#### **Program Guidelines**

All program participants are required to pre-register for the conference and to provide their own transportation and meeting expenses. The form for downloading and submitting pre-registration is available at www.acjs.org on the Annual Meeting page of the website.

Abstracts should be submitted <u>only once</u> via the ACJS website. **DO NOT SEND ABSTRACTS DIRECTLY TO THE TOPIC AREA CHAIRS**. If you have questions about your submission, please send them to the Program Co-Chairs at <u>acjsprogram2024@gmail.com</u>.

LCD projectors will be available in the meeting rooms. No laptops/computers or overhead projectors will be provided. Additional audio/video equipment is the responsibility of the presenter. Individuals wanting additional equipment must either bring their own equipment to the conference or make arrangements through the ACJS A/V provider (information can be obtained from the Association Manager, manager@acjs.org).

#### **ACJS Program Participation Options**

#### **Research Showcase**

The Research Showcase is a collection of visual displays of research that encourages informal interaction between authors and audience. The primary author of a Research Showcase presentation must be in attendance and committed to standing near his or her presentation throughout the allotted session.

#### **Paper Presentations**

Panels consist of four or five presenters of written papers and a panel chair. Presenters make formal presentations of completed works. The panel chair opens and closes the session and coordinates questions and comments from the audience.

#### **Student Authored Paper Panels**

Undergraduate and graduate student authors may submit their papers to a regular topical area of their choice where they will present with other faculty and practitioners. However, students have the option to submit their papers for presentation on an all-student panel. These panels are on a variety of topical areas and are designed to facilitate initial presentations in a supportive and welcoming environment. Students who select this option should select "student panel" as their topic area.

#### **Complete Panels**

A complete panel consists of coordinating the arrangement of four papers related to a common theme. The person facilitating the complete panel must include a panel chair, panel title, and four papers with all supporting information for the papers at the time of submission to the website.

#### Roundtables

Roundtables are open discussions of a topic, organized by a moderator and involving no more than four individual discussants with special knowledge or expertise in the topic area. No formal papers are presented. Often the discussion concerns diverse viewpoints or findings in a topic area.

#### **Open Workshop**

An open workshop is instructional or interactive in nature but does not require advance registration of attendees. Typically, open workshops involve one or more presenters speaking on more practical educational issues such as seeking extramural research funding, the job search process, developing course syllabi, or entering university administration. Open workshops can also be hands-on experiences that involve the audience as participants (e.g., mock job interviews, victim-offender mediation). An Open Workshop is in a different format than a roundtable panel because there are no discussants and no scholarly papers presented.

#### Other Information

Only original papers that have not been published may be submitted to the Program Committee for presentation consideration. Presentations of the same paper presented elsewhere are discouraged. In addition, only one submission per lead author/presenter is allowed. One author/presenter will not be able to submit multiple submissions as lead author/presenter.

The meetings are Tuesday March 19, 2024 through Saturday March 23, 2024. Sessions may be scheduled at any time during the meetings. ACJS cannot honor personal preferences for day and time of presentations. If a session does not have a chair, a program committee member may choose a presenter from the last paper on the session.
