### **1- Heather Staff**

Heather Staff is the political adviser to Kate Green MP on asylum, migration and resettlement, working with partnership 'RAMP' to raise the quality of debate on these issues. An experienced researcher and strategist Heather has advised Parliamentarians in the UK and internationally including the Albanian deputy justice minister and PM. She works on refugee integration, migration trends, political engagement and rule of law programmes particularly in Eastern Europe and the Balkans. Her training from The University of Warwick is in the social sciences looking at the political sociology of genocide/totalitarian states and her postgraduate studies are in international and constitutional law. Heather is a regular speaker at events around the UK and Europe and a panellist for national and international media.

### **2- Anita Delhaas**

Anita Delhaas is Former Director of World Vision Lebanon. She has more than 27 years of NGO experience in Eastern Europe and Middle East. She has worked for World Vision International in senior positions involved in community develop, micro-enterprise, fundraising and advocacy. Now she is Director of Re-starter a foundation that promotes the integration of refugees in the Netherlands and Europe and the Executive Director in Europe of International Justice Mission.

### **3- Anila Noor**

Anila Noor is Refugee Rights-activist and a researcher. Recently she became member of European Migrant Advisory Board, an initiative of the Partnership on Inclusion of Migrants and Refugees the Urban Agenda for the EU and a policy advisor on integration for the City of Amsterdam and she is a fellow of the Open City Fellowship. She has been working in 2 overlapping areas. The first is Gender and Conflict Studies: Social Justice Perspectives. The second is Force Migration, asylum, refugee policies and advocacy, including in Fortress Europe. She is an Emancipation Ambassador of EP-Nuffic (Netherlands) and alumni of "World Class", an initiative of the City of The Hague (Netherlands). She is also a member of Kaldor Centre of Emerging Scholars Network Australia.
