



Resident Case Presentation

A Case of Follicular Mucinosis with Eosinophilic Folliculitis

Case history:

A 20 y.o. male with past medical history of asthma presented to the St. Barnabas Hospital dermatology clinic with a pruritic facial rash for several weeks. It was treated with Cleocin T solution without which is consistent with eosinophilic folliculitis which prompted improvement. On second visit one week later, patient agreed for a a workup for immunocompetence. Subsequent HIV test and skin biopsy. Patient was started on Aclovate cream 0.05% bid and tetracycline 500mg bid. Lesions resolved after 2weeks of therapy.

Physical Exam:

There were multiple firm flesh-color papules on the forehead, cheeks and chin.

DDx:

- -acne vulgarise
- -osinophilic folliculitis

Pathology Biopsy:

Follicular indundibulum with mucin deposits of acid mucopolysaccharide with lots of lymphocytes and eosinophils.

Diagnosis:

Follicular mucinosis with features of eosinophilic folliculitis.

Discussion:

Follicular mucinosis was first described by Pinkus in 1957. There are two types: primary and secondary. The primary type tend to occur in the head and neck regions of children and young adults and have a short but benign course. It can be disseminated on the body. The secondary type tend to occur in older patients in a diffuse distribution and can be associated with mycosis fungoides. Alopecia for both types is evident only when terminal hair-bearing areas are affected.

Histologically it is hard to differentiate between the two types of follicular mucinosis. Some researchers believe that the benign form may transit into the lymphomatous form. In addition follicular mucinosis can be seen in association with other lymphomas, chronic discoid lupus erythematosus, angiolymphoid hyperplasia, verruca, alopecia areata which suggest that it may be a nonspecific reaction pattern.

Our patient's case is unusual in that he complained of pruritus workup for lymphomas were negative. His lesions returned 8 months later and resolved with same treatment.


