Policy Resolution

Subject: Support for Use of Abuse-Deterrent Technology

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1 WHEREAS, the abuse of prescription painkillers is having a devastating effect on public health and  
2 safety in communities across the country<sup>1</sup>.  
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4 WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, drug overdose deaths now  
5 surpass traffic crashes in the number of deaths caused by injury in the United States. In 2011, an average  
6 of about 110 people in the United States died from drug overdose every day<sup>2</sup>  
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8 WHEREAS, opioid pain relievers are the most widely misused or abused controlled prescription drugs  
9 (commonly referred to as ``CPDs") and are involved in most CPD-related overdose incidents<sup>3</sup>  
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11 WHEREAS, the Office of National Drug Control Policy and the Food and Drug Administration have for  
12 many years strongly encouraged manufacturers of opioid drug products to develop abuse-deterrent  
13 formulations designed to prevent or discourage the abuse or misuse of those products  
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15 WHEREAS, in response, several opioid drug manufacturers have developed abuse-deterrent formulations  
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17 WHEREAS, helping to reduce the level of abuse of opioid drug products is dependent on the widespread  
18 adoption of new technologies and approaches to the safer formulation of these drugs, therefore be it  
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20 RESOLVED, That ACPM support the use of abuse-deterrent technology by manufacturers of pain  
21 medication and work with manufacturers to address any access to care issues that may arise due to use of  
22 this new technology.
