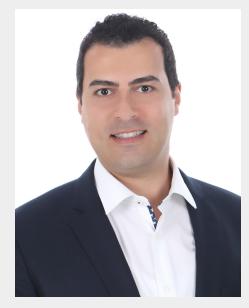
Message from the President

Embracing Diversity, Inclusion, Belonging and Equity

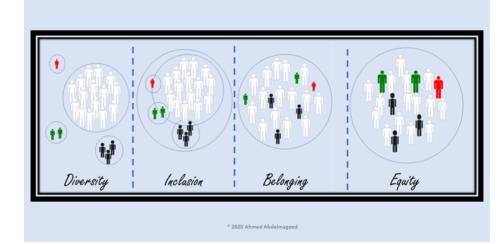

MEDICATION SAFETY PEARL

Institute for Safe Medication Practices Publishes Updated 2022-2023 Targeted Medication Safety Best Practices for Hospitals

The Institute for Safe Medication Practices (ISMP) has updated its Targeted Medication Safety Best Practices for Hospitals based on continued reports of medication safety problems that cause fatal and harmful outcomes to patients. This allows hospitals and health systems to prioritize their medication safety efforts for patient safety. The three new best practices that have been added to the 2022-2023

list are:



Best Practice #17: Safeguard against errors with oxytocin, utilizing the below 5 steps-

- Use standard order sets for prescribing oxytocin for a standardized clinical approach to labor induction/augmentation and control of postpartum bleeding
- Standardize to a single concentration bag size for both antepartum and postpartum infusions
- Express as standard oxytocin infusion doses, concentrations and rates that align with dose-error reduction software in smart infusion pumps
- Provide oxytocin in ready to use form with labels on both sides of bag to avoid confusion with IV fluids or magnesium.
- Only bring oxytocin infusion bags to bedside when it is prescribed and needed
- Why? ISMP has received 52 errors involving oxytocin over 10 years with a quarter of all reported
 errors resulting in maternal or fetal harm including death. An analysis of these errors revealed
 prescribing errors, look alike drug packaging and names, preparation challenges, administration
 errors and communication gaps with 44% of errors resulting from the dispensing phase.

MEDICATION SAFETY PEARL

Best Practice #18: Maximize the use of barcode verification prior to medication and vaccine administration by expanding use beyond inpatient care areas

- Implement barcode use to short stay patient areas (clinics, procedural areas, emergency rooms, radiology etc.)
- Routinely evaluate compliance and medication safety metric data to assess effectiveness of safety technology
- Why? Look alike products being stored adjacent to each other, with similar dosages of use, similar caps and stylized labels have resulted in errors including incorrect patient errors. Barcode medication administration systems are designed to catch medication errors at the point of administration.





Best Practice #19: Layer numerous strategies throughout the medication-use process to improve safety with high-alert medications

- Establish a multi-step robust process that evaluates the risks involved in each high-alert medication using internal and external information and address system vulnerabilities of the medication use process
- Avoid reliance on low leverage risk reduction strategies, bundle with mid- and high-leverage risk reduction strategies while applying inter-professional collaboration and utilize process measures to assess effectiveness
- Limit the use of independent double checks for high alert medications
- Why? High-alert medications top the list of drugs involved in moderate to severe patient outcomes when an error occurs. Organizations' attempts to prevent errors may be limited to low leverage risk-reduction strategies, relying on staff vigilance or education to keep patients safe, or focus on a single step or single practitioner in the medication-use process. The goal is to engage hospitals to reassess their current list of high-alert medications and enact robust error-prevention strategies within the medication-use process, along with monitoring outcomes to decrease risk of patient harm.

MEDICATION SAFETY PEARL



A nationwide short survey is being conducted to assess current level of implementation for newly established best practices. The online survey may be accessed at: www.ismp.org/ext/847 and will allow ISMP to collect benchmark data. Deadline to complete is April 1, 2022

With the addition of three new best practices, ISMP has archived the following best practices:

- **Best Practice #4**: Ensure that all oral liquid medications that are not commercially available in unit dose packaging are dispensed by the pharmacy in an oral syringe or an enteral syringe that meets the International Organization for Standardization (ISO) 80369 standard, such as ENFit.
- **Best Practice #5**: Purchase oral liquid dosing devices (oral syringes/ cups/droppers) that only display the metric scale.
- **Best Practice #10**: Eliminate all 1,000 mL bags of sterile water (labeled for "injection," "irrigation," or "inhalation") from all areas outside of the pharmacy.

- Sabrina and her chapter have inclusively targeted all students and cemented an impact on their messaging by showcase the best of Florida health-system pharmacy.

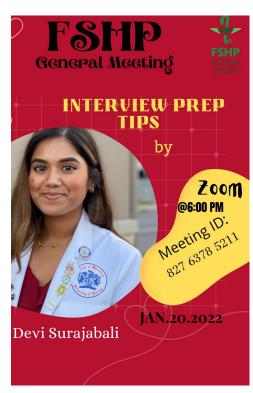
