Topic:	<p>Supervision Hours for Licensure via Tele-means</p> <p>Jackie Horn, Director of Educational Affairs at ASPPB has been working with the training organizations about how COVID-19 will impact training experiences and hence student's completion of degree requirements.</p> <p>In order to continue to provide responses to the questions we are receiving at ASPPB, could you please let us know that in light of classes that have been cancelled/schools closed and supervision/services needing to be held by tele-means, would those hours count for licensure in your jurisdictions?</p>

California Board of Psychology	Phone: (916) 574-7720 Email: bopmail@dca.ca.gov Website: Click here	<p>For California, we are offering the following guidance as it relates to supervision and mode of psychological services delivery:</p> <p>Supervision</p> <p>Question: Can the face-to-face, direct, individual supervision with the primary supervisor be conducted virtually if work site is closed due to COVID-19?</p> <p>Answer: Title 16 of the California Code of Regulations (CCR), section 1387(b)(4), provides:</p> <p><i>“ Trainees shall be provided with supervision for 10% of the total time worked each week. At least one hour per week shall be face-to-face, direct, individual supervision with the primary supervisor.”</i></p>

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<p>California Board of Psychology</p> <p><i>(Continued)</i></p>		<p>If the state and local health authorities recommend the use of social distancing or mandate site closure where a trainee has been performing psychological functions under the immediate supervision of a primary supervisor, the one hour face-to-face, direct, individual supervision may be conducted via HIPAA-compliant video from March 16, 2020, until April 19, 2020. The trainee should clearly indicate this on the weekly log and the primary supervisor should verify this information.</p> <p><u>Mode of Psychological Services Delivery</u></p> <p>Question: Can trainees provide psychological services and accrue supervised professional experience (SPE) via telehealth?</p> <p>Answer: Yes, trainees can provide psychological services via telehealth as long as they are properly supervised in doing so and the supervisor is adequately trained and experienced in providing services via telehealth. SPE can be accrued if they meet the requirements set forth in title 16 CCR section 1387.</p> <p>Here is a link to the full advisory:</p> <p>https://www.psychology.ca.gov/applicants/covid_19.shtml</p>

As usual, such practices should be documented.

We would certainly accept tele-supervision for members in supervised practice or others requiring supervision for other reasons.

For post-doctoral supervision, we have a provision built into the rule that can be activated during emergency. Here is the Q&A posted to our COVID-19 webpage : 9. Can a resident receive individual supervision from their supervisor by electronic means? Usually, weekly individual supervision must occur face-to-face between resident and supervisor. However, OAR 858-010-0036(2)(e)(D) allows for non-routine

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<p>Oregon Board of Psychology</p> <p><i>(Continued)</i></p>		<p>individual supervision by electronic means when an emergency prohibits a face-to-face meeting. On March 8, 2020 the Governor declared a state of emergency in Oregon due to the coronavirus. So, if face-to-face meetings are prohibited due to the coronavirus emergency, then supervision may occur via electronically. Also, OAR 858-010-0036(2)(e)(C) allows individual supervision to be delayed for up to 14 days to accommodate illness.</p>
<p>Prince Edward Island Psychologists Regulation Board</p>	<p>Phone: (902) 566-0549 Website: Click here</p>	<p>Have confirmed with our Board that PEI's position is the same as described by Ontario and several others: we would accept what the universities accept for training supervision, and we will accept virtual supervision of post-degree practice during COVID-19 times.</p> <p>We also will be extending timelines for required completion of supervision and attempting/completing the EPPP if needed.</p>

Hope that this is of assistance.</p>

However, Texas does not allow more than 50% of supervision to occur through remote or electronic means. This means an applicant would not be able to use those supervised experience hours that exceed the amount of face-to-face supervised experience hours submitted for licensure.
