Dr. Charles Gardner

Dr. Gardner has been the Medical Officer of Health (MOH) for the Simcoe Muskoka Health Unit since 2005, after having served as MOH with the Leeds, Grenville and Lanark District Health Unit for seven years. Prior to that, he worked in general medical practice in Newfoundland, New Brunswick, and Zimbabwe. Dr. Gardner is the current President of the Association of Local Public Health Agencies (aPHa) Board, and an Ex Officio Member of the Executive of the Council of Ontario Medical Officers of Health (COMOH). In June 2023 he received aPHa's Distinguished Service Award. Dr. Gardner received the Faculty Educator Award for the Public Health and Preventive Medicine Residency, University of Toronto, in 2020. He is also a board member of Physicians for a Smoke-Free Canada. Dr. Gardner is active personally and professionally on the promotion of health through green, compact, complete, walkable and cycleable communities.



Hon. Doug Ford (invited)

Doug Ford is the Premier of Ontario. He was also elected as the MPP for Etobicoke-North in 2018. Previously, Doug Ford served as Toronto city councillor from 2010-2014, and was vice-chair of the Budget Committee, where he delivered hundreds of millions of dollars in savings for taxpayers. While on city council, Ford served on the board of Build Toronto, and was a director of the Canadian National Exhibition. He also served on the Civic Appointments Committee and the Government Management Committee at Council. A dedicated community leader, successful businessman with Deco Labels and passionate advocate for the people, Doug's commitment to public service runs in the family. Three generations of Fords have served the people of Ontario in elected office. Doug is a life-long resident of the community of Etobicoke, and lives there with his wife Karla and four daughters. His commitment to public service includes over 20 years of dedicated work with the Toronto West Rotary Club and serving as a proud member of the Royal Canadian Legion.



Hon. Sylvia Jones (invited)

Sylvia Jones serves as the Member of Provincial Parliament for Dufferin-Caledon. She is currently Ontario's Deputy Premier and Minister of Health. Minister Jones previously served as Solicitor General from 2019-2022, where she championed public safety initiatives, including leading the country with an anti-human trafficking strategy and legislation, and passing Canada's toughest animal protection legislation. Minister Jones has lived in Dufferin-Caledon for over 30 years with her husband, David.



Dr. Theresa Tam (invited)

Dr. Theresa Tam was named Canada's Chief Public Health Officer on June 26, 2017. She is a paediatric infectious disease specialist with expertise in immunization, emergency preparedness and global health security. Dr. Tam obtained her medical degree from the University of Nottingham in the U.K. She completed her paediatric residency at the University of Alberta and her fellowship in paediatric infectious diseases at the University of British Columbia. She is a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada and has over 55 peer-reviewed journal publications in public health. She is also a graduate of the Canadian Field Epidemiology Program. Dr. Tam has held several senior leadership positions at the Public Health Agency of Canada, including as the Deputy Chief Public Health Officer and the Assistant Deputy Minister for Infectious Disease Prevention and Control. During her 25 years in public health, she provided technical expertise and leadership on new initiatives to improve communicable disease surveillance, enhance immunization programs, strengthen health emergency management and laboratory biosafety and biosecurity. She has played a leadership role in Canada's response to public health emergencies including severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS), pandemic influenza H1N1 and Ebola. Dr. Tam has served as an international expert on a number of World Health Organization committees and has participated in multiple international missions related to SARS, pandemic influenza and polio eradication.



Colin Best (invited)

Colin Best is the President of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) and a Halton Regional Councillor. He has been involved in his community of Milton in many ways. He has served on Milton council for 33 years and Halton council for the past 19 years. He has served on the AMO Board for six years and the Executive for the past four years chairing the Regional and Single Tier Caucus representing 32 per cent of Ontario's population. He has also chaired the AMO Health Task Force for the last two years. On Regional council Colin is the past Chair of the Planning and Public Works Committee and previously the Vice-Chair of the Health and Social Services Committee. Also serving on the Agricultural, Natural Heritage and Joint Waste advisory committees, Children's Aid Society and Police Services Board. On Local Council Colin is the past Chair of the Budget Committee and current serves on the Downtown Milton Business Improvement Area Board and Milton Hydro Board. Previously he has served on the Milton Public Library Board, Community Services Advisory, Heritage and Town Hall expansion committees. Colin is a volunteer member of the Milton Transitional Housing Board, Santa Claus Parade Committee, Friends of Milton District Hospital, Campbellville Community Association and other local groups.



Professor France Gagnon (invited)

Dr. Gagnon is an expert in the field of genetic and epigenetic epidemiology and her research program aims to improve patient care and population health through a better understanding of human biology in a population-wide context. Her research is highly collaborative and focuses on cardiovascular disease using novel statistical technologies, while integrating wet-lab findings and clinical data into mathematical models of diseases. She spearheaded the CIHR STAGE (Strategic Training for Advanced Genetic Epidemiology) training program in 2010, the first of its kind in Canada. She continues to co-lead the program while building community and capacity in statistical and epidemiological genetics. Under her leadership, the team has mentored more than 35 PhD and post-doctoral trainees. Dr. Gagnon has served in leadership positions on national and international steering and advisory committees, including President of the International Genetic Epidemiology Society in 2015, and she has been a reviews editor for Human Genetics since 2007. She has received several research and teaching awards, including: CIHR New Investigator Award, U of T Faculty of Medicine Graduate Teaching Award for Early Career Excellence and the Anthony Miller Award for Excellence in Research in Public Health Sciences.



Dr. Kieran Moore

Dr. Kieran Moore has been appointed as the province's Chief Medical Officer of Health, effective June 26, 2021. Dr. Moore served as the Medical Officer of Health for Kingston, Frontenac, Lennox and Addington from 2011 to 2021. Dr. Moore is also the Medical Officer of Health of the Department of Emergency and Family Medicine of Queen's University and the Program Director of Public Health and Preventive Medicine at Queen's University. Dr. Moore received his Medical degree from the University of Ottawa and subsequently received his specialty certification in Family Medicine and Emergency Medicine from the College of Family Physicians of Canada. He has Master's degrees in Disaster Medicine (DM) and Public Health (PH) as well as a Physician Leadership and Diplomas in Sports Medicine, Tropical Medicine & Hygiene, and Humanitarian Assistance. He has completed a Canadian Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons Fellowship in Public Health and Preventive Medicine at Queen's University. Dr. Moore has extensive experience in surveillance systems for bioterrorism and outbreak detection, public health, pre-hospital care, and multidisciplinary research projects. His main area of interest is in the evaluation of various data streams for the early detection of outbreaks as well as assessment of deprivation distribution in populations. In 2018 he was named Principal Investigator of the CIHR-funded Pan-Canadian Research Network on Lyme Disease.



Cynthia St. John

Cynthia St. John is the CEO of Southwestern Public Health, formed in 2018 by the merger of the former Oxford County Public Health and Elgin-St. Thomas Public Health. Prior to the merger, Cynthia presided as the Executive Director of Elgin-St. Thomas Public Health for 18 years. Cynthia now leads an organization of approximately 200 employees responsible for providing public health programming to a population of over 200,000 in southwestern Ontario. Cynthia began her career in the charitable sector having had the privilege of working with exceptional organizations such as the YWCA, the Anne Johnston Community Health Centre, and Dying with Dignity Canada. She holds a Masters of Business Administration with a specialization in Leadership.



Emma Tucker

Emma Tucker is Acting Director of the Public Health Resources Division at Halton Region Public Health. The division provides leadership and support to the Foundational Standards (Population Health Assessment, Effective Public Health Practice, and Emergency Management), as well as the Accountability Framework and Organizational Standards. Emma first started working in Public Health in 1999 and has held a number of positions: dietitian, environmental health analyst, epidemiologist, manager of surveillance and evaluation, and business administrator. She has also held clinical dietitian, research and teaching roles at St. Michael's Hospital, and early in her career worked on Bay Street in the financial markets. Emma has Bachelors degrees in Applied Mathematics and Nutrition, and a Masters degree in Statistics. She is passionate about using local data and research evidence to help address the health needs of her community, with a focus on priority populations.



Maria Sánchez-Keane

Maria Sánchez-Keane, M.Div., MBA is the Principal Consultant for the Centre for Organizational Effectiveness, an organization she founded in 2000. The Centre focuses its work on the public, non-profit, and charitable sectors. She has extensive experience in strategic planning, leading complex change initiatives, and facilitating voluntary merger/unification processes. She has worked within the public health sector for the past 15 years. By her work she aims to improve the health and well-being of people, particularly those most vulnerable and marginalized in society, through organizational, community and systems improvements and change. Maria's systems, community and organizational background has given her clients the ability to develop strong implementation plans with clear performance measures, which effectively evaluate the success of initiatives undertaken. She has worked with various sized groups, from teams of three to organizations with thousands of employees across many communities. She has worked with community, organizational, municipal, provincial and national leaders. Maria holds a Master of Business Administration and a Master of Divinity, which grounds her work. Robert is an active member of many provincial and regional health organizations. For example, he is currently Chair of the Durham Nuclear Health Committee; past Chair of the Port Hope Community Health Centre; and Past-Chair of the Public Health Ontario Board of Directors. Robert is a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada and the American College of Preventive Medicine, and is a former Medical Officer of Health for the Peterborough County-City Health Unit.



Steven Rebellato

Steven Rebellato is the Vice President for the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit. He has his PhD in Public Health from the University of Waterloo. Steven is a part-time Assistant Professor at McMaster University in the Department of Health Research Methods, Evidence, & Impact and Adjunct Professor at the University of Waterloo. He is the Vice-Chair for the York Hills Centre for Children, Youth and Families in the Region of York.



Trudy Sachowski

Trudy Sachowski serves the Northwestern Board of Health as the municipal appointment for the Municipality of Machin and City of Dryden. Trudy is a true champion for public health and has remained steadfast in her commitment to improving the health outcomes of the people of Northwestern Ontario and across the province. He was previously the interim Transitional Lead and Chief Corporate Officer for the Toronto Seniors Housing Corporation (TSHC), where he led planning for TSHC to assume operating responsibility for seniors' social housing buildings from the Toronto Community Housing Corporation. Prior to TSHC, Michael spent 17 years at Cancer Care Ontario (CCO), nine of which as President and CEO. He led the expansion of CCO's mandate, built an effective infrastructure to support health system improvement in Ontario and led the smooth transition of CCO to become a division of Ontario Health. Michael received his doctorate in Medical Biophysics from the University of Toronto. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Physics from Oxford University.



Colleen Geiger

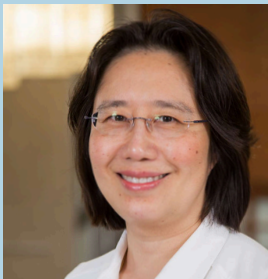
Dr. Samir Patel

Dr. Samir Patel provides executive and scientific leadership, strategic direction and accountability for the planning and priorities of the laboratory science and operations portfolio. Samir first joined PHO as a Clinical Microbiologist in 2009 and has since taken on several progressive leadership positions since that time, including the provision of scientific leadership for the laboratory in his most recent role as Chief, Microbiology and Laboratory Science. He has been the clinical lead of many important programs at the laboratory, including vector-borne and zoonotic infections such as Lyme and West Nile, antimicrobial resistance, and a novel pathogen discovery program. He has provided leadership for the Ontario COVID-19 Genomics Network and the Testing Strategy Expert Panel, which were established to support the response to COVID-19. He has also actively contributed to many important committees, including the Institute of Quality Management Microbiology Committee, and the Canadian Public Health Laboratory Network's Antimicrobial Resistance and Lyme Working groups. Samir is an Associate Professor in the Department of Laboratory Medicine and Pathobiology at the University of Toronto. He received his doctor of philosophy in tropical diseases from the University of Toronto, where he also received his fellowship in clinical microbiology. He successfully completed his Canadian Society of Microbiology board exam in 2011.



Dr. Tamara Wallington

Dr. Tamara Wallington is responsible for leading PHO's work generating and providing evidence to guide action in the areas of health promotion and environmental and occupational health. Tamara is a physician leader with over 20 years of experience working across all areas of Ontario's health system, from population health, to public health, to acute care, to administrative medicine and education leadership. She spent several years working as an Associate Medical Officer of Health at Toronto Public Health, before transitioning to a physician leadership role at William Osler Health System, as well as a regional leadership role as Vice President, Clinical at the Central West Local Health Integration Network. Prior to joining PHO, she was Program Chief and Medical Director at Trillium Health Partners, as well as Academic Lead of the Family Medicine Teaching Unit, advancing excellence in education, research, innovation, program delivery and continuous improvement. 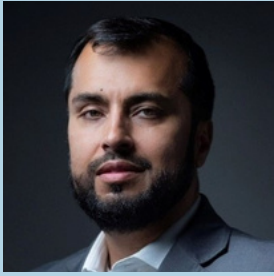
Monika Tuner

Monika Turner was the Director of Policy for the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) from 2010 to 2022. She joined AMO in 2010 after 25 years with the Ontario Government as both a public servant and a political assistant. Monika worked in several provincial ministries including the Ministry of Health twice. From 1998 to 2003, with the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care (MOHLTC), she led a series of key physician compensation negotiations on behalf of the province, including the first set of Emergency Department Alternative Payment Agreements for every hospital in Ontario. In 2006, Monika returned to MOHLTC as the Director of Public Health Standards and managed the development of the Ontario Public Health Standards (2008) and the Initial Report on Public Health (2009). Monika now has her own public policy consulting and facilitation business, Roving Capacity. Her areas of policy expertise include: public health, paramedicine, housing, health, municipal issues and Indigenous relations. Monika did her undergraduate and graduate work in Anthropology at McMaster University, and has a Masters of Law degree (ADR) from Osgoode Law School. She received her Masters of Public Health from the University of Waterloo in 2011.



James LeNoury

James LeNoury has represented alPHA since 2001. He represented alPHA at the Walkerton Water Inquiry. He has presented regularly at alPHA conferences and written a number of papers for alPHA members.
