Your doctor has requested that your child has a Mag 3 kidney scan in the Nuclear Medicine Department. This leaflet will try to answer some of your questions.

What is involved in a Mag3 kidney scan?

A radioactive tracer is given by intravenous injection usually into the arm or back of the hand. This tracer goes to the kidneys and we take pictures of the kidneys to help with the diagnosis and treatment of your child.

Does my child need to prepare for the scan?

Please tell your child about the scan.

'Magic cream' is available to make the injection less painful. If you would like this for your child (and they are over 1 year old) you must attend 1 hour before the stated appointment time.

We would like him/her to drink more than usual but eat normally. (We understand that babies will only take what they want.)

We have the story 'Malcolm Monkey has a Mag 3' which we will discuss with your child.

What is involved?

On arrival you will be shown into the waiting room where there are toys and books.

We will ask your child to drink a couple of cups of fluid or if he/she is a baby we will ask you to give him/her a feed, either milk juice or water. We have water and squashes available but not baby feeds.

For babies the tracer is injected while laying on the camera. For older children we site a cannula (a small tube inserted into a vein) using a needle. We then take your child to the camera room.

Sometimes we need to see if the urine passes from the bladder back to the kidneys. To do this your child will be asked to pass urine whilst sitting/standing in front of the camera into a bedpan. This is done behind a screen.

What about the radiation?

The amount of radiation your child receives is small and similar to that from an x-ray. It will not make your child sleepy or unwell. Pregnant mums should avoid spending long periods of time in close contact with the child for the remainder of the day.

When do we get the results?

The results are sent directly to the doctor who requested the scan, usually within 2 weeks.

Do we need to do anything after the scan?

You should encourage your child to drink more than usual for the rest of the day as this will help to wash the radioactivity out of his/her body.

You should encourage good hand hygiene after using the toilet and before eating food.

We recommend that your child does not return to school for the remainder of the day after the test.

If you are travelling on holiday in the next month please take your appointment letter and this information leaflet with you.
