In Spotlight:

Asian Civil Society Research Network (ACSRN) – Taiwan Charter

<u>Asian Civil Society Research Network (ACSRN) – Taiwan Charter</u> was newly established in early 2023 and hosted by Prof. Dr. Herlin Chien from College of Humanities and Social Sciences, National Pingtung University of Science and Technology, Pingtung, Taiwan. It is one of the two Charters for this broader <u>ACSRN</u> network of scholars and practitioners in Asia Pacific region who share common research interests in exploring development of civil society and non-state actors.

Since its inception, one of the flagship programs pushed by ACSRN – Taiwan Charter is the promotion of <u>Parliamentary Monitoring Organizations</u> (PMOs) concept across countries in the region. In essence, PMOs aim to play a role during non-election time to engage citizens and civil society in observing, monitoring and assessing the performance of Parliament or individual Member of Parliament to ensure SDG 16 on building inclusive societies and effective, accountable and strong institutions can be attainable.

Although current trend shows that regional progress on SDG 16 and especially on accountable Parliament is slow and even off-track, this lack of attention also provides a window of opportunities to initiate peer learning among CSOs in different countries in Asia to be acquainted with the best practices and a variety of challenges faced in different circumstances embedded in the kaleidoscope of political cultures with institutional barriers. Political changes and the progress of democratization are by nature incremental. Yet our collective effort of PMOs joined by CSOs in the region can potentially be game changers to help reverse democratic decline.

In 2025, we have organized several monthly online and face-to-face meetings in the Philippines and Malaysia with CSOs in more than 10 Asian countries for discussion and preparation of upcoming "Asia Parliament Transparency Index". This index serves as a comprehensive, regionally relevant framework for assessing the level of openness and accountability in Asian parliaments, allowing civil society organizations to advocate for greater transparency. The following four tentative dimensions of Parliament Transparency is under discussion and can be subject to future revision based on ongoing practical feedback provided by CSOs and Parliaments in Asia:

- Dimension 1: Transparency in parliament operations
- Dimension 2: Institutional legal framework
- Dimension 3: Accountability
- Dimension 4: Citizen participation

Following our visit to Malaysia in August, the ACSRN hosted another event in Japan, in September 2025. The Social Science Research Council (SSRC) of the United States provided an Abe Fellows Network Collaborative Grant of \$20,000 to support a key in-person meeting in Tokyo, held from September 18-19, 2025 <a href="https://www.peopo.org/news/821377">https://www.peopo.org/news/821377</a>. This meeting, titled "Empowering Asian Legislatures:

A Transparency Initiative Leveraging Japan's E-Government Expertise" aimed to address the concerning trend of democratic backsliding across the Asia-Pacific region, where legislatures are often weakened and civil society acts as a vital "last line of defense". The event was organized by a core team that includes Akihiro Ogawa from the University of Melbourne, Apichai Shipper from Georgetown University, Pinar Temocin from the University of Tokyo, and Hiroko Aihara of Japan Perspective News—all members of the ACSRN. Ogawa and Shipper are both former Abe Fellows, and Aihara was an Abe Fellow Journalist. This two-day workshop brought together PMO professionals from 10 countries in Asia (the list of invited PMOs is available below). A significant part of the agenda involved learning from Japan's democracy and digital governance, including inviting Mr. Taro Kono, a former minister of digital transformation and foreign affairs, to understand the strategies and mechanisms behind Japan's consistent global leadership in e-government and e-participation. Japan notably ranked first in 2022 and second in 2024 in the United Nations E-Government Survey.

Let us be Clear: Why and how to Demonstrate data and Methods Transparency in Nonprofit Research

## Abstract:

Transparency means being honest and open about one's practices. Transparency is considered a gold standard in the nonprofit sector and associated with a range of positive outcomes. We propose that transparency should also become a guiding principle and documented practice for nonprofit scholars. In this article, we articulate the context for discussing transparency in social science research and the potential risks of not being transparent. Acknowledging the epistemic and methodological diversity of our field—and therefore, the need for flexibility in how transparency will

be practiced by different scholars—we encourage nonprofit researchers to consider how they can enhance their research transparency. To this end, we outline the benefits of transparency and offer concrete suggestions for different ways to demonstrate transparency in nonprofit research.

### **I Selected Abstract**

Why Cooperation in Volunteer Work Can Fail Despite the Best Intentions: Conflicting Ideas in Narrations From Volunteers

### Abstract:

This article provides an analysis of narratives about day-to-day cooperation between volunteers. It shows what challenges there are to cooperation, even when those involved share the same objectives and want to cooperate. Our analysis of the narrative interviews revealed two contrasting ideas volunteers have about cooperation: The first idea likens cooperation to a jigsaw puzzle, with volunteers emphasizing their mutual dependence. The second idea draws a comparison with pieces in a board game, with volunteers asserting their autonomy and acting strategically in dealing with others. The two ideas are shown to be incompatible, leading to volunteers taking rather critical views of each other. This shows the importance of a more nuanced analysis of different ideas of cooperation in volunteer work and of not taking successful cooperation as a given. Our practical conclusion is that the manner of cooperation in volunteer work needs to be negotiated more thoroughly.

### Free to Think 2025: Attacks on Higher Education Linked to Democratic Decline

Free to Think is an annual report by <u>Scholars at Risk's</u> Academic Freedom Monitoring Project. This <u>year's report</u> documents 395 attacks on higher education communities in 49 countries and territories. It explores global attacks on higher education, highlighting examples like the Taliban's exclusion of women and dissenters in Afghanistan and U.S. government pressure on institutions. The report urges the sharing of information, institutional support, legal protections, and funding to safeguard academic freedom.

## John Mohan announces the publication of his new book

John Mohan's book <u>"Volunteering in the United Kingdom: The spirit of service"</u> explores the long-term impact of voluntary services. It critiques major claims about volunteer benefits, noting that they often lack strong research support. While volunteering has potential benefits, it usually doesn't significantly reduce social inequalities, and its overall effect is limited.
