Block Coding Resources

Dyslexia & Multi-Sensory Programming

"Dyslexia affects one in five people. It crosses racial, ethnic and socioeconomic lines, and with proper instruction and accommodations it can be remediated." – Yale Center for Dyslexia and Creativity.

In this session we will define dyslexia, discuss evidence-based interventions, and recently passed legislation. We will also present how to integrate multi-sensory experiences that scaffold phonemic awareness and letter recognition in preschool story times along with resources that libraries can acquire that are appropriate for dyslexic students of all ages.

Pop-ups and Book Bikes and Park Visits, Oh My! Unconventional Outreach

Sexual Violence 101: Working with Library Youth in the Era of #MeToo

The Me Too Movement (#MeToo) is an international movement against sexual harassment and assault. The movement was founded to help survivors of sexual violence, particularly young women of color from low wealth communities, find pathways to healing. The movement's vision from the beginning was to address both the dearth in resources for survivors of sexual violence and to build a community of advocates, driven by survivors, who will be at the forefront for creating solutions to interrupt sexual violence in their communities. Libraries are the heart of many Hoosier communities and serve as a unique resource to strike up conversations and model healthy interactions among youth. This session will introduce teen/youth librarians to the Indiana Coalition to End Sexual Assault; discuss characteristics and prevalence of sexual violence (including sexual harassment) in the United States and Indiana; discuss strategies for recognizing and overcoming barriers (rape culture, victim blaming, marginalized identity) to victims accessing services; and provide space for discussion and brainstorming to take creative strategies back to libraries across the state. At the end of this session, attendees should have a better idea of how to bring discussions of #MeToo to library youth in an impactful way.

Developmentally Appropriate Strategies (and Tricks!) to Enrich Story Time for Preschoolers

Responding to Anxiety Surrounding School Violence and Drills

As of May 25, 2018, the date of the school shooting in Noblesville, the United States was averaging 1 school shooting a week. School violence and drills have become the norm. As a result, our children and youth are dealing with fears and anxieties as never before and those tasked with supporting them are having to learn how to respond appropriately. In this session, the speakers will provide an overview of how to recognize student symptoms, how to respond to questions and concerns, and how to set up processes for referral and response. Participants will be invited to ask questions, practice how to respond to student questions, and be given resources and strategies for easy implementation. Self-care will also be a part of the discussion.

Her job involves coordinating with all staff members to ensure that they and the public have the information they need to make the most of their library experience.

Cheryl Clemens - Cheryl Clemens graduated from Taylor University with a B.A. in Chemistry and Spanish. She worked for 13 years in Regulatory Affairs at Eli Lilly and Company. Since the diagnosis of her three sons with dyslexia, she has devoted her time to help educate others on recognizing dyslexia. As one of the leaders of Decoding Dyslexia-IN, she advocates for changes on a state and federal level. In addition, after seeing the difference that Orton Gillingham made in the lives of her own children, Cheryl took the Orton Gillingham training and helps to tutor struggling readers. Cheryl has recently been appointed to the Board of Directors of the Scottish Rite Children's Dyslexia Center of Indianapolis.

Stuart Cotton - Stuart is a Digital Mentor at Muncie Public Library. Drawing greatly from his skills as a multimedia artist, Stuart helps the community to access modern technology in creative and basic ways. Whether someone needs help with music, photography, graphic design, or just basic device advice, Stuart is sought after for his patience and effective teaching. He is also a creator of Digital Climbers, a children's STEM program that is starting to be seen around the Central Indiana region. Stuart graduated at Ball State in 2015 with a master's degree in Digital Storytelling.

Angela Fox - Angela spent 15 years with Allen County Public Library in a variety of roles, most recently as the Children's/Teen Librarian at a large branch. During her time there, she received her MLS from Indiana University (IUPUI). She currently works at the Indiana State Library as the LSTA and Federal Projects Consultant.

Deb Gaff - Deb is a STEAM programming specialist at Bartholomew County Public Library. Some of her more popular programs include: Coder Dojo for patrons age 7-17, Crypto Club, Stitch Club and Full STEAM Ahead for ages K2 and grades 3-6. Deborah is passionate about digital making and learning.

Alejandria Galarza - Alejandria Galarza is a Children's Librarian with a passion for tween programming and technology. She's worked at Monroe County Public Library since October 2015 and graduated with her MLIS from University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign in August 2015.

Anne Guthrie - Anne Guthrie graduated from Kent State University with a BS in Elementary Education and taught for 5 years in a public elementary school. Later she home educated all three of her children. (Her son is dyslexic along with her brother and father.) In 2002 she began working full time as an early literacy specialist at Greenwood Public Library receiving her MLS from IUPUI in 2006. Anne attended training at the Scottish Rite Children's Dyslexia Center of Indianapolis which has greatly influenced her preschool programming content.

Kristal Hellman - Kristal is the Youth Services Manager at the Plainfield-Guildford Township Public Library.

Abby Johnson - Abby Johnson is the Collection Development Leader and was until recently the Youth Services Manager at the New Albany-Floyd County Public Library. She served on the 2015 Newbery Committee and has served on several ILF committees, including the Young Hoosier Book Award Committee. She graduated from IU with her MLS in 2007 and worked as a Youth Librarian in Barrington, IL before taking a job with the New Albany-Floyd County Public Library. She began her career at MCPL as an intern, was hired as a circulation clerk, and attained her current position in 2011. She is a member of the Youth Services Division Leadership Team, as well as a former member of the Young Hoosier Book Award Committee. She has previously presented at the former CYPD conference and at the ILF Annual Conference.

Shirley Mullin - Shirley is completing her 32 year as a book-seller. Prior to that she was the librarian at Riley Hospital and also worked at the IUPUI library. She has degrees in education and library science. She has also taught children's literature at IUPUI, Butler University and Christian Theological Seminary.

Casey O'Leary - Casey is the Director of Library Programs & Youth Services at the Mooresville Public Library, in Mooresville, Indiana. She has a bachelor's degree in Elementary Education, an MLS, and School Media Specialist certification. Casey is a reviewer for *School Library Journal*, and serves on the ALA-Children's Book Council Joint Committee.

Cathy Riley - Cathy has been the Youth Services Manager at Hancock County Public Library since 2012. She received her MLS from Indiana University and has worked in Indiana libraries for the last decade.

Kirat Sandhu - Kirat is the Training Coordinator for the Indiana Coalition to End Sexual Assault (ICESA) and has been in this role since October 2016. Kirat is dedicated to examining sexual violence through an intersectional lens, addressing root causes, and utilizing feminist methodologies to better understand and end gender-based violence. As Training Coordinator, Kirat manages, designs, develops, coordinates, and evaluates ICESA's annual trainings and statewide conference with the end result of providing attendees the continuing education and knowledge to promote consistent, professional, and trauma-informed coordinated response to victims of sexual assault. Kirat holds a Bachelors of Arts in Philanthropic Studies and Women's and Gender Studies from the IU Lilly Family School of Philanthropy and the IU School of Liberal Arts at Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis. Prior to joining ICESA, Kirat was extremely involved with the It's On Us campaign launched out of the White House in 2014. She served on the campaign's inaugural Student Advisory Committee in 2015-2016, and as a Regional Advisor for the It's On Us Southern Region of the United States in 2016-2017, overseeing student leaders at colleges and universities in eight states. Kirat was also asked to write a guest piece for the United State of Women Summit hosted by the White House in 2016, and was recognized by former Vice President Biden for her commitment to sexual assault prevention, especially on college campuses. Kirat is currently pursuing a Juris Doctorate at the IU Robert H. McKinney School of Law in Indianapolis.

Kresha Warnock - Kresha Warnock has worked in the field of Early Childhood Education for thirty-five years. She has served in many positions, including teaching preschool, directing centers and consulting with other teachers. She has recently retired from Ball State University where she taught Child Development and prepared numerous students to work with young children and their families. She has a masters in Early Childhood Education from the University of Colorado at Denver and holds the Infant Mental Health Endorsement (IMHE(IV) Research/Faculty Endorsement®) and is the current Past President of the Indiana Association for the Education of Young Children.
