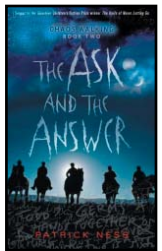
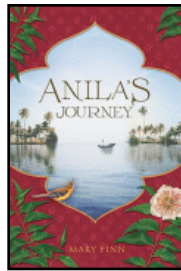




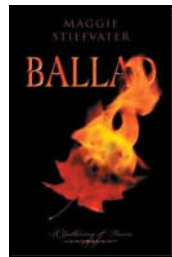

A wonderful coming-of-age story.

Anila, a half-Irish, half-Indian teen with a talent for sketching, travels with a naturalist in 18th century India. The characters and the landscape are both colorful and captivating. A great gift for teens.

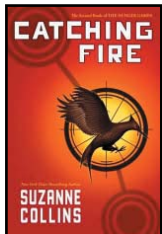


The Ask and The Answer, by Patrick Ness. 9780763644901, \$18.99. (Sequel to *The Knife of Never Letting Go*.) This sci-fi thriller will be a winner with teen boys. Todd is on the edge of becoming a man when chaos breaks loose. Running for his life, he encounters a girl who will unravel everything he ever thought he knew.

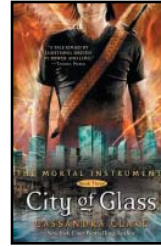
Ballad: A Gathering of Faerie, by Maggie Stiefvater. (Sequel to *Lament*.) When music prodigy James Morgan and his best friend, Deirdre, join a private conservatory for musicians, his talent attracts Nuala, a faerie muse who feeds on creative energies. Soon James finds himself battling the Queen of the Fey for the very lives of Deirdre and Nuala.



Catching Fire, by Suzanne Collins. 9780439023498, \$17.99 (Sequel to *The Hunger Games*.) Katniss and Peeta won the annual competition described in *Hunger Games*, but the aftermath leaves them with no sense of triumph. Instead, they have unwittingly become the faces of a rebellion that they never planned to lead, targeting them for merciless revenge. These books are captivating page turners for both girls and boys.



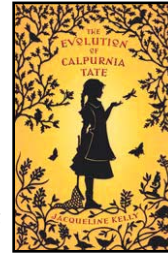

Here, she uncovers truths about her family's past ...

But now his mother has come to seek his help. What sacrifices will be made in the battle against the dark? The perfect series for fans of the supernatural.

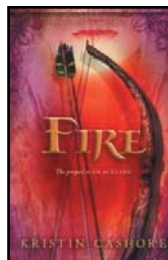
The Evolution of Calpurnia Tate, by Jacqueline Kelly. 9780805088410, \$16.99.

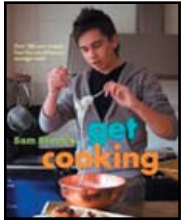

(*Skulduggery Pleasant* series, #3) If you've read the other Skulduggery books, you've seen it all before: Some bad guy wants to bring about the end of the world, and Skulduggery and Valkyrie fight valiantly to stop it from happening. A few people get hurt, sure, but everything's all right in the end. Well ... not this time.

Fire, by Kristin Cashore. 978-0803734616, \$17.99. (Companion to *Graceling*.) In a kingdom called the Dells, Fire is the last human-shaped monster, with unimaginable beauty and the ability to control minds. But even with these gifts she cannot escape the strife that overcomes her world.



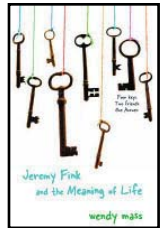

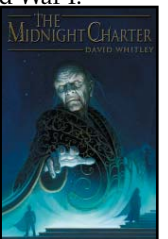

The Midnight Charter, by David Whitley. 9781596433816, \$16.99. In a society based on trade, where everything can be bought and sold, the future rests on the secrets of a single document - and the lives of two children whose destiny it is to discover its secrets.





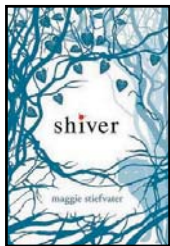
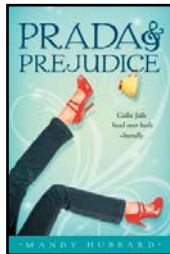

Paper Towns, by John Green. 9780525478188, \$17.99 (also in paperback). Quentin has spent a lifetime loving the adventurous Margo from afar. So when she cracks open a window and climbs back into his life dressed like a ninja and summoning him for an ingenious campaign of revenge, he follows.

Prada and Prejudice, by Amanda Hubbard. 978-1595142603, \$8.99 (paperback). During a school trip to England, fifteen-year-old Callie buys a pair of Prada shoes in an effort to impress the popular girls - a scheme that backfires and sends Callie back to 1815.



Shiver, by Maggie Stiefvater. 9780545123266, \$17.99. In all the years she has watched the wolves in the woods behind her house, Grace has been particularly drawn to an unusual yellow-eyed wolf who, in his turn, has been watching her with increasing intensity.

STORM: The Black Sphere, by E.L. Young. 9780803732681, \$16.99. In the third book in the series, three kid geniuses - an inventor, a computer whiz, and a chemist - invent amazing gadgets to solve international crimes.

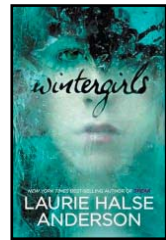
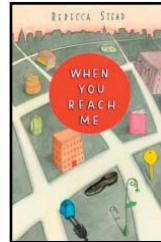
