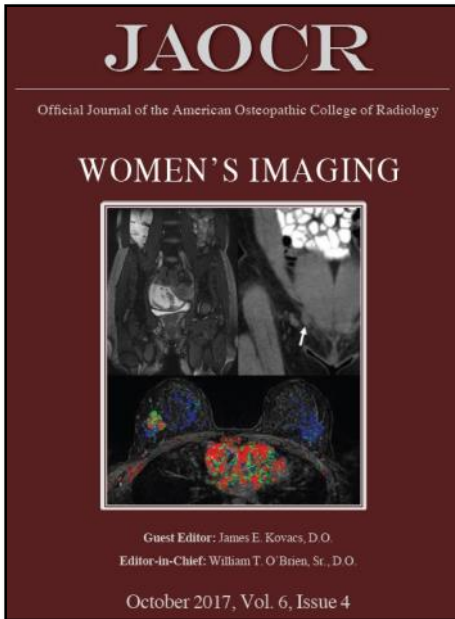

Women's Imaging: From the Guest Editor

One might ask why we need a Women's Imaging issue of the JAOOCR, when two excellent Breast Imaging issues have already been published in January 2013, edited by Michelle C. Walters, D.O., FAOCR, and again in January 2014, edited by Susann E. Schetter, D.O., FAOCR. Unlike many other cancer types that primarily affect older individuals, the potential number of years lost by a young woman diagnosed with breast cancer or gynecologic malignancy places greater importance on the roles of early and high-quality imaging and accurate radiologic interpretation in this group.

The case reviews in this issue by Drs. Gupta and Ahmad, and a Viewbox case by Dr. Mikes, highlight key findings in pelvic imaging. While this issue includes two new breast imaging articles to complement the aforementioned breast imaging issues, a women's imaging issue need not be limited to examinations tailored to anatomic features of women but may also include articles reflecting differences in predilection between women and men. This difference is illustrated by a Viewbox musculoskeletal case submitted by Drs. Stein and Gogna.

When I hear the recently popularized term sustainability in the context of preserving earth's limited resources, I am reminded of how the AOOCR is also adapting to ensure the sustainability of osteopathic radiology. Along with the privilege of being guest editor of this journal comes the responsibility to mentor radiologists-in-training in scholarly activity. With this objective in mind, most articles in this issue were authored or co-authored by radiology residents. I am especially proud of this issue due to the contributions of radiology residents who will carry the flag long after I have hung up my hat. Our greatest legacy may be to have trained radiologists who will provide high-quality imaging services to women. I hope this issue will help propel you toward that goal.

I would like to acknowledge my colleagues and associates, especially Pauline Germaine, D.O., who rather abashedly called attention to my blind spots, and through whose varied perspectives I have been granted the opportunity to become a better physician. Lastly, I could never forget to thank my wife, Diana, for her endless support and tireless patience while writing and editing this issue.

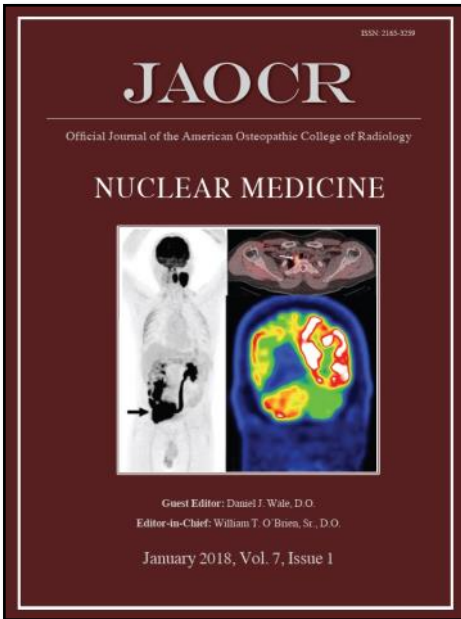

This is an especially unique opportunity for faculty within radiology training programs interested in expanding their scholarly activities.



Nuclear Medicine: From the Guest Editor

Nuclear medicine and molecular imaging is an ever-expanding field of imaging. Combining functional information from radiopharmaceuticals with anatomic imaging creates a powerful tool. The interpreting physician must not only have a sound basis in radiological principles, but also have a solid foundation in physiology and pathophysiology to understand the normal and abnormal causes of uptake. It is with this goal that we proudly present this nuclear-medicine-themed issue of JAOCR.

Our review article topics were chosen to address common issues in everyday nuclear medicine, F-18 fluorodeoxyglucose (FDG) PET/CT and parathyroid imaging. The PET review article focuses on the variety of pitfalls encountered in oncologic FDG PET/CT imaging. The article is essentially an imaging atlas to illustrate the gamut of potential pitfalls leading to—and strategies to avoid—misdiagnosis. Our parathyroid imaging review provides a comprehensive look at the current state of nuclear medicine's role in managing primary hyperparathyroidism with a focus on SPECT/CT hybrid imaging.

In our differential case reviews, we present an unusual and unexpected focus of uptake in a radiolabeled leukocyte scan, as well as an atypical thyroid scan in a

patient with hyperthyroidism. Finally, we have three beautiful examples of classic nuclear medicine cases for your enjoyment in JAOCR at the Viewbox.

I am forever grateful to the staff, reviewers, and editors at JAOCR. Special thanks must be given to William T. O'Brien, Sr., D.O., for guidance and support throughout this project. Every author worked diligently on these articles and I am forever in their debt. I am also honored to have several residents from the Garden City Division of the Michigan State University Radiology Osteopathic Residency Program participate in this issue. Their hard work with guidance from faculty mentors resulted in excellent articles.

It was fun creating the issue, and I hope you enjoy it. Moreover, I hope this issue solidifies and adds to your knowledge of clinical nuclear medicine.

In Memoriam



David A. Kellam, DO, FAOCR, 85, passed away January 9, 2018. Dr. Kellam was a remarkable leader of the AOCR, serving on the Board of Directors from 1967-1978. In 1976 he became the youngest President in the history of the AOCR at that time.

Dr. Kellam graduated from Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine in 1956 at the age of 23. He completed his internship and residency training at Detroit Osteopathic Hospital. He began his career as the Director of Radiology at Orlando General Hospital (now Florida Hospital East) in 1960. Two years later, he accepted the position of Chairman and Residency Program Director of Pontiac Osteopathic Hospital in Pontiac, MI. His passion for teaching made him instrumental in the education of many of our AOCR members. The roughly 100 or so radiologists that he trained over the country are part of his legacy, and no doubt still hear his voice in their head from time to time.

Dr. Kellam was certified in diagnostic radiology by the AOBR in 1962 and his passion for learning led to two fellowships, one in interventional radiology and another in nuclear medicine-leading to an additional board certification in 1979 by the AOBNM. He became an Active Member of the AOCR in 1963. He served in many leadership areas of the College and the profession. After his service on the AOCR Board of Directors, he continued to provide guidance to the profession during his tenure on the AOBR, 1982-1991. His service continued with the AOCR Education Foundation from 1995-2000.

He received many awards and honors throughout his career, including AOCR Fellowship, AOCR Trenery Lecturer, AOCR Distinguished Service Award, AOA Mentor Hall of Fame, voted POH Medical Center Trainer of the Year four times and the prestigious Walter Patenge Medal at Michigan State University.

In October 2010, Dr. Kellam retired from practice after nearly 50 years of service. His impact on the radiology profession and on the AOCR can still be felt, as many of his former residents have become involved in radiology residency training and hold positions on many AOCR committees and the Board of Directors.

In Memoriam

Carl L. Neufeld, 90, passed away January 15, 2018.

Dr. Neufeld graduated from Kansas City College of Osteopathic Medicine in Kansas City, MO in 1955. He completed his internship in 1956 and his radiology residency in 1959, both at Doctors Hospital in Columbus, OH.
