

Librarians use their expertise to create collections that meet the needs of their entire community. Once books are contained within a library's collection, they cannot be removed simply because someone dislikes them.

If books are removed outside of an approved policy and procedure, this may violate your constitutional rights.

Librarians, patrons, and students are protected by the First Amendment and may advocate for their rights to read.

"If petitioners intend by their removal decision to deny respondents access to ideas with which petitioners disagreed, and if this intent was the decisive factor in petitioners' decision,...then petitioners have exercised their discretion in violation of the Constitution."
