The story moves from the narrator throwing up on Frederick Douglass as a baby, to the theft of money intended to buy freedom.

Emmy and the Incredible Shrinking Rat, by Lynne Jonell. 9780805081503, \$17.95. A talking classroom rat, absentee parents, and a cold-hearted nanny named Miss Barmy are making things challenging for Emmy. A hilarious, thrilling, magical mystery-adventure!



The Encyclopedia of Immaturity, by the editors of Klutz. 9781591744276, \$19.95. You’re never too old to be immature! This book is full of silly pranks and entertainments guaranteed to keep your young (and old!) ones amused over the holidays.



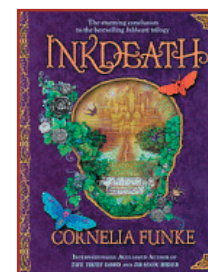
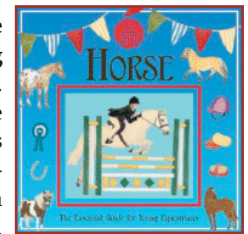

The books, along with collectible cards and an online game, make for an immersive experience. Also look for Book 2, *One False Note* by Gordon Korman. Ages 7-12 - great for boys AND girls!

Ten-year-old Moxy Maxwell has promised to write twelve thank-you notes by the day after Christmas so that she and her twin brother Mark can go to Hollywood to visit their father - but all her brilliant ideas to help finish the task more efficiently end up creating chaos. Sequel to last year's equally wonderful *Moxy Maxwell Does Not Love Stuart Little*.

No Talking, by Andrew Clements. 9781416909835, \$15.99. It's boys versus girls in the contest of no talking - and no one will win the war if Principal Hiatt and the teachers have their way! An entertaining and thought-provoking book.

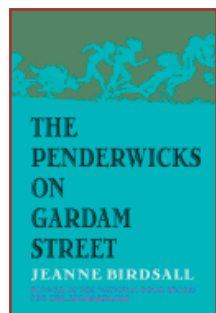
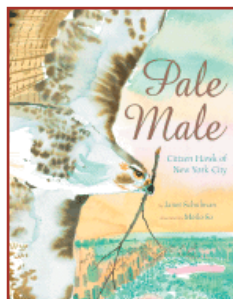

through the prism of the White House.

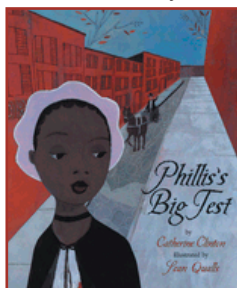

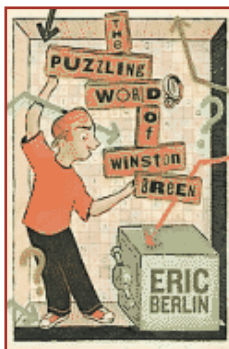
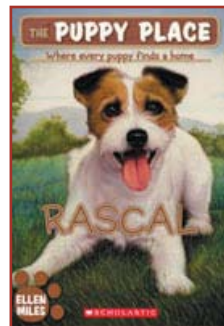

her little boy, and a mysterious stranger provide some excitement in this charming sequel to a beloved "new classic."

Phillis's Big Test, by Catherine Clinton; illus. by Sean Qualls. 9780618737390, \$16.00. This picture book for older readers introduces Phillis Wheatley, one of the first Black American poets. Taught to read by the family that purchased her as a young girl, the talented, humble, proud Phillis let her talent speak for itself at a time when black people were not supposed to be literate.

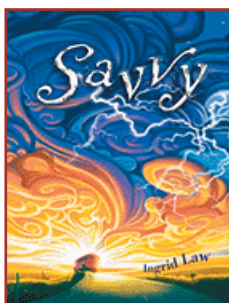

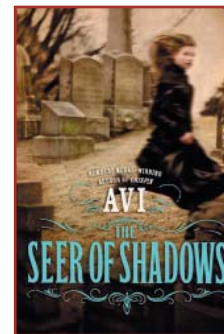


The Puzzling World of Winston Breen, by Eric Berlin. 9780399246937, \$16.99. Winston Breen finds puzzles everywhere, and solving them is what he does best. But when his sister finds mysterious wooden strips with words and letters inside a box, even Winston is stumped. It turns out the strips are part of a scavenger hunt that a town patriarch set up for his children. If all four sets are put together, they will lead to a ring worth thousands of dollars. Who has the other pieces? Get ready for a one-of-a-kind scavenger hunt!

Rapunzel's Revenge, by Shannon & Dean Hale; illus. by Nathan Hale. 97891599900704, \$18.99. The first graphic novel by popular author Shannon Hale, who worked with husband Dean Hale and illustrator Nathan Hale (no relation) to create a spectacular retelling of *Rapunzel in the Wild* West! Ages 10+.



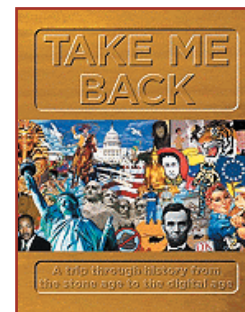
Savvy, by Ingrid Law. 9780803733060, \$16.99. At the age of thirteen, Mibs Beaumont will discover her "savvy" - a magical power unique to each member of her family. But news of an accident sends the Beaumont siblings off on a wild adventure.



The Seer of Shadows, by Avi. 9780060000158, \$16.99. This suspenseful and often scary story is set in 1872 New York City. Horace Carpentine is an apprentice to a photographer who wants to deceive a wealthy customer. As Horace takes his first photos, a ghost set on getting revenge on her cruel parents begins to come back to life.

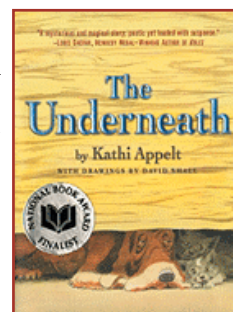
Simon Bloom, The Gravity Keeper, by Michael Reisman. 9780525479222, \$15.99. Out of thin air, a book falls onto Simon Bloom's head. But *The Teacher's Edition of Physics* isn't just any book - it's a magical reference book with formulas that control the laws of the universe. Of course a cool book like this has evil forces after it, and Simon and his friends must protect it.

Science, humor and fast-paced action make this book great fun for ages 10-12.



Take Me Back, by DK Publishing. 9780756640903, \$24.99. Enjoy this chronological exploration of the people and events that have shaped societies through time - from Mesopotamia to Mao, the Incas to Iraq, the Spartans to the Space Shuttle - with bold, zany, and irreverent sources.

The Underneath, by Kathi Appelt. 9781416950585, \$16.99. A very unusual, emotional story of friendships formed between a dog, a cat and her two kittens. At times tragic, the book does not turn away from some stark realities, but never wavers from its message of loyalty. A 2008 National Book Award finalist.

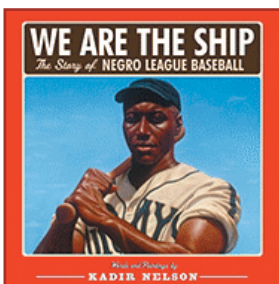




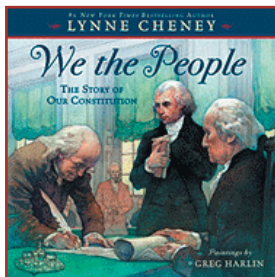

We Are the Ship: The Story of Negro League Baseball, by Kadir Nelson. 9780786808328, \$18.99.

Nelson traces the history of Negro League baseball from its beginnings in the 1920s through its decline after Jackie Robinson crossed over to the majors in 1947. Illustrated with oil paintings, this is a welcome addition to the library of any baseball lover.

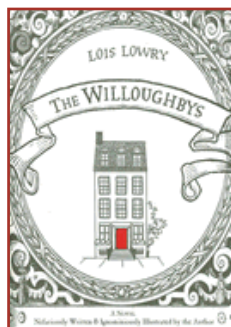

nation after the Revolutionary War, as delegates come together in 1787 to discuss the rules upon which the U.S. would be built. Every page of this beautiful book is accompanied by a quote from a person involved in the process, making history come alive.

The Willoughbys, by Lois Lowry. 9780618979745, \$16.00. The four Willoughby children are well-meaning, but they are a nuisance to their terrible parents, who would love the chance to escape ... permanently. What Mr. & Mrs. Willoughby don't realize is that while they are trying to rid themselves of their children, the children are trying to rid themselves of their parents!
