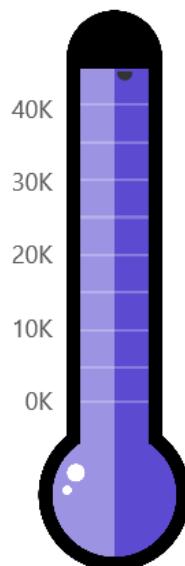

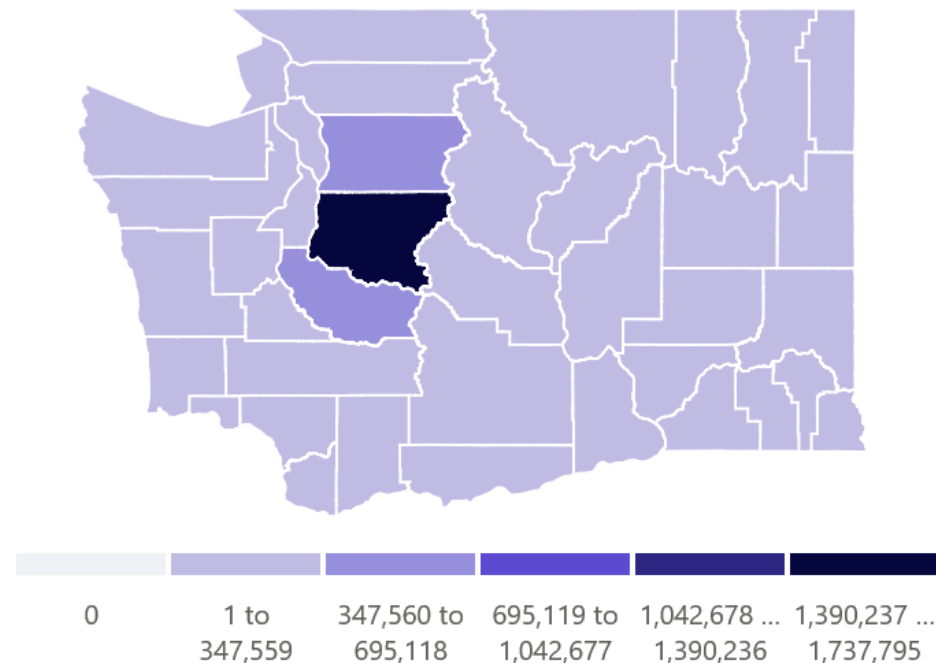

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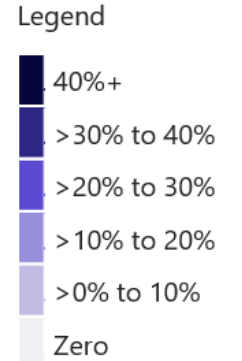
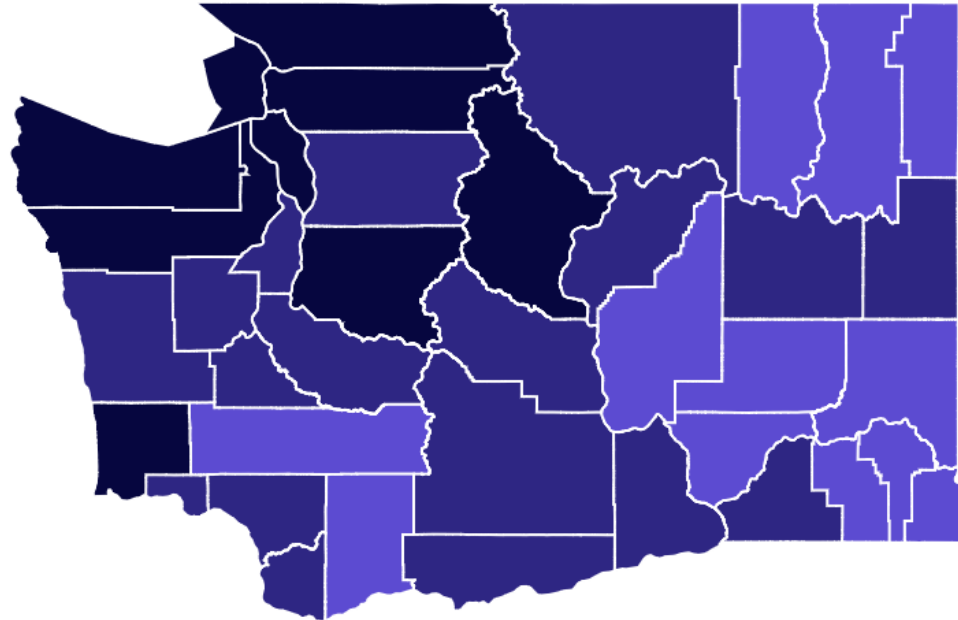

PEOPLE INITIATING VACCINATION (RECEIVING AT LEAST 1 DOSE)



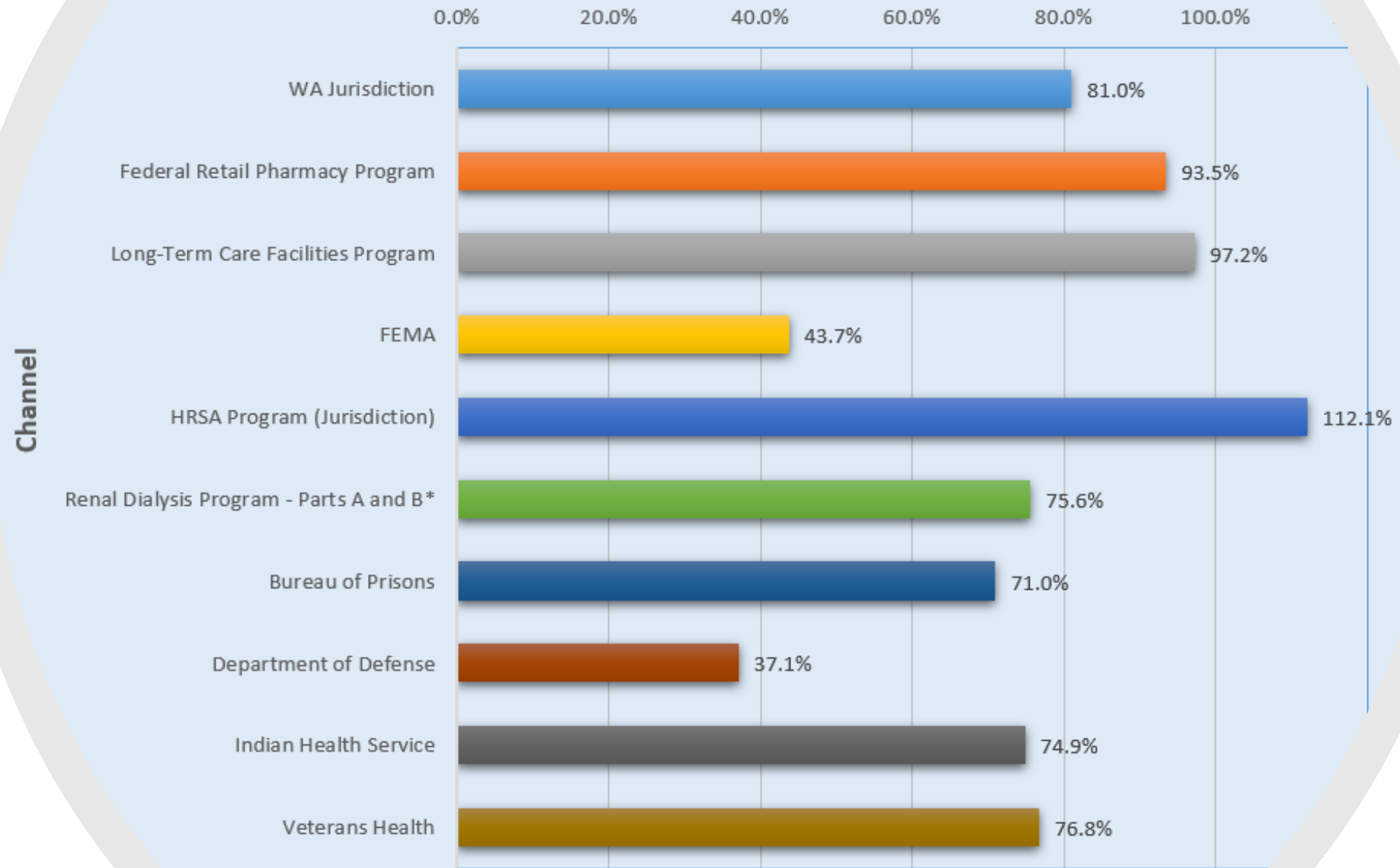

Inslee announces vaccine eligibility expansion to all adults April 15

Gov. Jay Inslee today announced that effective April 15, all Washingtonians over the age of 16 will be eligible to receive a COVID-19 vaccination.

Over the past four months since Washington began administering doses of the vaccination, the state has followed a tiered eligibility system, beginning with those most at risk of hospitalization and death.

The governor and the state Department of Health (DOH) have also prioritized equity issues in each phase to ensure vaccine access to populations disproportionately affected by the virus, including communities of color and low-income communities.

The surge of cases, in part, in response to a recent uptick in COVID cases in the state.

"We must do everything possible to ensure we can keep cases down," Inslee said during a recent conference call Wednesday. "We have concerns about the trends we are seeing across the state and we must be cautious. Opening up full eligibility will be one tool to help in the fight against the virus."

"If we get vaccinated and continue the health practices that keep those around us healthy – masks, distancing and basic hygiene – we're going to knock this virus down. But we cannot get complacent. We feel like we are done with COVID, but this virus is not done with us yet."

Roughly 3.3 million doses have been administered in Washington to date, and more than one million residents have been fully vaccinated.

DECEMBER 2020 – PRESENT 2021

- High-risk health care workers in health care settings
- High-risk first responders
- Long-term care facility residents
- All other workers at risk in health care settings

- All people **65 years or older**
- All people **50 years or older** in multigenerational households (home where individuals from 2 or more generations reside such as an elder and a grandchild)
- Educators and staff for pre-K through 12th grade
- Child care providers

- High-risk critical workers who work in certain congregate settings: Agriculture; fishing vessel crews; food processing; grocery stores; corrections; prisons, jails or detention centers; public transit; remaining first responders
- People **16 years or older** who are pregnant or have a disability that puts them at high risk for severe COVID-19 illness.

- People **16 years or older** with 2 or more co-morbidities or underlying conditions
- All people **60 years and older**
- People, staff and volunteers in certain congregate living settings: Correctional facilities; groups homes for people with disabilities; settings where people experiencing homelessness live or access services
- High-risk critical workers in certain congregate settings: restaurants, food services, construction and manufacturing

FOCUS ON EQUITY: This approach prioritizes population groups who have been disproportionately impacted by COVID-19 due to external social factors and systemic inequities, including people of color; people with limited English proficiency; people in shared housing, crowded housing, and multigenerational homes; people in poverty and low-wage earners; people with disabilities that are connected to underlying health conditions that may put them at higher risk of COVID-19; and people with access barriers to healthcare. The [social vulnerability index](#) is one of several inputs informing equitable vaccine allocation.

NOTE: Immigration and health insurance status do not impact eligibility.

The timeline represented here is tentative and subject to change based on vaccine supply and demand.

People who live or work in long-term care facilities

**Work in an enclosed space around other people and cannot maintain physical distance.*

Emergency ACIP Meeting – J&J vaccine

The ACIP voted on April 23rd to reaffirm its recommendation of the Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine for persons 18 years of age and older in the U.S population under the Emergency Use Authorization. ACIP recommended that the Food & Drug Administration (FDA) include a warning statement and for Johnson & Johnson to include an information sheet at vaccination that informs individuals about the increased risk of TTS. Those concerned about the increased risk may consider choosing another COVID-19 vaccine authorized for use, like the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines.

The Johnson & Johnson vaccine is authorized for use again in Washington state starting April 24, 2021.

Emergency ACIP Meeting – J&J vaccine

Here are a few notes for vaccine providers:

- On April 24, you may begin using Johnson & Johnson vaccine you already have in stock.
- Washington state should receive Johnson & Johnson vaccine again in next week's allocation.
- Please discard any Johnson & Johnson EUA Fact Sheets you already have printed. You will need to replace them with the new version coming soon.

Emergency ACIP Meeting – J&J vaccine

Here are a few notes for vaccine providers: (cont.)

- You can also give your patients a flyer on it, available in [English](#) and [Spanish](#) right now. It will be available in 37 languages next week.
- The vaccine was paused when there were 6 noted cases out of 6.8 million doses administered in the U.S. As of April 23, about 8 million doses have been administered with 15 cases noted.

Additional Updates

- Pfizer submits application to FDA to request expanded emergency use authorization of its COVID-19 vaccine to include ages 12 to 15 years. Under FDA review.
 - Moderna teen COVE study also underway. Waiting to hear when they may submit an application to FDA for expanded age use.
- New Moderna packaging sizes
 - Minimum Order quantity for the 14-dose vial will be 140.
 - 10-dose vials will be phased out.
 - Ancillary kit will be updated to reflect the additional doses (+ an additional 5%).
 - Will have a new NDC number.
 - They are rolling the new vials out in the next three-weeks. Pharmacies may be receiving some this week, but States not until next week at the earliest.

Additional Updates Converting booster doses to prime doses

New Pfizer packaging sizes

- Estimated end of May/beginning of June
- 450 dose minimum order
- 3 trays of 150 doses
- Ancillary kit will stay that same
- They will not send the first dry ice recharge with the smaller packs.
- Will use the same shipper as the 1170 packs
- 1170 dose orders will remain an option

Converting booster doses to prime doses

This helps prevent us from accumulating a backlog of second dose orders and maintains our supply of first doses.

After two weeks, you can convert the unused second doses to first doses by notifying DOH at covid.vaccine@doh.wa.gov and including:

- Your PIN
- The number and presentation of the second doses you are converting (i.e., 15 doses of Pfizer-BioNTech)
- Date you converted the second doses to first doses

After you convert doses, you will have one week to use them.

We still recommend that you do everything you can to attempt to use the second dose as a second dose.
