



Children’s Residential Mental Health – Deficiency Funding TALKING POINTS, January, 2019

As leaders in the field of children’s services and children’s mental health, AspireMN members and supporters have unique insight into the importance of the issue of funding children’s residential mental health services. At this early stage in the session, AspireMN members are well positioned to create awareness and urgency for all legislators to encourage expedient action on this issue.

- Minnesota has an urgent need to assure funding for Children’s Residential Mental Health services for May and June of 2019.
- Funding for this priority was passed in 2018 and did not become law due to the final veto of the omnibus budget bill.
- There is agreement within the legislature that the Children’s Residential Mental Health funding gap for May-June 2019 is a priority for funding.
- The issue is timing. Children and youth needing this level of care, their families, the counties responsible to place them for treatment, and service providers all need reassurance that the state will keep its commitment and provide the needed state funding to assure services can be delivered yet this spring.
- Passing this anticipated \$470,000 funding early in the session sends a signal that serving kids in need of intensive mental health treatment is a priority.
- Please share these urgent hopes and concerns with your legislative caucus leaders and ask them to pass this funding for kids, now.

deficiency in funding of these critical services for children and youth – over the months of May-June, 2019, at a projected cost to the state of \$470,000.

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The issue is timing. Children and youth needing this level of care, their families, the counties responsible to place them for treatment, and service providers all need reassurance that the state will keep its commitment and provide the needed state funding to assure services can be delivered yet this spring.

Passing this anticipated \$470,000 funding early in the session sends a signal that serving kids in need of intensive mental health treatment is a priority.

Please share these urgent hopes and concerns with your legislative caucus leaders and ask them to pass this funding for kids, now.
