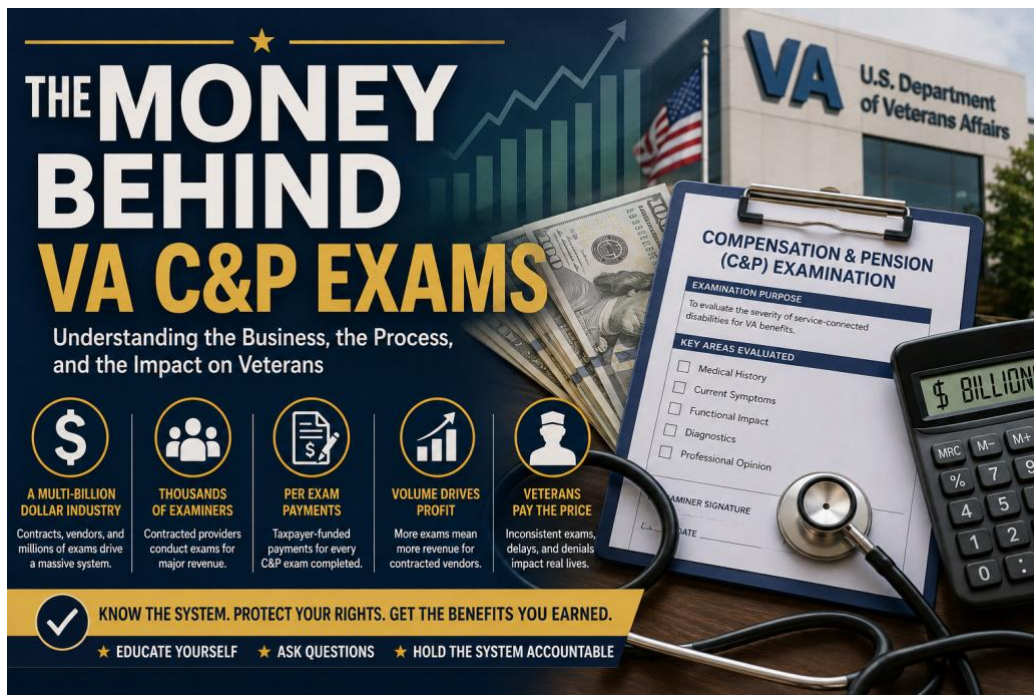




The Money Behind VA C&P Exams
