Goal 5 Initiative

Our Goal - By 2030, the Chicago Wilderness Alliance will represent the full diversity of the region to:

- 1. Increase access to natural areas as well as green and blue spaces of all types that are welcoming to all.
- 2. Expand nature-based programming across the region, particularly in places with the least area of healthy green space as of 2020.
- 3. Directly addresses the region's legacy of environmental injustice. These efforts will expand who reaps nature's benefits, with an emphasis on those who have been historically excluded, and deepen people's engagement with nature across the region.

Project Overview

- The Alliance is in Phase 3 of our JEDI Project with Cream City Conservation: Roadmap Development.
- Based on the results of our Culture Assessment and internal knowledge, the Roadmap working group held six strategy sessions with August ball and identified initial areas of focus and a survey has generated a list of volunteers and preliminary feedback to inform our next steps:
 - Refining organizational work plan into SMARTIE goals, open invitation to future workshop
 - Create CW Cafes to work on each goal

Engagement

We know that the Chicago Wilderness Alliance membership is not accurately representing the broad diversity of organizations and individuals advancing this work across the region.

We want to reach more organizations that are also working within the realm of human and ecological health, but may align in other ways besides strictly conservation/nature engagement (such as public health, transportation, housing, etc).

Accessibility

CWA resources have been created but many organizations, staff, members, volunteers are not aware of them and not able to access/plug in.

Overview

- Goal of Audit is to do an internal inventory of assets and needs relating to JEDI work within our current membership
 - Who is leading this work? Who needs to be connected to leaders?
- Structural Level
 - Internal board/staff structure, funding, policies, trainings, etc.
- Programmatic Level
 - Public facing practices, accessibility of materials and sites
