Project Title: Fostering Publication for Early Career Women in Metaphysics

Abstract:

If awarded, this grant would fund a workshop highlighting the scholarship of pre-tenure women working in metaphysics. The workshop builds on initiatives already in place at Fordham University and provides a forum for philosophers to present their work to and receive feedback from the general philosophical public. The workshop's aims are twofold: to encourage pre-tenure women working in metaphysics to develop their work towards publication, and to increase the visibility of this scholarship.

Women are underrepresented in philosophy. In a 2011 APA report, Kathryn Norlock estimated that women make up only 21% of postsecondary philosophy instructors. This fact is sobering enough. Even more sobering, however, is a 2015 study carried out by Kieran Healy which tracked publication and citation rates in four prestigious generalist journals (J.Phil, Mind, Phil. Review, and Nous) from 1993-2013. Healy found that, during this period, only 12.5% of total publications were by women authors. He found, moreover, that of the top 500 most-cited works, only 3.6% were by women authors (by way of comparison, 6.3% were by David Lewis alone). Healy's study suggests, then, that not only are women underrepresented in philosophy - women are also being published at a disproportionately lower rate than men, and when women are published, they are cited far less frequently than men.

This workshop seeks in part to address these issues. While its purpose is to foster excellent scholarship in metaphysics in general, its unique additional aims include (i) encouraging pre-tenure women working in metaphysics to publish their work and by (ii) increasing the rate at which this work is cited. The workshop will address (i) by implementing a unique evaluation strategy after the workshop's completion (see Evaluation Plan below). The workshop will address (ii) by featuring women's scholarship in the metaphysics hub of New York City. Indeed, although the New York City area is home to exciting research in metaphysics, there is not currently a workshop of this kind in the region. We have reason to think, moreover, that when scholarship is more visible before publication, it will be cited more often after publication.

Project Status

Fordham University's Metaphysics and Mind Group is composed of members from multiple universities, and has met regularly since 2012. The group workshops new work by established and emerging scholars, and has featured the following presenters: Matias Bulnes, Matthew Carrella, Bryan Frances, William Jaworski, Barbara Montero, Mytro Mylopolous, Turner Nevitt, Graham Priest, Howard Robinson, Jonathan Schaffer, Amy Seymour, Kevin Timpe, Peter van Inwagen, and Shane Wilkins.

Much of the work presented to this group (approximately 35%) is already either forthcoming or published. Notably, the group workshoped an early version of Jonathan Schaffer's "Grounding in the Image of Causation," which is forthcoming in *Philosophical Studies*, and which was awarded the 2014 American Philosophical Association Lebowitz Prize for Philosophical Achievement and Contribution. The group, then, has already demonstrated its capacity for preparing excellent work for publication. It has also received regular support from Fordham's philosophy department, and has been granted \$800 to fund workshops in AY2015-2016.

By bringing together philosophers from the New York City area, including members of an established group at Fordham University, the proposed project will promote the scholarship of early career women philosophers through presentations, discussions, and ongoing support. In addition to Fordham's support, the project has requested \$800 from New York University.

The workshop is tentatively scheduled for March 19-March 20, 2016. The process of securing rooms, catering, etc., has already begun, and the workshop's website is up and running. If awarded, the project will proceed according to the following timeline:

December 2015: Presenters will be tentatively invited to the workshop, pending the award. With the exception of one or two presenters, all will be drawn from the NYC-area.

January 2016: Promotion of the workshop will begin (see Outreach Plan, below).

January 2016: Presenters will be confirmed and the final schedule will be set.

February 2016: Conference materials will be designed and sent to the printer, caterer will be contacted, contracts will be signed, and all other arrangements will be made.

March 15, 2016: Conference materials and catering will be finalized.

March 19-20, 2016: Tentative workshop dates

June 1, 2016: Initial workshop assessment and evaluation report will be prepared.

December 2016: First follow-up email to presenters will be sent (see Evaluation Plan below). Workshop organizers will begin to track citations of any publications reported.

June 2017: Second follow-up email to presenters will be sent (see Evaluation Plan below).

The workshop, reception, and all events will be open to the general philosophical public, and to the lay public as well. In order to reach these audiences, workshop organizers will implement the following outreach plan:

By January 2016, workshop organizers will post the event to PhilEvents. Organizers will also advertise the event through popular philosophy ListServes (including PhilUpdates), social media (including Facebook and Twitter), and Fordham's Metaphysics and Mind Workshop Group.

Print fliers and other promotional materials will also be created in January 2016. These will be forwarded to all presenters and steering committee members for distribution at their respective universities. Workshop organizers will also reach out to leaders in the field to encourage them to attend, and to invite their colleagues and students.

The assessment of this workshop will seek to measure whether and to what extent it achieves its goals, and will be carried out in three phases:

First, all participants and presenters will complete an online survey after the end of the workshop. The survey will be hosted by Qualtrics, and will include both qualitative and quantitative measures. A summary report will be generated from the survey's findings.

Second, workshop organizers will follow-up with presenters at six months and one year after the workshop's completion to track the status of publications coming out of the workshop. This assessment plan encourages presenters to publish their work, and allows workshop organizers to quantify the publication outcomes that result from the workshop.

Third, organizers will track citations of any published work resulting from the workshop for at least two years after the workshop's end. When this data is compared with control publications (publications by women in metaphysics not resulting from the conference), this will help organizers determine if the workshop increased visibility of the presenters' work.

We hope that the results of these three assessment measures will help us plan for the future, and that they will be helpful for developing future strategies for increasing the visibility and impact of groups that have been traditionally under-represented in philosophical conversations.
