I was born on May 21, 1965 in Hong Kong, and moved to the United States with my parents in 1984. After receiving a B.S. Degree from the New York Institute of Technology School of Architecture in 1991, I began my professional career as a drafts person in a small office in the Manhattan area, learning the art of manual drafting and corporate interior planning.

My first encounter with the Queens architectural scene, was in 1992 where I obtained a position as a Junior Project Manager for T.F. Cusanelli Architects & Planners PC, a local firm in the Queens area, where I worked on projects of a mostly smaller scale. In addition to designing and drafting, I was responsible for the day to day running of projects under the supervision of the architect of record. This experience gave me a great deal of respect of the importance in learning how to deal with the New York City Department of Buildings and understanding the review and approval process of projects.

In the years between 1995 through 1999, I joined SLCE Architects as a Project Captain in the High Rise Residential Project Team.

In 1999 to 2003, I joined the firm Beyer Blinder Belle Architects, LLP, New York, obtaining a position as a Senior Technical Architect, before returning to my roots as a Queens architect in 2004 and establishing the practice of Angelo Ng and Anthony Ng Architects Studio, PC in 2008.

Part of the privilege and uniqueness of practicing architecture in the Queens area is to be able to work with clients not only from all walks of life, but a wide range of nationalities and ethnicities, more than anywhere else in the world. This is the most multicultural county in the United States.

It is with that belief, I work with my clients, whether homeowners or developers, from the inception of the project to help them tailor a project program that suites their needs and provide a design solution that will adhere to the program while respecting the site's context.
