Nonprofit Comparative Research: Recent Agendas and Future Trends | 非營利比較研究：近期議程與未來趨勢

Abstract: Comparative research on nonprofit organizations (NPOs) has been a prominent approach for advancing our understanding of these organizations. This article identifies the primary drivers that shape the NPO comparative research agenda and explores new research trends. Based on a systematic literature review, nine definitional aspects and ten impulses are identified as drivers of NPO research. This article conducts a correspondence analysis to study the relationships between the definitional aspects and impulses that are discussed in 111 articles that were published in philanthropic and third-sector journals in the period January 2001–January 2015. Based on our results, we suggest three new clusters for future comparative research: investment and growth, participation and social impact, and social cohesion and civil society.

摘要：非營利組織（NPOs）的比較研究對於推動我們對這些組織的認識有重要意義。本文識別了塑造 NPO 比較研究議程的主要驅動力，並探索了新的研究趨勢。基於系統性的文獻回顧，我們識別出 NGO 研究驅動力的九個定義性的方面和十個推動力。本文對 2001 年 1 月至 2015 年 1 月期間在慈善和第三部門期刊中發表的 111 篇文章中討論到的定義性的方面和推動力之間的關係進行了對應分析。根據研究結果，我們提出了三個未來比較研究的新集群：投資和增長，參與和社會影響，以及社會凝聚力和公民社會。

Statistical Estimation of the Causal Effect of Social Economy on Subjective Well-Being | 社會性經濟對主觀幸福感因果影響的統計估計

Abstract: It is well known that measuring the noneconomic outcomes produced by social economy organizations is fairly difficult and complex. Usually, social economy organizations feature participatory and democratic decision-making processes that help create social capital and relational goods, and they are interested in social integration; accordingly, they tend to create an organizational culture that encourages their workers to contribute to local communities. Therefore, the hypothesis that the increased activities of social economy organizations have a causal effect on the subjective well-being of the people living near those organizations is highly plausible. In this paper, we estimate the causal effect and attempt to test the hypothesis statistically by using a dataset called the “Seoul Survey,” which provides observations on the subjective well-being of 45,496 citizens living in Seoul and the size of social economy organizations. Controlling for variables at the district level

and the appropriate socioeconomic characteristics of each individual in the dataset, we find that the size of social organizations is highly significant.

摘要：眾所周知，衡量社會性經濟組織 (social economy organizations) 所產生的非經濟成果是相對困難、複雜的。通常，社會經濟組織有具備參與性和民主性的決策過程，有助於創造社會資本和關係性商品，他們對社會融合也感興趣。因此，這些組織會創造出鼓勵員工為本地社區貢獻的組織文化。所以，社會經濟組織的更多的活動對於住在這些組織附近的人的主觀幸福感有因果影響的假設是很有道理的。在這篇文章中，我們估測了這一因果影響，並且嘗試用“首爾調查”這個數據庫對這一假設進行統計檢驗。該調查數據庫提供了居住在首爾的45,496位居民的主觀幸福感和當地社會經濟組織規模的數據。我們發現，控制區域層面的變量及適當的個人社會經濟特徵後，社會組織的規模非常具有顯著性。

Insights for Measuring Social Value: Classification of Measures Related To the Capabilities Approach | 對社會價值測量的洞察：與能力分析法相關的測量分類

Abstract: The measurement of performance and the evaluation of social change efforts are vital yet challenging issues for practitioners and researchers in the social sector. Although tools exist to measure social value, they tend to focus on converting non-monetary costs and benefits into monetary terms to demonstrate the cost-effectiveness of operations. The capabilities approach provides a value-based alternative that could potentially enable a broader assessment of a project's impact; this approach encapsulates societal-level factors, beneficiary perspectives, and a more holistic view of a beneficiary's life. Ultimately, our goal is to raise the following question in the social sector field: what might a capabilities approach to social value measurement that is suitable for practical application by social sector organizations look like? The purpose of this article is to introduce the theoretical framework and to present what some of the measures and instruments might look like, at least in part, based on applications in other contexts.

摘要：績效的測量和社會變革努力的評估對於社會領域的從業者和研究者來說是既關鍵又具挑戰性的問題。儘管有測量社會價值的工具，但其往往將非貨幣成本和收益轉化為貨幣價值，以證明經營的成本效益。而能力分析法 (capabilities approach) 提供了一個基於價值的替代方案，它具有實現更廣泛地評估項目影響力的潛力。這種方法囊括了社會層面的因素、受益者的視角以及對受益者生活更為全面的觀察研究。最終，我們的目標是在社會領域提出以下問題：適合社會組織實際使用的社會價值測量的能力分析法是什麼樣的？本文的目的是介紹理論框架，並且基於在其他場景下的應用，至少在一定程度上呈現部份測量方法和工具。

A special issue of *Mobilization: Memories and Movements* | 《Mobilization》特刊：記憶與運動

In recent years, movement scholars have become increasingly interested in the nexus between movements and memories. At the same time, memory studies are paying growing attention to agency, resilience and resistance lately. The 50th anniversary of 1968 movements around the world provides a good opportunity to bring the different strands of research on movements and memory together. Deepening our understanding of movements' legacies and relationships with the past is also gaining importance in the context of calls for widening the temporal lens in analyzing social movements and paying more attention to the historical embeddedness of protests. The journal *Mobilization* seeks contributions for a special issue on memories and movements, guest edited by Priska Daphi (Goethe University Frankfurt) and Lorenzo Zamponi (Scuola Normale Superiore). *Mobilization* will publish the special issue in December 2019.

For the special issue, we seek high-quality, original research articles from all disciplines that explore different dimensions of the interaction between memory and social movements. We welcome theoretical and empirical articles that address memories as outcomes of mobilization and/or as significant factors in shaping further mobilization.

Central questions include, but are not limited to:

- How do social movements participate or intervene in public memories about past contentions and other historical events?
- How do social movements remember themselves or previous movements?
- How does the past and its public remembrance influence mobilization?

The Centre for Social Change

The Centre for Social Change conducts interdisciplinary research on social change and has built a strong reputation for studying social movements, strikes and protests. It produces high quality, rigorous scholarship for academic and other publications, and actively engages civil society, academics and the wider public in thinking about alternative futures that expand democracy for the majority of humanity. We are also interested in research that explores technology and social change in response to the challenges posed by the fourth industrial revolution.

The Centre has a core team comprising students, post-doctoral fellows and researchers based on the University of Johannesburg's Bunting Road Campus, and a network of research associates, collaborators and associates located elsewhere in South Africa and around the world. The Centre's director, Professor Peter Alexander, holds the South African Research Chair in Social Change. Other staff include Professor Carin Runciman and Dr Trevor Ngwane.

Post-doctoral Research Fellowships

The Centre seeks to appoint Post-doctoral research fellows (PDRFs). We welcome candidates from a range of disciplines that conduct research connected to the broad theme of progressive social change. Positions are normally tenable for two years, subject to a successful review at the end of the first year, with the possibility for the extension into a third year. PDRFs are expected to produce the equivalent of three accredited research publications, which could be a book, a year. PDRFs currently receive R240,000 per annum (tax free). Applications from across the world are welcomed, particularly from those conducting research on other countries on the African continent. Candidates are expected to have completed their PhD at the time of the application.

Doctoral bursaries

The Centre seeks to appoint doctoral bursars to be registered at the University of Johannesburg. Doctoral bursars planning to undertake research that falls within the scope of the Centre's remit is preferred. Doctoral bursars currently receive R100,000 per year for a period of three years and they are expected to submit their dissertation in this period.

MA bursaries

The Centre seeks to appoint MA bursars to be registered at the University of Johannesburg undertaking research that falls within the scope of the Centre's remit and supervision capacity. MA bursars will receive a bursary for two years and are expected to submit their dissertation within 18 months. The current value of the bursary is R70,000 per year.

Applications

All applications must include a letter of motivation, CV and contact details of two academic referees. Applications for MA and doctoral bursaries should also include a two-page summary of their proposed research and your academic transcript. Post-doctoral research fellows should also include a two page summary of their past and future research with a proposed publication plan to be undertaken in the first year of the fellowship.

While the Centre has some fellowships and bursaries linked to the Research Chair, which is funded by the NRF, it will also assist applicants to acquire support, from, for instance, the University of Johannesburg, the National Institute of Humanities and Social Sciences and the NRF.

The Centre is committed to processes of equity and transformation. Applications from previously disadvantaged population groups and persons with disabilities will be viewed favourably.
