The Science of Bite-sized Well-being During Uncertain Times

Bryan Sexton, PhD
 Dr. Sexton reviews evidence published in top tier journals that both validates and normalizes their emotional exhaustion, and demonstrates that as much as the pandemic was associated with an increase in burnout, we now know (through clinical trials) that bite-sized well-being interventions can cause well-being to improve in the same magnitude. What took the pandemic three years to do can be undone in 10 days using these interventions. He explains the science behind the interventions to improve workforce well-being, and demonstrates the prevalence and severity of well-being deficits, all while informing, comforting, and inspiring a weary work-force.

111 - The Future of Delivery Room Resuscitation:
What Can We Learn from the DRIVE Network?

 Delivery room resuscitation is one of the most common neonatal interventions, but little is known about how resuscitation is actually performed across the US. The American Academy of Pediatrics developed the DRIVE (Delivery Room Intervention and Evaluation) Network to fill this gap. DRIVE is a multi-center consortium of delivery hospitals with over 50 member hospitals in 17 states, with a shared goal of improving delivery room resuscitation. Dr. Foglia will review the rationale, design and early lessons learned from the DRIVE Network.

She reviews the 2017 international guidelines on early detection and how they've influenced current NICU and outpatient practices. Key topics include neurodevelopmental screening tools, such as movement assessments and neuroimaging, used in the NICU to identify at-risk infants. She also covers the transition to follow-up clinics, where ongoing surveillance, therapy, and developmental assessments support continued care. A multidisciplinary approach is emphasized, highlighting how timely interventions during both the NICU and follow-up periods can improve outcomes and empower families.

Neonates with pulmonary hypertension represent a population of critically ill neonates with hypoxemic respiratory failure. The traditional approach to treatment of hypotension in the setting of PH was to use intravenous dopamine; however, dopamine is a non-selective pulmonary vasoconstrictor. In this presentation, Dr. McNamara reviews a physiology-based approach using cardiovascular medications that have favorable effects on the pulmonary vascular bed.

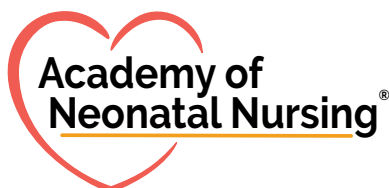
