

## CONFERENCE OF RADIATON CONTROL PROGRAM DIRECTORS, INC.

## RESOLUTION

Relating to: Authorization of grant assistance to states under the Indoor Radon Abatement Act.

- **WHEREAS**: The United States Environmental Protection Agency, U.S. Surgeon General, and other national public health authorities have identified long-term exposure to elevated levels of radon and its progeny as the second leading cause of lung cancer; and
- **WHEREAS**: Long-term exposure to elevated levels of radon and its progeny poses a significant risk to the public health and safety; and
- **WHEREAS**: Any home, school, or building may have elevated levels of radon and its progeny, even if neighboring homes and buildings do not; and
- **WHEREAS**: The burden of developing and implementing a radon protection program is ultimately a state responsibility; and
- **WHEREAS**: The Indoor Radon Abatement Act of 1988 provided three years of funding to the State Indoor Radon Grant Program; and
- **WHEREAS**: Funding to assist states in developing and implementing radon protection programs under the 1988 Radon Abatement Act will expire; and
- **WHEREAS**: Any future funding requiring a state match of 50% will pose an extreme hardship on many states during this time of reduced state income; and
- **WHEREAS**: States need continued federal funding to develop self-sufficient, state-responsive radon protection programs; and
- **WHEREAS**: Timely reauthorization of the Indoor Radon Abatement Act is now at a critical point in the Congress, particularly in the House of Representatives;

## NOW BE IT RESOLVED:

The Conference of Radiation Control Program Directors, Inc., recommends that the State Indoor Radon Grant Program be reauthorized beyond 1994 and that the required state match be reduced to 25% so as to provide all states sufficient time to develop responsive state radon protection programs.
