Movement at the State Capitol



Top General Bills

- 47 Bills Introduced (not including trailer bills!)
- AB 64 (Bonta/Cooley/Wood/Lackey/Jones-Sawyer)
 - New funding source for enforcement against cultivation, dispensing, and manufacturing marijuana products illegally
- AB 1254 (Wood)
 - Increases penalties for diverting water for marijuana cultivation
- Governor's Trailer Bill
 - Language out on Tuesday, April 4th



Butane Sales

- AB 1244 (Voepel): this bill would prohibit the distribution or sale of any butane gas or product containing butane gas which does not have an odorant added
- AB 1120 (Cooper): this bill would prohibit any person from purchasing more than 600 milliliters of butane in a calendar month



Impaired Driving

- AB 6 (Lackey): Creates a drugged driving taskforce under the CHP
- SB 65 (Hill): Would make drinking an alcoholic beverage or smoking or ingesting marijuana or any marijuana product while driving, or while riding as a passenger in, a motor vehicle being driven upon a highway or upon specified lands punishable as either an infraction or a misdemeanor.
- SB 698 (Hill): Would make it a crime for a person who has between 0.04% and 0.07%, by weight, of alcohol in his or her blood and whose blood contains any controlled substance or 5 ng/ml or more of delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol to drive a vehicle



Packaging and Labeling

- AB 175 (Chau): Would require a manufacturer, prior to introducing an edible marijuana product into commerce in California, to submit the packaging and labeling to the Bureau of Marijuana Control for approval and would require the bureau to determine whether the packaging and labeling are in compliance with the requirements of prescribed provisions of AUMA, including the requirements that the packaging be child resistant and not attractive to children, as specified
- AB 832 (Chau): Would require each single serving of an edible marijuana product to be stamped, marked, or otherwise imprinted directly on the product with a universal symbol, to be designed by the Bureau of Marijuana Control
- SB 663 (Nielsen): Would specify that a package or label of marijuana or marijuana products is deemed to be attractive to children if the package or label has specific characteristics, including, among others, resembling any candy, snack food, baked good, or beverage commercially sold without marijuana
