HCL), la Croix-Rousse puis l'Hôtel-Dieu, dans le service du Professeur Georges Guillemin. Tous les internes et assistants, les infirmières et tous les personnels qui l'ont côtoyée se souviennent d'elle avec estime et affection. C'est là qu'elle hérite du surnom de «Suzon», qui se voulait dévalorisant à l'égard de l'ancienne expatriée, mais qu'elle porte haut et loin, par son intelligence, son audace et son humour.

1976 voit la création des Associations de stomisés, et son départ pour Cleveland (Ohio – USA): la Cleveland Clinic est le berceau de la Stomathérapie avec le professeur Turnbull et Norma Gill, iléostomisée. Elle va ainsi être la première infirmière française diplômée en Stomathérapie, et le tout en anglais évidemment: une expérience marquante!

Immédiatement sollicitée par les chirurgiens, avec l'appui du Professeur Guillemin, puis du Professeur Philippe Bérard, elle organise des consultations pour les personnes stomisées, et déjà pour les porteurs de plaies. Renée Bonnin, jeune iléostomisée, qui apportait son aide et son expérience aux stomisés depuis

quelques temps, travaillera à ses côtés et deviendra même Stomathérapeute.

En 1978, grâce au Professeur Guillemin et à ses nombreux collègues de toute la France, et avec l'aide de Catherine Mordacq, Directrice de l'Ecole Internationale aux HCL, elle crée la première école de Stomathérapie en France, qui accueille également des infirmières de divers pays européens ou plus lointains. A l'issue de cette première formation, elle crée l'Association Française d'Entérostoma Thérapeutes, afin de rassembler les ET dans un groupe professionnel pérenne. En parallèle, elle participe activement à la recherche de nouveaux matériels avec les Laboratoires, tant en Stomathérapie qu'en cicatrisation, notamment avec le pharmacien Didier Chedorge sur les hydrocolloïdes.

En 1984, l'heure de la retraite sonne, et Michelle Guyot-Pomathios prend sa succession à la consultation de l'Hôtel-Dieu et à la formation au Certificat Clinique en Stomathérapie. Mais elles œuvrent toujours de concert, et ce jusqu'en 2015.

Retraitée, libre certes... mais tellement insatisfaite: elle n'est pas faite pour rester à la maison: elle déborde d'énergie et d'idées et est toujours animée par ce désir de transmettre et d'aider les malades. Elle décide alors de créer une école de stomathérapie à Paris. La tâche est rude pour une lyonnaise qui veut enseigner à Paris! Grâce à quelques chirurgiens et à Michelle Conge, cadre infirmier, cette école connait un grand succès.

En 1988, désirant voler de tes propres ailes, comme d'habitude, elle crée un organisme de formation, ESFORD, (école privée de Stomathérapie à Lyon et Paris) avec deux associées. D'autres viendront ensuite la rejoindre. De nombreux thèmes de formation sont mis en place partout en France, avec une belle équipe de formateurs.

Ses propres problèmes de santé, son insatiable curiosité et son attention aux personnes souffrantes la poussent à se former encore et encore et à participer à des recherches sur la sénologie, le SIDA, l'éducation du malade, l'organisation des soins... et là-aussi elle fut une pionnière.

En parallèle, elle valorise son développement personnel: DEUG de psychologie à l'Université, Analyse transactionnelle, Symbolisation, et même Animaux chinois et Fleurs de Bach. Dragon/Tigre au calendrier chinois: elle revendique cet aspect de sa personnalité!

Sa recherche spirituelle sur le sens de la vie naît très tôt chez elle, et elle est très ouverte à toutes les cultures et religions, tout en gardant son attachement au protestantisme de ses origines.



Ses engagements politique et social bénéficient aussi de son énergie: création de plusieurs associations professionnelles dans le but de partager les connaissances et de publier. Evidemment, son désir de transmettre passe aussi par l'écriture. Elle rédige aisément et avec son style, fluide et bien agréable. Elle participe à la rédaction de nombreux articles et ouvrages fondamentaux particulièrement sur la Stomathérapie et la cicatrisation.

En 1992, le congrès mondial du WCET® est organisé à Lyon: ce fut un immense succès, et les collègues ET de tous les pays en gardent un formidable souvenir et nous en parlent encore! En témoignent les nombreux messages de sympathie reçus des quatre coins du monde depuis l'annonce de son départ.

Tout son travail, et particulièrement la Stomathérapie, son grand œuvre, se devait d'être reconnu à sa juste valeur. En 2008, elle reçoit la distinction de Chevalier dans l'Ordre de la Légion d'Honneur, et elle dédie ce signe de reconnaissance à tous ceux qui ont permis d'instaurer cette compétence pour les malades.

Sa vie privée fut riche de partage et d'affection. Célibataire sans enfant, et pourtant des centaines de personnes la considèrent comme leur mère spirituelle, en particulier les ET. Par son aisance à entrer en relation avec les autres, on ne compte plus le nombre de ses amis qui aujourd'hui la pleurent partout dans le monde. Elle ne s'est pas contentée de son activité professionnelle, son esprit d'entreprise s'est étendu à plusieurs lieux du monde: l'île Maurice, où elle met en valeur un magasin et apporte son aide généreuse à une famille (Jinnah la considère comme sa mère); l'Algérie avec Hayet, ET, qui elle, se considère comme sa petite-fille; et le Maroc en 2015, avec la création de Dar Taliba: elle apporte son aide à cette association avec Bernadette Bracq; animée par Fatima Zohra elle a pour but l'éducation des jeunes filles berbères et l'aide aux femmes par le travail.

Connaître le monde et partager ses découvertes l'incite à voyager, par tous moyens de transport et beaucoup à pied. Sportive, elle découvre le tir à l'arc de chasse sur cibles, et se passionne pour cette discipline exigeante. Aux côtés de Raoul, son compagnon durant un demisiècle, elle participe activement aux activités de la Compagnie du Sagittaire, dont elle sera pendant deux ans Capitaine. Le titre de vice-championne de France senior couronnera sa carrière dans ce domaine.

Elle aimait le jeu, entre autres bridge et tarot. Que de soirées mémorables avec ses amis de l'immeuble les Erables. Les plus proches lui permirent de rester à domicile jusqu'au bout, grâce à leur dévouement.

Sa bibliothèque est bien remplie et éclectique: des essais aux polars, des romans à la poésie, de l'ésotérisme aux religions, de l'histoire aux beaux livres, sans oublier les écrits professionnels. Le kiosque à journaux perd avec elle sa meilleure cliente!

Elle est partie sans souffrance physique, pleinement consciente que sa fin était proche. Elle s'est endormie et nous a quittés doucement, comme une bougie qui s'éteint.

Chère Suzon, merci et pas Adieu, mais Au revoir!

The 13th Enterostomal Therapist Graduation Ceremony in Hunan Province / Conference on New developments in stoma, wound and continence nursing and pressure injury management

The Hunan Nursing Association held the 13th Enterostomal Therapist (ET) Graduation Ceremony in Hunan Province from 3rd – 6th September 2022. It was held alongside a training conference on new developments in stoma, wound and continence (SWC) nursing and pressure injury management. After 3 months of hard work, including more than a dozen theoretical and practical assessments, 34 ET students successfully graduated. Additionally, the conference organisers invited senior medical and nursing experts, from inside and outside the province, to discuss the progress of the discipline and hot topics on SWC nursing. Hunan Province invited attendees to the 3rd Stoma, Wound and Continence Nursing Case Competition, attracting nearly 200 stoma, wound and continence enterostomal therapists, nursing managers and bedside nurses.

In her special presentation on The training of clinical thinking of specialist nurses, Professor Zhu Lihui, Deputy Secretary of the Party Committee of Hunan Cancer Hospital, explained how to develop the creativity, foresight, and rational thinking of specialised nurses by employing inertial thinking, logical thinking and critical thinking, as well as how to carry out clinical practice through wound scenarios. This article offers guidance for the training of clinical thinking of specialty nurses.

Chen Yongyi, Vice President of the Hunan Nursing Association and Professor at Hunan Cancer Hospital, gave an in-depth explanation on the construction and practice of the humanistic care ability system for ostomy wound nurses. This was aimed at promoting wholeperson care, including the physical, psychological, social and spiritual aspects, during specialised nursing care for individuals with ostomy wound or continence conditions. She also proposed system construction, covering the ability of ostomy, wound and continence nurses, to better practise humanistic care as a way of advancing specialty nursing, providing patients with a more humanised and high-quality nursing service.

A lecture on *Risk assessment and prevention of pressure injury* was given by Professor Tang Xinhui, Chairman of the Stoma and Continence Committee of the Hunan Nursing Association. Professor Tang interpreted the 2019 edition of *Worldwide Guidelines on Pressure Injury*, and the most recent developments in the definition, staging, risk assessment, prevention, and treatment of

pressure injury were discussed in detail. This provided good direction for the prevention and nursing management of pressure injury.

In addition to introducing the key concepts and methods of writing a nursing research paper, Professor Liao Qianjin, director of the Central Laboratory of the Hunan Cancer Hospital, explained the fundamentals of writing a nursing scientific research project from the perspectives of the significance, research methods, and viability of scientific research design.

Professor Kang Zhongcheng, Deputy Director of the Department of Hepatobiliary and Intestinal Surgery, Hunan Cancer Hospital, held a lecture on nutritional management of patients with ostomy and wounds in order to advance the use of nutritional treatment and enhance the therapeutic effect. This was done in order to improve the standardised management and standards of nutrition for patients with stoma and wounds, as well as to offer direction and assistance for the nutritional management of patients.

Zhang Qijian, Head Nurse of Xiangya Hospital of Central South University, introduced the characteristics, management and treatment principles of autoimmune related ulcers. The importance of multidisciplinary

cooperation in promoting ulcer healing was also proposed.

Yang Furong, Head Nurse of the Wound, Ostomy and Continence Nursing Center of Hunan Provincial People's Hospital, introduced the international guidelines for diagnosis and treatment of urinary incontinence. New nursing knowledge was presented on incontinence dermatitis in order to provide guidance for clinical nursing practice.

Yang Jing, an Enterostomal Therapist from the Second Xiangya Hospital of Central South University, gave a

lecture on *Those things about wound bed preparation*, and elaborated on the origin and evolution, basic framework and recommendations of the TIME principle of wound bed preparation which provided a decision-making framework for the treatment of chronic wounds.

Professor Chen Yupan, Vice-President of Hunan Enterostomal Therapist School, presented on the theme of *Clinical observation and nursing care of radiation-induced skin injury*. The causes, characteristics and treatment measures of radiation dermatitis were described in detail, and the treatment methods and effects of radiation dermatitis were demonstrated through case studies and pictures.

Professor Zhu Xiaomei, Head Nurse of the Stoma and Wound Clinic of Hunan Cancer Hospital shared the theme of *Risk factors for peristomal complications*. An article was presented expounding the research progress of peristomal skin risk, the constitution of the risk factor model and its clinical application, while providing guidance for medical staff on prevention of peristomal skin complications.

In November 2022 we celebrated the successful conclusion of the 8th Enterostomal Therapy Nurse Educational Program (ETNEP) in Slovenia. At the same time, we celebrated the School's 30th anniversary. The University Medical Centre Ljubljana organised the 8th ETNEP at the training School, in collaboration with the Nurses and

Midwives Association of Slovenia, from 13th September 2021 to 24th November 2022.

The educational course was divided into 4 weeks of theory and 4 weeks of practical education. The first 2 weeks of theory was organised in September and October of 2021, but due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic we had to postpone the rest of the course until March and April 2022. 

1990, where Yugoslavia was accepted into the WCET® as an equal member.

Activities of the SOBEST® Santa Catarina section in the prevention of pressure injuries

Promoting prevention is an important challenge for the nursing and multidisciplinary team. To emphasise the importance of this reflection, SOBEST® launched the campaign *Change sides: avoid pressure,* supporting the dissemination of in-



stitutional actions directed to the prevention of the complaint.

The University Hospital Polydoro Ernani of São Thiago of the Federal University of Santa Catarina (HU-EBSERH), through the Interdisciplinary Group of Skin Care (GICPel), in partnership with the Quality Management and Patient Safety Unit (UGQSP) and the Patient Safety Committee (COSEP), has developed an activity plan with educational actions for professionals, patients and families. Among these, a workshop with the professionals inside the care unit itself, during working hours, where care actions were addressed in the prevention of pressure injury, from the demonstration of care with the use of visual and auditory stimulation and perception, in the search for reflection on daily practice.

The activity had the support of the SOBEST/SC Section and the nursing students from the Academic League of Stomal Therapy of the Federal University of Santa Catarina (LAPEFE/UFSC), Larissa Vitória Gatti de Andrade and Antonio Bruno de Sousa Barbosa. Each workshop took place with an estimated time of 15 minutes, in which more than 60 healthcare professionals and students participated.

Follow in Norma Gill's footsteps

Ling Wu, Nurse, ET and Stoma Patient



I am from Nanjing in China, I am a Nurse, an enterostomal therapist (ET), and a stoma patient. In 2017, after suffering from diarrhoea for some time, with no improvement, I mustered up the courage to go for a colonoscopy, "oh my God", rectal cancer! I am

only 24 years old, how could I possibly be diagnosed with cancer? At that moment, when I received the pathology report, I was confused. I ran to the pathology department and asked if there was any possibility that the result was wrong, or I had received the wrong report, I even began to deny what had just happened. I pinched my arm, It was painful, so not a dream! At that moment, I saw death waving to me, and my life seemed as though it could be terminated at any time.

My partner and I had just bought a small house, we fought so hard to buy it together, we were preparing to decorate it, we expected to have a new home to move into at the end of the year for our wedding, we were planning to have children quickly and so were preparing for pregnancy and so on... Bang, my life pressed the pause button, God told me, this road is blocked... ah... you take this path!

As the classic Chinese saying goes: When Heaven is about to confer a great responsibility on man, it will first fill his heart with suffering, toil his sinews and bones, expose his body to hunger... Well, I've done all kinds of mental preparation for myself. God must have thought that my past life had been too smooth, so I have to suffer...

I underwent surgery, 30 rounds of radiation, 8 rounds of chemotherapy, one by one according to the doctor's treatment plan. Fear, anxiety, low self-esteem came during the period immediately after the operation, I was afraid of going out, afraid of leakage of stool and odour from my stoma appliance, and the fear of other people finding out that I have a stoma, which made me dislike, and even considered giving up my job.

However, I was lucky to meet an excellent ET who guided me step by step, this and the meticulous care from my family and encouragement from colleagues and friends, along with the affection of my two beautiful cats, I recovered and last year we had our wedding. Now, after 5 years, I have achieved clinical cure, I also get along very well with my stoma.

In 2022, I was honoured to participate in the 16th ETNEP at the Nanjing International School of Ostomy Therapists and became an ET, which was a dream that I never dreamed of. I recall that shortly after the operation I bought a book on ostomy care from the internet. It was the first time I had heard of Ms. Norma Gill. Now I have been engaged in the work of ostomy nursing, and I can say that when I face new ostomy patients, I know their pain. I also share my experience with them, the dietary precautions to ensure a normal stool consistency, helpful in avoiding leakage and dehydration, after all, I have travelled the path and know what they are going through. I hope to be a light on their road to recovery, so that they can return to a normal life earlier.

Over the years, I have known many young people who were as ill as me. Some of them have gone, recalled by God to make star in the sky. Some of them like me, have overcome difficulties and gained rebirth. No matter what the result is, we all strive to live, cherish the people in front of us, cherish every day of life we live, follow Norma Gill's footsteps, and keep walking until one day I cannot, I will go to the sky to make star to light other's way.

4th ASEAN Wound Summit in Indonesia November 2022

I was fortunate to be asked to attend the 4th ASEAN Wound Summit in Jakarta Indonesia in November 2022. Wound management in the ASEAN region is rapidly growing due to the many patients who develop wounds mainly due to the epidemic of diabetes. These patients require health professionals dealing with wounds to be up-to-date with the knowledge and skills in order to provide quality wound management. In addition, they need to be innovative in order to rise to the challenges ahead of them. This conference shows that the multidisciplinary work that not only consists of health professionals but the government, the public, social workers and industry are working together to survive one of the most unimaginable health crises in the 21st century, namely diabetes foot disease. Over 600 delegates, including 100 international delegates, attended this conference

The ASEAN Wound Council was the brainchild of Prof Dato'Dr Harikrishna K. R Nair and was formed in Kuching, Sarawak, in 2018. Professor Harikrishna organised the inaugural Conference of the ASEAN Wound Council. Members were the key opinion leaders in wound management from ten countries under the Association of South East Asian Nations (ASEAN) – Malaysia, Indonesia, Singapore, Myanmar, Thailand, Philippines,

Laos, Cambodia, Vietnam and Brunei. The first meeting culminated in the signing of the Kuching Declaration, whereby all member countries will cooperate and collaborate in terms of education, conferences, courses, knowledge and technology transfer.

Professor Harikrishna brought his usual humour and knowledge to the conference. He spoke about *Advances made in wound care* and new modalities currently being used globally, including maggot therapy which has seen a resurgence in interest in recent years. The conferences were held in Malaysia, Thailand and Vietnam prior to Indonesia in 2022. The next ASEAN conference will be held in 2023 in the Philippines and in Singapore in 2024.

Widasari Sri Gitarja and her team at WOCARE did a magnificent job of organising the 2022 ASEAN Wound Summit in Jakarta. This is the first ASEAN conference organised by a registered nurse not a doctor. There were many renowned national and international speakers as part of the program. Widasari was involved in many of the workshops, including maggot therapy and wound debridement, as well as giving several talks, including *The future of wound care in Indonesia*. We must remember that Devi Sahputra, who died far too soon, was heavily involved in the organisation of the Wound Summit prior to his untimely death.

The Indonesian Nurses Association showed their support of the ASEAN Wound Summit with keynote speaker Ns Jajang Rahmat Salihin, Chairperson of DPW Indonesian Nurses Association, DKI Jakarta, who stated, "this congress will allow us to embrace the new ideas to improve future innovation in wound management, empowering us to care for those who need special care professionally". Another well-known Indonesian enterostomal therapist and WOCN who was chairperson of the 2022 Wound Summit, Ikram Bauk, was involved in the organisation of this wonderful conference and gave several talks including the use of antimicrobials for non-healing wounds.

Professor Keryln Carville was involved in delivering some excellent workshops and lectures, including conservative sharp wound debridement, wound cleansing and *Involving the caregiver in the continuum of care*. Keryln was very innovative in dressing for formal functions, using clothes she bought at the hotel shop when her luggage went astray, only to turn up in time for her to ship it back to Australia.

Edy Mulyadi is the President of the Indonesian Wound Care Clinicians' Association. He brought his inimitable humour and knowledge to the conference, whether he was running workshops, introducing speakers or giving talks including *Disaster wound management* and the *Home care model of nursing*. This was very important at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic and relevant both in Indonesia and elsewhere. For example, just before

the ASEAN Wound Summit, there were earthquakes not far from Jakarta in East Java, and WOCARE sent supplies and personnel to help with wounds sustained by people in the earthquake.

Gulnaz Tariq from the United Arab Emirates and current President of the World Union of Wound Healing Society gave some memorable talks about *The importance of professional practice in wound care* and *The prevention of diabetic foot ulcers*. It is good to see a nurse as president of this prestigious organisation.

There were several workshops and talks about negative pressure wound therapy (NPWT) during the Wound Summit. Carol Stott from Australia did an overview, Dr Harikrishna conducted a workshop, and several others presented case studies. This was reflected in the new machines shown in the trade displays. NPWT is now becoming more available and affordable in SE Asia. Many people spoke about diabetic foot ulcers, including Dr Nizam Ali Husein from Malaysia and Prof Aziz Nather from Singapore. As there are a huge amount of diabetic foot ulcer wounds in Indonesia, it is good to see that doctors and wound care clinicians are interested in providing optimal care for this group of patients.

stomal and peristomal complications, and WOCARE did a workshop on the management of complications.

Marina Ruran from WOCARE introduced many sessions and gave presentations, including pressure injury management and continence management. Professor Rr. Tutik from the University of Indonesia talked about networking and technology for future clinical practice. There were many other presenters, too numerous to mention, who gave fantastic presentations. Carol

Over 300 full ET nurses have completed the WCET*-recognised ET course run by WOCARE. In addition, over 20,000 wound care clinicians have also been trained, which is a considerable achievement. During the gala dinner 30 ET nurses who had graduated from the Indonesian ETNEP received their certificates from the WCET*.

The trade display had a vast assortment of companies presenting tried and tested new products for wound, continence and stoma management. Theresia Sitorus (Ana) and Moena Ismail, and many others from WOCARE, worked tirelessly in the background to provide an excellent conference and ensure things ran smoothly. The videos and other graphics produced by WOCARE were of a very high standard and helped to make this a very professional conference.

Women ostomates: patient support, Saudi Arabia

In Saudi Arabia ostomates are mostly Muslim. Due to their modest culture it is unusual for ostomates to speak of their stoma to others, even family members. On the 15th December 2022, stoma nurse therapists held

a meeting with female ostomates in Saudi Arabia. The function was held at a lounge and restaurant in Riyadh, it was very informal and all ostomates and stoma nurse therapists were seated on one large round table face to face. Food and drinks were served and introductions were made. Ostomates mentioned what

type of stoma they have and shared their story, starting from when the doctor first informed them that they would need a stoma. They talked about how their life changed after the surgery along with the challenges, lifestyle, peristomal care issues, ostomy products and psychological support needed. Attendees totalled 40; 33 females with an ostomy and seven stoma nurse therapists.

At the end of the meeting attendees were very happy, having learnt from each other, especially from more senior individuals with an ostomy. Some family members attended too, and their attitude towards the stoma changed after hearing the stories. They admitted that they all felt that their self-esteem was improved, aided by meeting with other individuals with an ostomy from the same culture. They were very grateful to the stoma nurse therapists for bringing them together.

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News and views, Koç University, Turkey

Dean Ayişe Karadağ, from the School of Nursing Koç University in Istanbul Turkey, invited me to give a *Writing for publication seminar* to the Doctoral students and Faculty on Tuesday 24th October 2022, prior to the 31st Biennial ISUCRS (International Society of University Colon and Rectal Surgeons) Joint Nursing

Congress. Most of our WCET® members probably know me best as the volunteer Executive Editor for the WCET® Journal from 2004–2014, but, as a clinical nurse specialist with a full-time job in a major hospital in New York City, I began working part time as an assistant to the editor for the journal Decubitus in 1989. As the name of the journal changed, so did my position. The journal is now called Advances in Skin and Wound Care and I now have the honour to serve as Co-editor in Chief along with Dr R. Gary Sibbald, a dermatologist from Toronto Canada.

This practical seminar had two parts. The first was a didactic presentation entitled *Writing and publication tips*. The objectives of this first part of the seminar were 1. to identify editorial process steps from manuscript conception, writing, publication submission and journal publication decision and 2. to review common requirements of manuscript author guidelines to write in the appropriate journal style. Participants were able to attend in person or virtually; the feedback I received was that they enjoyed the relaxed and interactive format that enabled them to learn and gain new knowledge about publishing.

Some of the major points covered were: a major first decision is who do you want to read your article? This will then guide you to what journal you should think about tailoring your manuscript to, style and format. It is essential to follow the author guidelines for the specific journal you are interested in submitting your manuscript

to for consideration. We had much discussion about how to write and some of the difficulties that writing in English can pose. I loved hearing all the comments and questions; we also talked about their ideas for their doctoral dissertation. The School of Nursing students and faculty at Koç University are very actively engaged in many studies for which they are to be commended. More importantly, they do submit their research for publication to a variety of journals.

The second part of the seminar was open only to in person attendees. The Dean preselected some manuscripts for me to review and use as illustrations of the principles that were covered in part one. I emphasised that a student cannot just take a paper, thesis, or even their doctoral dissertation and submit it to a journal as written for the school. Writing for a journal is different. Several examples of clarity of thought, sentence composition, as well as how to respond to peer reviewer comments, were discussed.

Afterwards, I toured the simulation labs and reviewed some tapes of the competency assessment exams that students are required to do. Their labs and competency checklist/process were very impressive.

Based on my interactions with students, staff and faculty, this is a very extraordinary School of Nursing. This is a School of Nursing that mentors its students and faculty and greatly supports their professional efforts of creating the evidence upon which to base practice as well as disseminating the findings. On a personal note, I wish to thank them all, students, staff and faculty who took the time out of their busy work and school schedules for their kindness and the wonderful way they took care of me. I look forward to learning of their publications, research and doctoral dissertation. Thank you so very much for this great opportunity which was so professionally enriching and fun for me. I look forward to hearing about your accomplishments. Hoping to see you again at the next WCET® congress. Please submit your abstracts.



31st Biennial Congress of ISUCRS and 1st ISUCRS Joint Nursing Congress (ISUCRSNC)

The 1st ISUCRS Joint Nursing Congress was held by Wound, Ostomy and Continence Nurses' Society, Türkiye (YOIHD) in the ancient city of Istanbul, where Florence Nightingale burned the torch of modern nursing while caring for wounded soldiers during the Crimean War between 1854–1856.

Stoma and Wound Care Nursing in Turkey was started by Prof. Ayişe Karadağ in the early 2000s. After completing her education at the R.B. Turnbull, Jr. School of Enterostomal Therapy (Wound Ostomy Continence Nursing), Cleveland Clinic Foundation in the USA, stoma therapy and wound units were opened in Turkey with the continuous support of Ms. Susan Stelton of the WCET®. Legal regulations were completed, ETNEPs conforming to WCET® criteria were started, and the professional organisation YOIHD was established in 2008. The Wound, Ostomy and Continence Nurses' Society, Turkey (YOIHD) was established in Ankara, the capital city, by Dr Karadağ and a group of nurses to improve wound, ostomy and continence nursing and to support nurses who care for individuals with wound, ostomy and/or continence conditions and to encourage their professional development. Some of the activities of the association determined by the statute are: to organise meetings such as congresses, conferences, seminars and symposiums, to cooperate with relevant national and international institutions and organisations, to plan research and projects, to organise competitions, to provide educational scholarships in related fields, to organise in-service training programs, to protect the rights of patients to receive care, to provide education for patients and their relatives.

The 31st Biennial Congress of the International Society of University Colon and Rectal Surgeons (ISUCRS), was held for the first time as a joint Nursing Congress, the 1st

ISUCRS Joint Nursing Congress, with leading national Nursing Association YOIHD, and leading professional organisations, the WCET® and the European Council of Enterostomal Therapist (ECET). The honorary chairman of this congress was Prof. Elizabeth Ayello and Congress President was Prof. Ayişe Karadağ.

The 1st ISUCRS Joint Nursing Congress (ISUCRSNC) with the theme *Challenges, hope, and coping: facts and*

bridging the gap for empowerment was held between 27th – 29th October 2022, in Istanbul Wyndham Grand Hotel, with 950 participants from 52 countries. The number of nurses attending the congress was around 250. The most important achievement of the congress, which was the result of extensive work and close cooperation, was that the ISUCRS will hold nursing sessions at their congress from now on.

The fact that we were hosting the first joint congress in Turkey, with the cooperation of the WCET® and the ECET, and that it would be held face-to-face after the COVID-19 pandemic process, were indications that it would be an extraordinary event. After all

Presentation, Enterocutaneous Fistula Management and Case Presentation), two conferences, two meet the experts' breakfasts, five panel discussions, and three free paper sessions, were held. There were 24 oral presentations, 47 poster presentations and six selected posters presented, and poster awards were given.

Nurses working in the field of wound, ostomy and continence had the opportunity to meet with their specialists and ask their questions in this congress.

Worldwide Pressure injury Prevention Day, Turkey

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The *Pressure Injury Prevention Day* activities started globally in 2012, and YOİHD in Türkiye (Turkey) are participants. Activities are carried out with the participation of more institutions every year; 32 institutions were

involved at the beginning and in 2022 it reached 265. The National Pressure Injury Advisory Panel (NPIAP), the European Pressure Injury Advisory Panel (EPUAP) and the Pan Pacific Pressure Injury Alliance (PPPIA) shared guidelines with institutions around the world; it was realised that high participation rates increased prevention initiatives across the country. Within the scope of the event, university hospitals, city hospitals, educational research hospitals, state hospitals, private hospitals, family health centres, elderly care centres, nursing schools all provided awareness activities (seminars, symposiums, stands, banners) on 10th – 17th November 2022. It highlighted the effects of prevention of pressure injuries on health professionals as well as the national and global economy.

Trial of the available technology dressing for remote and conflict areas of tropical developing countries: a study 20 years in the making

We would like to personally thank the members of the WCET® for your encouragement as we have pursued an evidence-based solution for wound management in remote and conflict areas of tropical developing countries. This goal was borne out of our 5 years in Yendi, Ghana, during a time of intermittent conflict. We relied heavily upon donated supplies. However, we needed a sustainable method of managing wounds (using only materials that are affordable and available in village markets) to teach in our village health worker courses.

In 2012–2015 we conducted extensive surveys of village health workers, traditional healers, and non-experts in 25 villages throughout Ghana, plus sites in Zambia and Cambodia. We learned that the most effective lay wound care providers were frustrated with their lack of available techniques to keep wounds clean, moist, and closing.

My literature searches (the first were published in *OWM* in 2013) found a few semi-permeable membranes suitable for use as wound dressings. We further learned that clear food-grade plastic bags, already ubiquitously used as food and drink containers throughout the tropics, provide high levels of moisture retention while allowing oxygen transmission. Armed with this information, we developed a potential sustainable wound management solution.

The Wound Healing Foundation awarded us a small research grant to trial the method in a controlled, but still tropical, setting in 2015. Finding an appropriate site for the study proved quite difficult. We needed a team of healthcare professionals who would maintain the rigorous standards required for a true randomised controlled trial, and participants who lived in a true tropical environment, rather than air conditioning. Finally, Kingston, Jamaica was identified as a suitable

site. We completed the trial in Jamaica with 40 participants in 2021–2022.

Please view the poster to see illustrations of the method and the detailed results. The new dressing technique proved to be safe and effective with one of the most challenging wound types (sickle cell leg ulcers) in an equally challenging environment (the tropics). Previous studies found similar dressings to be safe and effective with varied patient co-morbidities, and varied wound types (e.g., burns and pressure injuries) in Japan, Korea, USA, Australia and India. Therefore, it is reasonable to conclude that available technology dressing (ATD) methods can be safely used in other resource-limited situations to promote wound healing.

Teaching patients and families this technique is likely to result in better outcomes than continuing to recommend gauze alone, which is more expensive, less effective, and more painful, or advanced dressings that are likely to be left in place too long, if obtained at all, due to cost constraints. We welcome questions and research studies testing the ATD method on other wound types in other countries.


