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NATION'S LARGEST INDEPENDENT GROCER AGREES TO PILOT NUTRITION GUIDANCE SYSTEM ENDORSED BY AMERICAN COLLEGE OF PREVENTIVE MEDICINE

Washington, D.C. – The American College of Preventive Medicine (ACPM), a leading organization of some of the country's top physicians committed to preventing disease and promoting health, applauds Kroger, the nation's largest supermarket chain, for agreeing to pilot the NuVal nutritional scoring system endorsed by ACPM in January 2010. Kroger announced it is testing the system in 23 of its Central Kentucky stores, including all Lexington locations, as part of a larger nutrition initiative called "Health Matters at Kroger."

A key component of the initiative includes rollout of the NuVal nutritional scoring system on the Kroger shelves, which scores the majority of store products using one single score between 1 for the least healthy to 100 for the most. The system analyzes more than 30 different nutrients and ingredients to arrive at a score. It enables consumers at a glance to compare the nutritional value of the foods they buy.

"We are very pleased to see this system gaining traction in grocery stores across the nation," said ACPM President Mark B. Johnson, MD, MPH, FACPM, "and the addition of Kroger, given its significant market share, is a win for public health in this country." ACPM is the first independent medical/public health organization with national stature to endorse the NuVal rating system, or any non-federal nutrition guidance system for that matter.

Prior to the Kroger pilot, NuVal has been in use in more than 525 supermarkets in 18 states.

The system is on the shelves of all Price Chopper, Hy-Vee, Meijer, and United Supermarkets

stores, and 17 additional retailers are considering adopting the system.

In a joint ACPM/NuVal statement January 19 announcing ACPM's endorsement, Dr. Johnson

said that while the number of food ranking systems available to retailers and consumers is

growing, ACPM chose to endorse NuVal because it was developed without influence from food

manufacturers, met ACPM's standards for scientific rigor, applies to all foods, and demonstrated

an ability to positively influence consumers' purchasing habits.

"We commend the Kroger leadership for putting the health of consumers at the forefront of its

business, and encourage other grocers to assess how their practices may be influencing their

consumers' health, too," says Dr. Johnson.

In addition to rolling out the NuVal scoring system, Kroger's nutritional initiative includes bringing

registered dietitians in to offer scheduled tours with shoppers to help determine their individual

needs. The program also features the LC600 Health Station, or LUCY, which is a machine that

allows customers to assess weight, body mass index, blood pressure, pulse, blood oxygen, and

more. Kroger also is organizing monthly events such as "Healthier Meal Maker" and "Cruising

the Aisles with Kroger."

"We all know the saying 'Two great minds think alike.' I am very gratified that in this instance

two great organizations—ACPM and Kroger—thought alike about NuVal, said Dr. David Katz,

ACPM Fellow, director and co-founder of the Yale Prevention Research Center, and one of the

principal inventors behind the NuVal system. "The public should benefit enormously, and I look

forward to seeing the proof of that!"
