

Maine

Unless one of the exemptions below applies, all travelers to Maine, including returning residents, must quarantine for 14 days. On June 8, Governor Mills announced via [Order 57](#) the [Keep Maine Healthy plan](#), which provides COVID-19 testing as an alternative to the 14-day quarantine requirement for travelers entering the state. Under the plan, adults who obtain and receive a negative COVID-19 test from a specimen taken no longer than 72 hours prior to arrival are not subject to the 14-day quarantine upon arrival in Maine. Visitors are encouraged to get tested and receive their test results in their home state before traveling to Maine. Any individual who chooses to be tested upon arrival in Maine must quarantine while awaiting the results.

Residents of Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, New Hampshire, and Vermont are entirely exempt from Maine's 14-day quarantine requirement. Notably, Maine residents who visit an exempted state are not required to quarantine upon returning to Maine. Essential workers are also exempt from testing and quarantine requirements if they are traveling to Maine to perform essential work, or are from Maine and are traveling out-of-state for work and returning home.

Travelers who are not residents of Maine or exempted states will be asked to sign a [Certificate of Compliance](#) indicating either that they have received a negative COVID-19 test result, that they will quarantine in Maine for 14 days, or that they have already completed their quarantine in Maine. This compliance form must be provided to checkin at all Maine lodging, campgrounds, seasonal rentals, overnight camps, and other commercial lodging, such as Airbnb.
